RECOMMENDATION

Augusta County Fire-Rescue (ACFR) is proposing the purchase of two PL Custom (2) Type 1 four-wheel-drive ambulances to be purchased on the HGAC contract from Goodman Specialized Vehicles of Amelia, VA at a cost of \$245,298 per ambulance and a total cost of \$490,596.

BACKGROUND

ACFR maintains a fleet of 10 ambulances. Seven of the ambulances are continuously staffed and are designated as front-line ambulances. Three of the ambulances are designated as active-reserve ambulances, meaning they are maintained in a state or readiness to be placed into active service at any time. The reserve ambulances are most frequently utilized to substitute for front-line ambulances that are undergoing routine maintenance or are out of service for repairs. Additionally, the reserve ambulances are staffed for special events or when incident surge is anticipated, such as inclement weather,

Collectively, the fleet of ambulances logged 5,110 EMS incidents and 2,921 transports to the hospital in calendar year 2017. The fleet of ambulances averages approximately 120,000 miles



annually. Accrued mileage per assigned station varies widely, ranging from 8,500 at Deerfield to 25,000 or more at Riverheads and Craigsville. Reserve ambulances collectively average 12,000 miles annually, but this number is expected to increase slightly due to the recent retirement of two reserve ambulances.


FLEET MAINTENANCE

The fleet of ambulances is maintained under the direction of the B shift operational Captain. Routine maintenance is performed in accordance with manufacturer recommendations, typically by the Augusta County School Bus Garage.

The following chart represents the frequency of repair and maintenance requests made for each ambulance dating back to 2016. Ambulance #154, a 1999 Ford, averaged 87 miles per service request. Conversely, the newest ambulance, #151, a 2016 Ford, averaged 3,170 miles per service request. Both #154 and #137 (red columns) were retired from service in 2018. Ambulances #156, #135 and #149 (yellow columns), represent the current active-reserve ambulances.



The maintenance cost per mile to operate the fleet of ambulances from FY2016–FY2018 is represented in the graph below.



An association between more aged ambulances and increased maintenance costs per mile is demonstrated. Ambulance #137 was retired in FY2019 due to high mileage and increasing maintenance costs. In FY2018, the cost/mile to maintain #137 increased to \$1.05/mile. Ambulance #156 is a 2002 Ford acquired from Deerfield. This ambulance has logged minimal miles until recently, having been pressed into a more active reserve ambulance. The maintenance cost/mile is forecast to increase for #156.

AMBULANCE PROCUREMENT PROPOSAL

EMS administration, working with members of the apparatus committee, under the direction of the Fire Chief and Division Commanders, has completed the following tasks during preparation of this proposal to purchase two ambulances.

- All fire-rescue staff were surveyed for recommendations related to the design of the next generation ACFR ambulance.
- Five ambulance vendors were invited to demonstrate Type I ambulances, design an ambulance based on ACFR specifications and submit a proposal. The vendors included:
 - Goodman Specialized Vehicle (PL Custom)
 - Northwestern Emergency Vehicles (AEV)
 - o Penn Care Inc. (Braun)
 - RedStorm Fire & Rescue Apparatus, Inc. (Demers)
 - Select Custom Apparatus (Wheeled Coach)

The two new ambulances will replace two reserve ambulances that are currently outside of revised rotation and replacement guidelines. Two ambulances currently in front-line service will be moved in to active-reserve status, providing for improved reliability of the reserve fleet and decreased repair and maintenance costs. The two ambulances that are retired will be sold to recover the remaining value of the ambulances.

The PL Custom product was selected over the other products for a variety of reasons, including a commitment to safety in ambulance design. Following are product features desired by Augusta County Fire-Rescue.

- Quality construction including corner extrusions (custom interlocking design provides the strongest corner in the industry)
- Side impact safety including 2"x5" side impact rails, upper- and mid-level body locations, upper- and mid-level entrance and full height compartment doors, and mid-level half height compartment doors.
- Interior cabinets constructed with 45-degree angles to open the working area and prevent head impacts.
- Cabinets with solid surface counter edges with radiused edges to reduce injury in the impact of impact.
- Proactive ambulance interiors designed for "full time" safety for the patient and the attendants. The Medic in Mind "MIM" layout supports easy access to everyday equipment from a seated position on either side of the vehicle.
- Centrally-ducted climate control including 100% direction connection to ductwork.
- Side and roof sheets made from single piece aluminum 5053H34 x .125" thick.
- Lifetime modular body structural warranty.
- · Lifetime warranty on standard conventional hardwired electrical systems.

Goodman Specialized Vehicles offers the most attractive service capabilities of all vendors considered. Goodman is an authorized service and warranty center PL Custom ambulances. The service center offers 24/7 emergency service and parts support, a mobile service truck for field service and repairs and free pick-up/delivery by CDL driver.

SUMMARY

Augusta County Fire-Rescue recommends the purchase of two (2) PL Custom Type 1 four-wheel-drive ambulances to be purchased on the HGAC contract from Goodman Specialized Vehicles of Amelia, VA at a cost of \$245,298 per ambulance and a total cost of \$490,596.

ACFR recommends funding for the purchase of one ambulance via department-allocated capital. To fund the second ambulance, ACFR seeks approval to apply for a 50/50 matching Rescue Squad Assistance Fund (RSAF) Grant Program. The next cycle will open February 1, 2019 and awards will be announced after July 1, 2019. The capital required to match the grant would be \$122,649.

On September 28, 2018, the Invitation to Bid was advertised for the Government Center Roof Replacement Project. Sealed bids were received on October 30, 2018. Bids included cost options for both ballast type roof materials to replace existing and self-adhered roof materials.

Ballast Roof — Utilizes gravel, pavers, or vegetation to hold the roofing components in place above loose laid insulation sheets. Both the Government Center roof and the Extension Office roof utilize stone for the ballast system. The current roof was installed in 1988-1989, and had a 20 year warranty.

Advantages

- 1. Cost
- 2. Quick to Install
- 3. The ballast help extend the life by protecting the waterproofing layer from ultraviolet rays, hail, or accidental tool or sharp object drops.

Disadvantages

- 1. Can be difficult to find leaks, as you have to move the ballast around to do so. This can make the repair more costly.
- 2. The ballast degrades after time, and can leave sharp edges on the stone that may puncture the waterproofing layer.
- 3. Walking on degraded ballast can cause additional roof leaks. Walkways are provided, but there are times that you must walk on the ballast.
- 4. Stone ballast catch dirt and debris causing water to not flow through the stone, and back up on the roof structure. There are some areas of mold that have begun to grow on the stone in certain areas that do not get much sunlight.

Self-Adhered – The insulation below the water proofing membrane is physically attached to the metal roof deck with screws. The water proofing membrane is then adhered to the insulation. The finished product is smooth and flat.

Advantages

- 1. Maintenance costs are less, as the process to locate and repair a leak is much easier. There is no ballast to move around to search for a leak
- 2. There is much less weight on the roof structure without the ballast. For code purposes a stone ballasted roof requires a minimum of 10 pounds per square foot of ballast. For the Government Center roof this equates to approximately 200 tons of stone ballast material on the roof.
- 3. The roof system is flat, as it is adhered directly to the insulation below, so there is no material to block up water flow to the roof drains.
- 4. Self-adhered is a much cleaner installation.

Disadvantages

- 1. More costly to install due to the cost of adhesive, and the securing of the insulation to the metal roof decking.
- 2. Installation takes longer
- 3. If a tool or other sharp object is dropped on the water proofing membrane, it would be more susceptible to puncture.

Recommendation -

From a maintenance perspective, the self-adhered option would be the best investment for the County. Over the past 12 months \$1183.02 was spent on repairs to the Government Center flat ballasted roof. Approximately \$400.00 has been spent on repairs on the ballasted roof at the Extension Building, both of which are scheduled in the IFB for replacement. When comparing maintenance cost, only approximately \$200.00 was spent on self-adhered flat roof systems recently. Currently, self-adhered flat roof systems exist at the DSS building, Smith Garage, Sheriff's Department, District Courts, Fire and Rescue Training, and the Maintenance shop.

We also required the contractor's earliest start date and length of construction. Skyline Roofing gave a start date of December 3rd, with a 30 working day time frame for the Ballast roof and a 40 working day time frame for the self-adhered. Don Largent Roofing gave a start date of March 2019 with a 75 day time frame to completion. Both bidders fully complied with bidding requirements.

Workmanship is guaranteed for two years, with a 20 year manufactures total system warranty. Performance and payment bonds have been received. An insurance certificate will be required and a contract will be executed.

Funds for this project will be utilized from 4-70-80000-8198, the building depreciation account. In addition, we recommend including a 10% contingency for the project. This is to address unknown conditions once work commences. Total for the low bid for the self-adhered roof is \$ 281,646, with a 10% contingency the total is \$309,810.

Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD) Broadband Grant-VATI 2019 RE:

The County advertised a Request for Information for interest from area internet service providers to partner with the County on an application for the 2019 Virginia Telecommunications Initiative (VATI) Grant. A response was received from Lingo Networks.

DHCD will award \$4 million to eligible applicants to provide last-mile services to unserved areas of the State. The primary objective of the VATI is to provide financial assistance to supplement construction costs by private sector broadband service providers, in partnership with local units of government to extend service to areas that presently are unserved by any broadband provider. The grant will fund up to 80% of the project.

A competitive grant application will be centered on the applicant's broadband needs, a shovel-ready project(s) and readiness to meet the required deadline. Deadline for completion of the construction projects is May 2020.

All applicants are required to have solicited public comment for at least 15 days before submitting their application to DHCD. The Broadband Committee will meet on November 8, 2018 to review the proposals and make a recommendation to the Board of Supervisors. If they choose to proceed with a grant application(s), an ad will be placed in the Staunton News Leader and a notice will be posted on the County website and in the Government Center to begin the public comment timeline. The notice would include a Board of Supervisors meeting date in November, as well as the address and phone number of who to contact for comment or more information.

Grant timeline:

- Request for Information-October 9, 2018
- Review of Responses by Committee-November 8, 2018
- Public Comment Period-Estimate November 9-30
- BOS meeting to review Committee recommendation for project(s), consider local match-November 14, 2018/November 28, 2018
- Grant deadline-December 14, 2018
- Project completion deadline-May 2020 at latest

Project areas:

- Route 252 Fiber Project-continuation of fiber from Arbor Hill tower to Middlebrook village making fiber-to-the-home available to households within 250 feet from the road along the route. Estimated cost of \$347,425.
- Deerfield Area Fiber Project-establish fiber along Deerfield Valley Road and Marble Valley Road proposing fiber-to-the-home connections along the route. Estimated cost of \$233,000.

If the Committee proceeds with a recommendation, the following will be provided at the Board meeting:

- Map of project areas
- Identify number of households/businesses served
- Identify survey responses
- Review FCC data to identify other providers/speeds reported as provided

This additional data will allow the Board to examine the projects further and consider the Committee's recommendation to submit an application(s). Public comment will also be taken into consideration.

The Department of Motor Vehicles sells the Animal Friendly ticense plate, which is authorized by Virginia Code, \$46.2-749.2:7, as part of its special license plate program. This plate is issued to supporters of dog and cat sterilization programs at a cost of \$25.00 per year in addition to the prescribed fee for vehicle registration. After the first 1,000 sets of plates are sold, \$15.00 of each fee is made available to the locality in which the vehicle is registered, to be used to support sterilization programs for dogs and cats. This money is set aside in a special fund titled the Dog and Cat Sterilization Fund for distribution to localities, regardless of the amount of funds involved. For Fiscal Year 2018, DMV's records indicate that your locality is due \$1,965.00 from this Fund.

Virginia Code §46.2-749.2:7 requires each locality to certify that this money will be used to support sterilization of dogs and cats. If your locality does not have a program for this purpose, the statute provides the locality options. You may make the funds available to any private, nonprofit sterilization program for dogs and cats in your locality or decline receipt of funds. Any funds that are declined shall be distributed to other affected localities on a pro rata basis.

Attached to this letter is a form to make your choice pertaining to the amount stated above. Complete the form and return it no later than December 14, 2018, to:

At a regular meeting of the Augusta County Board of Supervisors held on Wednesday, September 12, 2018, at 7:00 p.m., at the Government Center, Verona, Virginia, and in the 243rd year of the Commonwealth....

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Chairman Garber welcomed the citizens present.

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The following students from Riverheads High School led the Board of Supervisors in the Pledge of Allegiance:

Trinity Obaugh is a senior and the President of the SCA. She plans to attend James Madison University and study nursing.

Stephan Hanley is a senior and co Vice President of the SCA. He plans to join the Naval Academy or attend the Virginia Military Institute after graduation.

Taegan Duncan is a senior and co Vice President of the SCA. She hopes to attend Tulane University in New Orleans with an undecided major.

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Michael Shull, Supervisor for the Riverheads District, delivered the invocation.

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V R ASSOCIATES, INC.

This being the day and time advertised to consider a request by V R Associates, Inc. for a Special Use Permit to have more than one (1) floor of apartments above a business for a total of three (3) floors of apartments on property they own, located on the east side of Route 11, Lee Highway, approximately 0.2 miles north of the intersection of Route 11 and Weyers Cave Road (Route 256) in Weyers Cave in the North River District.

Leslie Tate, Planner, showed a map of the property. The parcet has business zoning in the front and multifamily residential zoning behind. Through an administrative permit, the business is permitted to have one floor of apartments above the business. The request is to allow them to have two additional floors for a total of three floors. The applicant applied to rezone the property from General Business and Multifamily to only

V R ASSOCIATES, INC. (CONT'D)

Multifamily in April 2018, which was denied by the Board of Supervisors. The Staff report for the rezoning request stated that the combination of business development along Route 11 and Multifamily residential behind was more in keeping with the community mixed use designation of the parcel and the Comprehensive Plan. The request to combine apartments with commercial development is more in keeping with the proposed future land use designation. For the portion that is currently zone General Business, the concept sketch shows two buildings that would have approximately 10,500 square feet of commercial space in each building and three stories of apartments over each. This would be 36 units on each building

Ray Burkholder of Balser Associates stated that at the time the option of adding residential floors was not available. This is a good compromise and are able to keep the business viable.

Ms. Tate clarified that with the Special Use Permit there is a condition identified that the applicant submit a site plan meeting the requirements of the site plan contents be approved and then operating conditions would be that the applicant be permitted to have a total of three floors above a ground floor devoted to business. The applicant must obtain all building permits and provide a copy to the Community Development Department.

The Chairman declared the public hearing to be open.

There being no speakers, the Chairman declared the public hearing closed.

Dr. Pattie moved, seconded by Ms. Bragg, that the Board approve the request for the Special Use Permit with the conditions by Staff.

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MATTERS TO BE PRESENTED BY THE PUBLIC

Tracy Pyles made the following statement:

First thank you for making it crystal clear that the Board no longer has its long time protector of the taxpayer, me. Can't be missed or denied. And it is a legacy I am very proud of. Not that the taxes never went above \$.58 but rather we accomplished the needs of the County without imposing further on the taxpayer.

In my absence, at your first opportunity you look the tax rate to a place it had not been in fiving memory. The fourth vote, the deciding vote, came from the Pastures Supervisor, it would not have happened had I still been seated.

For me it seems you never did your homework, never really understood where the County was financially, prior to raising rates. From the outside it appears a tax increase was agreed upon, early on and prior to having data. Likely it was the driver in denying a true conservative, then Vice-Chairman Supervisor Kelly, the Chairmanship

So how would I have prevented the tax rise other than just my vote? I would have said first "run the numbers" meaning take the revenues Year to Date and extrapolate to the year's end. Update the projected FY 17 revenue estimates with the actuals for a better understanding of revenue trends. That wou'd have resulted in two new and better data points. One, a better understanding of what the year-end balance might be and two, more accurate revenue projections for FY19.

MATTERS TO BE PRESENTED BY THE PUBLIC - TRACY PYLES (CONT'D)

I did this, using just county website resources, in April. I published my findings in the News Virginian and the News Leader. I wrote that you were understating revenue by nearly two and a half million dollars. Not one of you rose to call me out on it. You knew from years of sitting with me that I likely had solid evidence to support my conclusions. And yet you went forward.

It appeared your goal was the rise of taxes, rather than just finding a way to fund your increases. The justification for the tax increase was stated as a 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ % teacher pay raise and an increase in capital reserves.

This justification was later undermined when you chose, on the next breath after increasing taxes, to double the proposed education funding at the expense of proposed increases in capital balances. "Balt and Switch" came first to mind just before the realization that you had become just another group of dreary politicians who will say anything to get what they want. And then do whatever they want once they have their way.

This duplicity would not have gone unchallenged had I still been on the Board.

However the supposed needs of capital reserves, were from the beginning, a ruse to justify a tax increase, twould have reminded the 5 of you, who supported the building of the courthouse without a tax increase, to review how we had intended to do that.

Our capital reserves are healthy given all that has already been accomplished. But should there actually be a pressing need, that fully consumes the reserves, an eventual tax increase could be enacted. The costs of a 30 year structure need to be spread out over years and not overly put upon today's mortal taxpayers.

Added to the ignoring of potential year end balances, understating potential revenue, and ignoring surplus assets, was your choice not to take notice of the elephant in the room, namely "reassessment".

Public enlightenment was appropriate in terms of how those changes could impact the FY19 Budget. But reminding the people of this impending event would have caused a questioning of the wisdom of your tax increase in a year of property value changes.

You will know later this year what the change will be. If values are falling you could raise the rate next year and still get an increase in FY19, If values were rising, leaving the \$58 alone would have given you even more funds to go with all the underestimations and discounting of existing values.

For me it is one thing to understate revenue but quite another to, in essence, overstate the well-being of those you intend to dispossess of a portion of their hard earned wages, their meager retirement stipends, or their savings. Or to abuse the gentle nature of our people with smarmy statements that "they understand" when speaking about how the people consider tax increases.

Did you even stop to think about how many of your taxpayers are on Social Security? Do you even know that fully 25% of Augusta taxpayers receive SS checks? And that their monthly check increases are based on a COLA that hardly keeps up with actual cost of living increases? Since January 2010 the collective increases have totaled 10.8%. But even those limited improvements were largely offset with Medicare Part B increases. So the county's nearly 9% increase is not a nothing and when coupled say with a 10% rise in values the net of 19% is a real something.

There are only so many Walmart greeter jobs or McDonald table wiping opportunities available to my over 70 crowd.

And what were you thinking to impose additional burden on every farmer in our county? This increase of levy is on land that already generates revenue without demands on county services.

You have heard it said to "make hay while the sun shines". There hasn't been all that much sun this summer instead we have had an overabundance of dark skies and heavy rains. Not all crops have survived torrential rains and those that have still may not be successfully and fully harvested when bogged down in unrefenting mud.

Mother Nature is beyond man's control and the farm community understands and can make peace with that. But when they have done all they can to keep their heads above water and then Washington causes markets to disappear with tariff gamesmanship and then Verona causes more of their money to evaporate, it can be too much when it is not simply unfair.

So in raising property taxes you have put your wants ahead of the needs of so many of our most vulnerable and valuable residents

Fairness and right thinking demands that you reverse the tax increase and return the funds, immediately if you believe there are people who think the county deserves more of their money, propose to them returning their rebate checks for deposit in a need of their choice. Schools, Capital Reserves, or say Economic Development.

In my first term I had our attorney (Ed Plunkett) draw up a Voluntary Tax Agreement for all those who thought, as some did, that our taxes were "embarrassingly low". But the Board was not then ready for the ridicule in setting up a structure for voluntary taxation.

But you may be. If you truly believe that the people are eager to pay more, that they "understand" that the County Is running short, it may be time to initiate a formal way to receive these funds that await only asking. I am betting it is not.

The betting surely is that you will not do the right thing and rebate these unnecessary takes. I understand it is difficult to admit carelessness. It has been said that "it is never too late to do the right thing". As Melania has suggested, "Be Better".

I remember a time this Board was facing the problem of an unreasonable reassessment, at the very time

of the great recession. I put to vote that we toss out the errant numbers in favor of the existing values. I lost 1 to 6 but unsurprisingly after the next election only 1 of the 6 was still in office. You unjustifiably take money from the people at your own risk.

VCSB PERFORMANCE AGREEMENT

The Board considered the Performance Agreement for the Valley Community Services Board.

Dave Deering, Director of Valley Community Services Board, has three reasons for presenting at the meeting. The first reason is to provide a quick over view and orientation to Valley Community Services Board. The second reason is to inform every one of the services that have been provided to the residents of Augusta County so far this year. The third reason is to review the Performance Contract Agreement that has to occur between the Department of Developmental Service, the Behavioral Health and Developmental Services and Valley Community Services. Valley Community Services was established in 1971 with a mission to provide community based mental health, developmental disability, and substance use disorder services to the citizens in Augusta County, Highland County, City of Waynesboro and City of Staunton. A Board of Director is appointed by each of the localities for a total of 16 members. Each member can serve two, three year terms and then must rotate off the Board for at least one year. Mr. Deering reviewed the structure of the Board of Directors. Valley Community Services is funded by State general funds, local matching funds minimum of 10% from the localities served, Federal Block grants and billable services proved to beneficiaries of Medicaid/Medicare and other 3rd party commercial payers. Twenty-eight percent of the revenues come from the total of the State and local funds, 3% comes from the Federals grants, and 69% comes from The FY2019 budget is services to clients who are Medicaid beneficiaries. \$24,289,992.34. This is a break even budget every year. Valley Community Services has approximately 261 full and part time clinical and support staff with the vast majority being in clinical roles and 13% is in administrative roles. There are six locations serving the Staunton and Waynesboro area and are mandated to provide Emergency Services and Case Management, but they provide other services as well. In FY2018 1,409 Augusta County residents received services in mental health, children mental health, developmental services and substance use disorder. All services provided by SCB's are operated under the auspices of a Performance Contract between individual CSB's and the Virginia Department of Behavioral Health & Developmental Services or DBHDS. DBHDS and VCSB enter into this contract for the purpose of funding services provided directly or contractually by VCSB in a manner that ensures accountability of VCSB to DBHDS for the quality and cost of care for individuals receiving services. There are three parts to the agreement, contract, administrative and partnership. The contract will be in effect for a term of two years, beginning on July 1, 2018 and ending on June 30, 2020. By State Code the funding should be 90% given by the State and 10% by the localities that are serviced. For FY2019, the local match is \$513,106.00 which is equivalent to 7.36%. A waiver is submitted each year asking the state to except the percentage given by the localities in lieu of the 10% required.

Dr. Pattle asked if the waivers were granted for the wait list, would the additional work load be handled properly.

Mr. Deering stated that the case managers have a heavy workload, but it would not stop them. The challenge would be taken.

VCSB PERFORMANCE AGREEMENT (CONT'D)

Ms. Bragg asked what happens if the waiver regarding the 10% local match is not approved.

Mr. Deering stated that what the state would like to happen is when the localities see the shortfall the locality will add to their match to make it up.

Ms. Carter has taken time to review the services offers. She if amazed at the number of clients being seen and the number of services provided. Ms. Carter encourages the Board to approve funding the \$70,000.00, to meet the 10% match.

Mr. Fitzgerald cautions that if the County pays the full amount and Staunton and Waynesboro do not pay the full amount, a waiver will still be required. Staunton and Waynesboro's intentions are to write a letter requesting a waiver. In the past, funding has increased to the Community Services Board by 63%. The 10% match has never been met. A letter has been drafted explaining why Augusta County is not able to meet 10% match requirement.

Ms. Carter would like for Staff to review the budget closely and try to find a way to meet the 10% match.

Mr. Coleman stated that the Board has to be mindful of other items that have been denied due to budgeting Issues.

Ms. Bragg suggested notifying the other localities of the Board's desire to fund the full amount for next year.

Mr. Garber asked that a motion not be presented at this time. This will allow more time for thought and review of the budget.

Mr. Fitzgerald stated the only action needed at this time is to approve the Performance Agreement.

Dr. Pattie moved, seconded by Ms. Bragg that the Board approve Performance Agreement.

Mr. Fitzgerald stated that a request has been made by the Valley Community Services Board for the County to present a letter giving reasons why the 10% match will not be met. This letter will allow Mr. Deering to submit the waiver request. The deadline for waiver submittal is Friday, September 14, 2018.

The Board is in favor of Mr. Fitzgerald signing the letter and sending it to Mr. Deering.

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SSAR COMPREHENSIVE STORMWATER AGREEMENT

The Board considered the VDOT Stormwater Management Agreement for secondary street acceptance.

Timothy K. Fitzgerald, County Administrator, stated that VDOT has revised their secondary street requirements. The new agreement states that when a new subdivision is built the adequate drainage will be built as well. Anything outside of the right-of-way is not VDOT's responsibility.

Mr. Coleman wants to make sure that things are clear on whose responsibility it is.

Mr. Shull asked if there could be an agreement for developers.

Mr. Fitzgerald stated that there is currently an agreement in place.

Ms. Bragg moved, seconded by Mr. Coleman that the Board approve the Stormwater management Agreement.

Mr. Garber stated there has been a request to meet with the Commonwealth Attorney regarding a pay increase for an open position within his office.

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Dr. Pattie stated that this is the same position that has been additionally funded previously.

Mr. Fitzgerald stated that Mr. Martin would like to advertise the position at \$90,000.00. The difference in county funding from today to the increased amount is \$13,337.00. This number is based on funding received from the Compensation Board. The position currently is listed as \$89,189.00 and the county was reimbursed \$67,572.00 which makes the County's funding \$21,617.00. If the salary increases to \$90,000.00, the Compensation Board funding will drop to \$55,046.00. The person previously in the position was considered a Career Prosecutor which entitled him to 9.3% more funding from the Compensation Board. The county funding would increase to \$34,954.00.

After Board discussion, the Board agreed that the position should be advertised at the current salary.

MATTERS TO BE PRESENTED BY THE BOARD (CONT'D)

Mr. Garber is pleased with how everyone involved with preparation for Humicane Florence worked together and got the job done. It's important to be mindful of putting information out publically and make sure the information is correct.

Mr. Fitzgerald stated that a resolution has been prepared to declare a local emergency for Augusta County in preparation of Hurricane Florence. This resolution will help with funding that will come from FEMA. At the end of the event there will be another resolution declaring the end of the emergency.

The Board considered the following resolution for Declaration of Local Emergency:

Staff and the Planning Commission have recommended approval with the proffer.

Ray Burkholder of Balser and Associates, applicant representative, stated that the uses have been limited to try to offset VDOT concerns with traffic and turn lanes. The site currently has a septic field on the property that services the existing building.
