The Fire-Rescue Grant Committee reviewed the March 2019 round of grant requests. The committee reviewed three applications totaling \$99,124.69 in requests. The committee is recommending approving the total request.

The total for the tools and equipment exceed \$50,000. **Exception:** Copies of acceptance and invoices for the item(s) purchased be forwarded to Augusta County Fire-Rescue prior to sending the agency the Board approved amount, will pay the exact amount of the invoices up to \$50,000.

Swoope Volunteer Fire Company – Request \$49,124.69 – **Committee Recommendation: Fund this request -\$49,124.69.** The request had two parts: Matching grant fund for forestry grant received for forestry equipment, the second part of the request is for updated equipment to outfit their new engine expected in May. **Exception:** Copies of acceptance and invoices for the item(s) purchased be forwarded to Augusta County Fire-Rescue prior to sending the agency the Board approved amount, will pay the exact amount of the invoices up to \$49,124.69.

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2018 REVOLVING LOAN REQUEST

The Board considered the committee's recommendation of a revolving loan for Swoope Volunteer Fire Company in the amount of \$500,000.00.

Timothy Fitzgerald, County Administrator, stated this is a request to approve a loan for the Swoope Volunteer Fire Company for a new fire engine. The loan would be for \$500,000.00 and 60% is repayable back to the county.

Ms. Carter moved, seconded by Dr. Pattie, that the Board approve the committee's recommendation of the revolving loan for Swoope Volunteer Fire Company.

RESCUE SQUAD ASSISTANCE FUND GRANT

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AUGUSTA SOLAR, LLC SPECIA USE PERMIT

This being the day and time advertised to consider the proposed solar energy facility in the Stuarts Draft area.

Leslie Tate, Planner, stated the Comprehensive Plan for Augusta County has a planning policy area and future land use map. This is used by Staff to evaluate all rezoning and special use permit requests that are required for development proposals according to Augusta County code. Ms. Tate showed a map on the screen of the Urban Service Areas, this area has both public water and sewer or it is envisioned to have both within the timeframe of the plan. The Community Development areas were shown as well. These are a growth area, but at a much lower density. They have public water or public sewer but not both. The Rural and Conservations areas of the Comprehensive Plan were pointed out. The County does not envision having public utilities and no large scale development is foreseen. A map of the project was displayed and shows the fence lines of the project. Development in the Urban Service Area is expected to be compact, interconnected, pedestrian oriented, remain sensitive to the context of the surrounding development and natural features. The Comprehensive Plan states for the Community Development areas that they be local community settlements which have existing public water or public sewer in place and have good potential for extensions of either of the two utilities. These are areas that are appropriate locations for future low density, one half to one unit an acre, rural land uses based upon road access, the existing land use pattern and proximity to existing public facilities and services. A map was shown of the project in relationship to the current zonings. Each fence line has been broken into a site so there are 22 sites included in this project. Route 340, Hull School Road, Wayne Avenue, Cisco Lane, Lipscomb Road, Lyndhurst Road, Benz Road and Shalom Road are all considered access roads for the various sites. Since the project fronts on several road ways and does not have contiguous borders in all cases, staff has evaluated the project by fence line to provide feedback concerning the character of the area adjacent to each fence line and adjacent zoning as well as Comprehensive Plan Future Land Use Designations. Ms. Tate gave a brief over view of each site and showed an aerial of each site.

Tom Kleine, Virginia Attorney and representative of the applicant, stated that last year, after months of discussion and a recommendation from the Planning Commission, the Board adopted an ordinance permitting this type of use. It's classified as a large solar

energy system to be located in the County on property zoned agriculture subject to the issuance of a special use permit. Typically under the ordinance such permits are granted by the Board of Zoning Appeals, but under the amendment adopted with respect to this type of use, it granted the approval authority for these types of uses to the Board of Supervisors. Many of the owners of the parcels that are subject to this application attended and participated in the deliberations effecting the development of this ordinance. After a series of hearings and meetings, it was well known at the time, that those property owners were working on a project in this portion of the County to develop a solar project that would ultimately come forward to the Board pursuant to the terms of the ordinance where it was ultimately adopted. The ordinance that was adopted is consistent with the Virginia Energy Plan which is codified in the state code and clearly states that it shall be the policy of the Commonwealth of Virginia to "promote the generation of electricity through technologies that do not contribute to greenhouse gasses and global warming. The ordinance has a number of requirements that have to be included in an application to safe guard the community and address concerns associated with any type of use. For example, the holding of a community meeting prior to submitting the application, which is completed. It requires that public notices not just be sent to adjacent properties, but to everyone within a mile of the project before the actual filing and consideration of the application. A Site Plan, Cost Benefit Analysis and significant other criteria governing the buffering, landscaping and decommissioning of the project was also submitted. The issue of appropriate setbacks has also been addressed during previous meetings. They have also worked closely with Staff in developing a number of conditions associated with the application. Consistent with the zoning ordinance, this property is located entirely on property that is zoned general agriculture. It has been general agriculture for some time, it has been in the same families for many years and the families intend to keep it in general agriculture. This is not a proposed rezoning. This is a special use permit. The property owners have common goals of keeping the properties in the same classification and in the family. They are also looking for a way to use their property in a way that compliments the current uses of their property and compliments what is going on in that area of the County. The property owners are also familiar with the language in the Comprehensive Plan. This proposed project is for 125 megawatts of electricity through the capture of sunlight through solar panels. These panels will be no taller than eight feet and that's when they are at their full tilt. They produce no audible noise, no reflection, no odors, no lights and no traffic. This is an extremely low intensity use. An overview of proposed future uses was heard and every one of them is taller than eight feet tall, has noise, has lights and has traffic accompanying with it. In addition to the setback and buffering, these properties aren't utilizing the entirety of the parcels that are subject to this application. There is significant land available for future development that is not a part of this project and is compatible with the long term goals of the County. The utility lines have been a topic of discussion. There is nothing about this project that interferes with the existing infrastructure. The current utility lines provide access to surrounding and future development when and if it would ever occur on these properties. Nothing about this project is going to interfere with the existing lines or the ability for future development to tie in. Even if the project was constructed and on the ground, there is still another 750 acres designated under the land use plan for future industrial development that would be available for future development. There is approximately an additional 1,750 acres of other land, in addition to the future industrial classification that is not developed, but would be available for future mixed use development under the plan. There is already significant economic projects in the area and even if this project was constructed there would be plenty of space for potentially 13 additional projects. According to state code section 15.2.2232 this project is substantially in accord with the adopted Comprehensive Plan or a part thereof. Right now the property is zoned agriculture and the County's zoning ordinance allows

property that is zoned agricultural to request a special use permit. There is no proposal by any of the property owners to rezone this property to a different classification. It is also important to look at the Comprehensive Plan and what it says about people in this situation where there may be a land use designation, but they are wanting something allowed under the current ordinance. The ordinance states that it's important to understand that the policy set forth in the Comprehensive Plan are not land use regulations and are not requirements for future development. It is the current zoning ordinance that determines the type of nature of development within the policy planning areas in any other zoned portion of the County. The Comprehensive Plan policy areas, future land uses and densities are guidelines referred to by the Planning Commission when considering a rezoning. This is not a rezoning. This land is zoned agriculture and proposed to stay agriculture. This language is not the applicant's nor the property owners. This is directly out of the Comprehensive Plan for Augusta County. The Comprehensive Plan also states that in regulating development, insure that the overall long term common good is kept in balance with the individual landowner.

Tom Anderson, Community Energy, gave a brief introduction of his company. Community Energy started as a wind energy developer and has developed more than 700 megawatts of solar projects from small community projects to projects of this scale. Augusta Solar will be constructed on a single axis tracking system, 4-5 feet tall with a max of 8 feet tall. Conditions include buffering and landscaping, grass cover with pollinators, decommissioning and restoration plan with security and emergency responder coordination and training. A healthy grass system wards off run off. There is a professional buffer landscape plan. A buffer height as planned would hide the site. Related studies and permits and approvals for County, state, Federal and electrical grid are being performed. Solar is a quiet neighbor, sustainable land use, secure income, increased tax revenue, economic benefit and operations and maintenance jobs. Mr. Anderson appreciates the Board's time and hopes for a good vote.

Boyce Brannock, Attorney with Timberlake Smith Firm and the landowner representative, stated that the property owners are not faceless and are not asking for a rezoning. The owners want the land to remain agricultural. That is the purpose in having a lease and not selling the property. The special use request conforms to the Comprehensive Plan. The request does not shift or change the tax burden of the citizen. The goal is to keep agricultural land available for future agricultural use. The County loses nothing by approving this application. Approval of this project helps with future planning. It helps by allowing the County to better understand and focus where development will occur.

The Chairman declared the public hearing to be open.

Blaine Piper, 34 Jesten Court Stuarts Draft, is in opposition of the project. He is concerned with the chemical makeup of the panels and how the project will affect his property value.

Bobby Fisher, 29 Kennedy Ridge Court, is in opposition of the project. Tax dollars were used to install the water and sewer lines.

Karen Sikorski, 163 Benz Road Waynesboro, is in opposition of the project. Solar is expensive and heavily subsidized.

Andrea Popick, 16 Cranberry Dr. Stuarts Draft, is in opposition of the project. The Blue Ridge Parkway will be impacted with the view of solar panels. She is also concerned with how solar will impact the wildlife.

Edward Long, 140 New Hope and Crimora Road, is not for or against the project. A study was completed in 2015 for the year, 193 panels had an output power less than the average. He would like the Board to consider having a technical field evaluation study done for one year.

Scott Kresge, 163 Benz Road Waynesboro, is in opposition of the project. He showed a video of a solar farm in Essex County.

Joyce Joswick, 40 Canada Court Stuarts Draft, is in opposition of the project.

Albert Joswick, 40 Canada Court Stuarts Draft, is in opposition of the project. The solar panel company will ruin the area.

Russell Dean, 228 Labelle Drive Stuarts Draft, is in opposition of the project. Augusta County has done a great job of bringing jobs to the County. The solar farm will produce jobs to build it, but then they will not be needed.

Stan Sikorski, 169 Benz Road Waynesboro, is in opposition of the project. The Comprehensive Plan is a fundamental document and should be followed as designed. CES solar project does not support the Comprehensive Plan.

Rick Pfizenmayer, 30 Round Hill Drive Stuarts Draft, is in opposition of the project. He is concerned with the land and its purpose. Approval of the project would make the county a dumping ground for other projects. There is also a substantial variance in the Comprehensive Plan.

Monica Henry, 78 Mallory Circle Fishersville, is concerned with the future in other areas if this is approved.

Dennis Henry, 78 Mallory Circle Fishersville, is looking to buy land and a new home, but will not purchase in Stuarts Draft if the solar project is approved.

Dean Anderson, 28 Queens Court Stuarts Draft, is concerned with what the panels are made of and how efficient they are. Solar should be placed away from populated areas.

Susan Anderson, 28 Queens Court Stuarts Draft, is in opposition of the project. She is concerned with future unknown health risks. She is also concerned with diminishing property values. Ms. Anderson requests that the Board do plenty of research and learn facts of negative effects.

Brian Burns, 9 Canada Court, is in opposition of the project. Approving this project could be the biggest economic and environmental disaster ever seen. It does not benefit the community.

Lisa Burns, 9 Canada Court, is in opposition of the project. Health concerns are an issue. There are many unknowns regarding the project. Property values could be affected.

Robert Adkins, 20 Old Oak Drive Stuarts Draft, is in opposition of the project. Property values is a concern and there is no marginal benefit.

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AUGUSTA SOLAR, LLC SPECIAL USE PERMIT (CONT'D)

Zac Collins, student at Waynesboro High School, is learning about renewable energy. The solar project could potentially bring new jobs to the area. The Board needs to think about future generations.

Katelyn Sizemore, student at Waynesboro High School, Solar energy is renewable. It is a good choice. Going from fossil fuels to solar energy would be a good decision.

James Steele, student at Waynesboro High School, stated solar does not cause destruction to the earth, it helps it. Renewable energy will disappear eventually.

Michael Moneymaker, 201 Alta Drive Stuarts Draft, is in opposition of the project. There are more facts needed and focus needs to be on the part thereof from the Comprehensive Plan.

Jake Wyszynski, student at Waynesboro High School, agrees with Zach Collins.

Carson Lawhorne, student at Waynesboro High School, this is a big opportunity and the County should go for it.

Jonathan Miles, Albemarle County, is a Professor in Integrated Science. The County needs to diversify and expand. The community is in good hands and supports the project.

Rocky Flesher, 162 Shalom Road, is in favor of the project.

Lou Gage, 367 Forest Springs Drive Stuarts Draft, complimented the county on a well done Comprehensive Plan. Thirty years of a special use permit is in fact rezoning. The Board needs to look at the decision very carefully.

Martha Moneymaker, 201 Alta Drive Stuarts Draft, is in opposition of the project. The county should be committed to development through the Comprehensive Plan.

John Avellone, is in opposition of the project. This will open the door for more solar companies to come into the county.

Tim Quillen, 2500 Lyndhurst Road, is in favor of the project. It will bring in revenue and conserves the land. The panels are effectively screened by buffers. This is a positive for the county, community and environment.

Bob Nutt, 324 E. Beverley St Staunton, is in favor of the project. The landowner has a right to do what they want with their land

Tray Day, 209 Cisco Lane Stuarts Draft, is in favor of the project. It is a better alternative than other developments.

Laurie Day, 209 Cisco Lane Stuarts Draft, enjoys her land. She would like land to be farmed forever, but that can't happen. The farmers need another source of income. Ms. Day supports the landowner's rights and supports this project.

Theresa Blimovich, 62 Warren Oaks Lane Waynesboro, respects the landowner's rights, but is concerned about the impact on property value.

James Kindig, 115 King Lane Waynesboro, is in favor of the project to diversify their farm. It is not conclusive that property values will be affected. He has acquired 93 signatures on a petition in support of the project.

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AUGUSTA SOLAR, LLC SPECIA USE PERMIT (CONT'D)

Gloria Stump, 41 Stump Lane Waynesboro, is in opposition of the project. This will make a huge impact for the future.

Charles Hotcavec, 533 Shalom Road Waynesboro, is in favor of the project. A massive development requires more of everything.

Anthony Stollenmaier, 25 Mahogany Drive Stuarts Draft, stated that property value is a concern. He suggests increasing the boundary line for buffering.

Steven Mumbauer, 127 Cathey's River Lane Mount Sidney, is a small business owner. He is an advocate for landowner rights and solar power. The farmers are getting older.

Michele Kresge, 163 Benz Road, is in opposition of the project. The Comprehensive Plan is specific and should not be ignored. This is not good for Augusta County.

Vann Vernier, 384 Shalom Road, is in favor of the project. He has a good understanding of how solar works.

Phil Sandridge, 409 Calf Mountain Road, is in favor of the project. He supports the project for landowner rights and it's a good opportunity for the County.

Stephen Tallent, 57 Kennedy Ridge Court Stuarts Draft, enjoys a farming community. He questions whether solar should be near a residential neighborhood. Property value is a concern and uncertainty is an issue.

Bob Roy, 273 Alla Drive Stuarts Draft, is in opposition of the project due to the visual impact it will have. Consider making the best buffer and consider cleanup. Who will assume the cost?

Rebecca Angelo, 26 East High Street Stuarts Draft, is in opposition of the project. She is overwhelmed with the number of sites involved with the project.

Bradley Tipler, 104 Hall School Road, is in favor of the project.

Jill Reed, 1202 Simmons Gap Road Dyre, is in favor of the project. Her family owns a farm and the landowner rights should count.

Paula Martin, 223 Cisco Lane Stuarts Draft, is in favor of the project.

Morgan Liddick, 883 Cold Springs Road Stuarts Draft, is in opposition of the project. It will be problematic for the community. There is a concern regarding property values. She suggest approving the project partially.

Monica Blessing, 37 Canada Court Stuarts Draft, is in opposition of the project. It does not make sense for this area.

Frank Nolen, 680 Patterson Mill, does not believe the Board has reason to deny the special use permit. With the Planning Commission finding the special use permit to be in accord with the Comprehensive Plan or at least in part thereof, the only out may be the question of adverse impact on the surrounding neighborhood. With no definition of an adverse impact or surrounding neighborhood in the ordinance, it is hard to imagine a legal defense for denial. The solar farm may draw sufficient attention from the Blue Ridge Parkway. It could become a landmark and show what 1000 acres looks like from the parkway. As far as impact on the Service Authority's

**AN ORDINANCE TO
TO AMEND CHAPTER 25 ZONING
DIVISION A. IN GENERAL**

**ARTICLE IV. SIGNS, BILLBOARDS AND OUTDOOR ADVERTISING STRUCTURES
OF THE AUGUSTA COUNTY CODE**

WHEREAS, the Augusta County Board of Supervisors has deemed it desirable to amend Article IV of the Augusta County Code so as to eliminate the definition of and removal timeframe reference of Agricultural and Forestal District signs, reduce the size of a single off-premise advertising sign in General Agriculture, and reduces the size of a single on and off-premise advertising sign in Business, Industrial, and Public Use Overlay zoning district, and

WHEREAS, the Augusta County Board of Supervisors has established a provision for a waiver of the individual sign maximum size; and

WHEREAS, the Augusta County Board of Supervisors has prohibited signs that produce or emit sound;

NOW THEREFORE be it resolved by the Board of Supervisors for Augusta County that Article IV of the Augusta County be amended as follows:

CHAPTER 25. ZONING

DIVISION A. IN GENERAL

ARTICLE IV. Signs, billboards and outdoor advertising structures

§ 25-40. Applicability.

These regulations shall govern and control the erection, remodeling enlarging, moving, maintenance and operation of all exterior signs within all zoning districts established by this article.

§ 25-41. Definitions.

Sign. Any exterior display of any letter, words, numerals, figures, devices, emblems, pictures, or any parts or combinations thereof, by any means whereby the same are made visible for the purpose of making anything known, whether such display be made on, attached to, or as part of a structure, surface or any other thing, including, but not limited to, vehicles, buildings, barns, the ground, any rock, tree, or other natural object, which display is visible beyond the boundaries of the parcel of land on which the same is located.

Sign area. The total copy area devoted to conveying a message including any border and trim, but excluding ornamental base or apron supports and other structural members. Where signs employ appurtenances such as "pop-ups" and "cut-outs" or objects that extend beyond the normal copy area, the area of such appurtenances shall be measured separately and included in the total sign area. The total sign area for a double faced sign or "V" type sign shall be measured on the largest face of the sign, however, advertising or other copy may be posted on both sides of such sign.

Advertising sign, off-premises. A sign which directs attention to a business, commodity, activity, service or product not conducted, sold or offered upon the premises where such sign is located. For the purposes of this section, billboards are considered to be off-premises advertising signs.

Advertising sign, on-premises. A sign which directs attention to a business, profession, commodity, service or entertainment sold or offered upon the premises where such sign is located or to which it is attached. Includes "coming soon" and "future home of" signs.

Banner sign. Any sign intended to be hung either with or without frames, possessing characters, letters, illustrations, or ornamental designs applied to paper, plastic, or fabric of any kind. National flags, flags of political subdivisions and symbolic flags of any institution or

business and decorative flags shall not be considered banners for the purpose of this article.

Construction sign. Any sign giving the name or names of principal contractors, architects, engineers, landscape architects, or other such professional persons, and lending institutions responsible for the lawful construction, alteration, remodeling or demolition on the site where the sign is placed. Such signs shall be limited to one listing for each person or organization involved, and such signs shall be removed within thirty (30) days after the issuance of the Certificate of Occupancy or within thirty (30) days of completion of a demolition project.

Directional sign. An off-premises sign, one end of which may be pointed or on which an arrow may be painted, indicating the direction and/or distance to a business, church, school, hospital, park, scenic or historic place or other places of acknowledged public interest, and containing no other advertising. Approval for such sign must be obtained from the Zoning Administrator in residential areas only, who will grant approval only upon the showing by the applicant that the applicant cannot otherwise reasonably direct customers to the location.

Directional sign, business. An on-premises sign, interior to the business development or complex, one end of which may be pointed, or on which an arrow may be painted, which states only the name and location of businesses or professions. This definition includes development in a Multi-family Residential District.

Farm sign. A sign displayed on any farm by the owner or other operator thereof for the purpose of identifying such farm.

Farm product sign. A sign or signs identifying the produce, crops, animals or poultry raised or quartered on the property.

Freestanding sign. Any sign which is supported by structures or supports in or upon the ground and independent of support from any building. Freestanding signs include but are not limited to pole, directory, pylon, and ground signs.

Government/ Public Use sign. Signs erected and maintained by or under the direction of local, state or federal governmental authorities, and any lawful road name and any number sign regardless of whether it is publicly or privately erected. Such signs may contain "danger" or "warning" messages required by governmental or other authorities.

Home occupation sign. A sign permitted in association with an occupation conducted on the premises within a dwelling unit that is clearly a secondary use of the property.

Identification Sign. A permanent sign announcing the name of a subdivision, group housing project, locality, church, school, park, or other public or quasi-public structure or facility located on the premises.

Political campaign sign. A sign used to advertise or promote a candidate for public office or referencing an issue on the ballot in a forth-coming election or primary provided that the sign will be removed within ten (10) days after the election.

Portable sign. Any sign not permanently attached to the ground, a structure or any other sign. The sign area of portable signs count towards the total sign area allowed.

Public services sign. A sign advertising only the name, time and place of any bona fide fair, carnival, festival, bazaar, horse show or similar event when conducted by a public agency or for the benefit of any civic, fraternal, religious or charitable cause provided that the sign will be removed within ten (10) days after the end of the event to which it refers.

Pylon/directory sign, on-premises. A sign on which the name of the development and the names and locations of occupants or the uses of a building or group of buildings is listed.

Pylon/directory sign, off-premises. A sign on which the name of the development and the names and locations of occupants or the uses of a building or group of buildings not located upon the premises where such sign is located is listed.

Real estate, lead-in sign. A directional sign used to provide directions to real estate for sale, lease or rent. No more than one (1) real estate lead-in sign shall be allowed at any road intersection. No such sign shall contain the name of any company or agent, only "homes for sale" and similar phrases.

Real estate, lot sign. On-site signs advertising the sale, rent or lease of a single dwelling unit, building, or vacant lot containing one acre or less; provided that such signs shall be removed promptly after closing of

the transaction.

Real estate tract sign. On-site signs advertising the sale, rent or lease of more than one acre of land or multiple lots within a subdivision; provided, that such signs shall be neatly painted and maintained, and shall be removed promptly after closing of the transaction of all tracts or lots within the subdivision

Residential identification. A sign on the premises with a dwelling unit, announcing the name, owner, manager or location thereof.

Temporary sign. Any sign, banner, pennant or other advertising medium intended to be displayed for a short period of time (not to exceed sixty (60) days in any one year period) as required by the provisions of this article for permanent signs of the same type. This includes "going out of business" signs. (Ord. 09/28/11)

Yard sale sign. Any sign advertising a special sale by property owners. Such signs shall be removed within three (3) days after the yard sale has been conducted.

§ 25-42. General provisions.

The following restrictions shall apply to all signs in Augusta County:

A. No sign shall be erected or maintained unless it is in compliance with the regulations of this article.

B. There are no height limitations for signs.

C. No sign shall be erected, constructed or maintained so as to obstruct or interfere with required traffic visibility or sight distance.

D. All signs shall be maintained in good condition and appearance. After due notice, if a sign is not restored to good condition and/or appearance, the sign shall be removed at the owner's expense.

E. Signs advertising an activity, business or service which is no longer active or available shall be removed within sixty (60) days of the date of closing or termination of the activity, business or service. All signs not removed after sixty (60) days of the date of closing, termination, removal, or expiration become illegal signs and shall not be considered nonconforming signs.

F. No freestanding advertising sign larger than four square feet shall be permitted within one hundred feet (100') of any lot line in a residential zoned district, unless a waiver is granted by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to the requirements set forth in § 25-42M of this Code. (Ord. 09/28/11)

G. No off-premises advertising sign shall be erected within three hundred feet (300') of a residential zoned district.

H. Along all roadways, other than interstate highways, no off-premises advertising sign shall be larger than two hundred square feet (200 sq. ft.).

I. Along all interstate highways, no off-premises advertising sign shall be larger than two hundred square feet (200 sq. ft.) and no off-premises advertising sign shall be erected closer to any other off-premises advertising sign than two thousand feet (2000') measured on the same side of the right-of-way unless a waiver is granted by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to the requirements set forth in § 25-42M of this Code.

J. Signs or attention-getting devices for adult businesses shall not contain any words or graphics depicting, describing or relating to specified sexual activities or specified anatomical areas, as defined in §6-41 of this Code. (Ord. 04/23/08)

K. A Building Permit for the erection, alteration, or reconstruction of signs may be required.

L. The erection, alteration, or reconstruction of a sign may be subject to approval from the Virginia Department of Transportation.

M. Waivers. The requirements of §25-42F, § 25-42I, and § 25-47.C. (specifically for Advertising,

on-premises individual maximum sign size) may be modified or waived in an individual case if the Board of Supervisors finds that the granting of a modification or waiver will have no adverse impact and the sign is compatible with the neighborhood. In granting a modification or waiver, the Board of Supervisors may impose such conditions as deemed necessary to protect the public health, safety, or welfare. (Ord. 09/28/11)

§ 25-43. Exempt Signs.

The following signs are exempt from the sign regulations:

- A. Gas pumps
- B. Menu boards
- C. Vending machines
- D. Ice Machines
- E. Warning signs such as "no parking, no fishing, and no trespassing"
- F. Park and ride
- G. Signs in ballparks and athletic facilities, including outfields and scoreboards
- H. Government/public use signs
- I. Political
- J. In and out signs at entrances

§ 25-44. Prohibited signs in all districts.

A. No sign, other than government/public use signs or signs erected and maintained by or under the direction of the Virginia Department of Transportation, shall be erected on any dedicated or publicly owned street or road right-of-way.

B. No signs shall be placed on vehicles or trailers which are parked or located for the primary purpose of using the vehicle or trailer as a sign (this does not apply to signs or letters on buses, taxis, or vehicles operating during the normal course of business).

C. No sign shall produce or emit sound of any type.

§ 25-45. Nonconforming signs.

A. No nonconforming sign erected before the effective date of this Chapter shall be enlarged, moved, replaced or repaired at a cost in excess of fifty percent (50%) of its fair market value, unless it shall be brought in compliance with the provisions of this article. All nonconforming signs in any district which are not maintained in a continuous state of good repair and all nonconforming signs which are abandoned for a continuous period of two (2) years shall be removed. For purpose of this Chapter, a sign shall be considered as abandoned if no copy or advertising matter is exhibited on the advertising face of the sign.

B. Should such sign structure be moved for any reason, it shall thereafter conform to the regulations for signs.

§ 25-46. Setbacks.

Signs, where permitted, are not required to meet the setback requirements for the district in which they are located except for the following:

A. No sign shall be so located as to interfere with sight distance for vehicles entering or leaving street intersections, driveways or entrances;

B. Off-premises advertising signs along interstate highways shall be set back a minimum of six

hundred sixty feet (660') from the nearest edge of the right-of-way.

§ 25-47. Maximum sign sizes and maximum number of signs.

Unless the underlying use is not permitted in the zoning district, the following signs shall be permitted. In no case shall the following maximum individual sign sizes or maximum number of signs be exceeded.
