Weyers Cave Library Lease and Infrastructure Allocation

The County is finalizing a lease with Cave Town Properties, LLC for 4,325 square feet of space in a storefront in Weyers Cave. The space will include the main library, office space, a meeting room and restrooms. The term of the lease is for 5 years with an option for two 5 year renewals with a CPI increase at renewal that is capped at a specific dollar amount for the next 5 years. A list of improvements to the property are also included in the lease. It is before the Board to consider the lease, contingent upon County Attorney's review.

In July 2019, the Board of Supervisors approved an allocation of funding from the Middle River Infrastructure for the library station: Capital \$88,050 and Operating \$88,700. It's anticipated that patrons from the North River area will use the facility. Therefore, the North River District is interested in collaborating on the project by assisting with funding for a portion of capital costs requested for the project. It is before the Board for consideration of an Infrastructure allocation of \$15,000. Due to the delayed opening of the library, two months of Middle Rivers operating allocation or \$15,000 will be reallocated to capital costs. The contribution is towards the improvements to the property included in the lease.

This being the day and time advertised to consider a request to amend the Augusta County Comprehensive Plan Future Lan use Map from low Density Residential (1/2 to 1 unit per acre) to Urban Open Space for approximately 160 acres (portion of TMP 043-26 approximately 470 total acres) owned by Gap Valley Farm LLC located at 1957 Buffalo Gap Highway (Rt. 42) on either side of Buffalo Gap Highway north of the intersection of Buffalo Gap Highway and Parkersburg Tumpike (Rt. 254) in Swoope in the Pastures District. This being the day and time advertised to consider a request to amend and restate proffers on approximately 9.7 acres owned by V R Associates located on the east side of Lee Highway, (Rt. 11) and approximately 0.2 of a mile north of the intersection with Lee Highway (Rt. 11) and Weyers Cave Road (Rt. 256) in Weyers Cave in the North River District. The Planning Commission recommends approval with amended proffer to address VDOT.

Ms. Tate stated that the property currently has four proffers. Two of the proffers the applicant is restating the exact same way, but are requesting to amend the other two proffers. Ms. Tate reviewed the two proffers to be amended and the phases that are recommended for construction.

Ray Burkholder of Balser and Associates represents the applicant. He added that there have been a number challenges to the site with utilities and road construction. They are ready for site plan to be approved and move forward with the first phase within the business.

The Chairman declared the public hearing open.

There being no speakers, the Chairman declared the public hearing closed.

ENT NOISE CONTEIN

ORDINANCE AMENDMENT-NOISE CONTROL

This being the day and time advertised to consider an ordinance to amend Chapter 15, Nuisances, Article I. Noise Control. Section 15-9, Unnecessary Noises Enumerated.

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Ms. Tate stated that this is an ordinance amendment. This is not in the zoning ordinance so there will not be a Planning Commission recommendation. It is in the noise control article of the chapter. This amendment prohibits, in all zoning districts, the use of air cannons, carbide cannons, or other loud explosive devices which are designed to produce high intensity sound percussions for the purpose of repelling birds. The code of Virginia section references the authority of the State for the County to prohibit or regulate that specific use.

The Chairman declared the public hearing open.

Clay Trainum, 1100 Rockfish Road, Waynesboro, is the owner of Autumn Olive Farms. He is in opposition of this ordinance amendment. The farm encountered a problem that caused them to lose piglets due to Roto Virus. After great effort to treat, it was found that Starlings cause the Roto Virus. They tried various ways to detour the birds and found that the propane cannons were the most effective.

Luke Trainum, 136 Heritage Drive, Waynesboro is in opposition of the ordinance amendment. He has reached out to every member of the Board and has a response from everyone. This shows the Board cares about the community. Mr. Trainum reiterated what the previous speaker said. He understands the neighbors' concerns on

the issue, but the total banning and removal of the most economical non-lethal and safest tool to use is a major issue. If that is done, there are no options other than poison. This is a farming County and they need to be supported.

John Sills, 524 Waldrop Road, Swoope, is in support of the ordinance amendment. This noise is a big issue during the summer months. His home is approximately one mile of the vineyard so they are not affected by the noise as much as some people are,

James Simmons, 117 Robinhood Road, Staunton is in opposition of the ordinance amendment. He represents the vineyard in Swoope. The owners have heard the concerns of the community and have tried to make adjustments to accommodate the complaints. There are other options available, but they are not as effective and more expensive.

John Mark Burnette, 1032 Leaport Road, Verona, is in opposition of the ordinance amendment. He works at the vineyard in Swoope and has heard no complaints on the issue

Leah Rhodes, 775 N. Mountain Road, Swoope, stated that she lives on the property next to the vineyard. The cannons are disruptive. She understands the need to protect the farm, but it is difficult to live under the conditions. She has contacted the owner and voiced her concern.

Dwight Wood, 709 N. Mountain Road, Swoope, joins the property of the vineyard. He is representing 40 residents that have been effected by the use of the cannons and the problems they have created. Mr. Wood has had to change his way of life and he feels he shouldn't have to change what he has been doing for years because of this. It is the duty of the Board of Supervisors to protect the citizens that are affected by this.

Bobby Whitescarver, 120 Trimbles Mill Road, is in favor of the ordinance amendment. The owners of the vineyard should have discussed using the cannons with the neighbors. He lives two miles from the vineyard and the noise is very disruptive. Mr. Whitescarver objects to the cannons.

Richard Huttinger, 1106 North Mountain Road, Swoope and is in favor of the ordinance amendment. He lives across from the vineyard and the noise is disruptive. He will be forced to sell and leave if this continues.

Brandon Adams of Crimora stated that the Board's decision will affect all farms that may want to use cannons.

Keith McGinnis from Charlottesville asked the Board if everyone had heard the cannons for themselves.

Luke Trainum stated that this is an isolated concern for the Swoope area and should not affect the whole County.

There being no other speakers, the Chairman declared the public hearing closed.

Ms. Bragg stated that the Board has heard a number of comments from both sides.

Ms. Bragg moved, seconded by Mr. Shull, that the Board table the request and take it back to the Ordinance Committee for further review.

Steve Morris of Churchville is the North River District candidate for the Board of Supervisors. He has concerns with spending \$70 million on the Courthouse when the County has so many other important issues. Mr. Morris took a tour of the jail and realized the jail was extremely overcrowded.

Tracy Pyles of Churchville is running for Clerk of Court. He stated this Board has become dismissive of the public. The people have a right to know what is going on and to be heard. Tax increases effect everyone. He has concerns with renovating the Courthouse and Beverley Manor Elementary School.

Max Quillen from Waynesboro Nursery is concerned about the Stuarts Draft Small Area Plan. At no time did anyone from the County contact landowners that would be impacted by the plan. The landowners do not wish to sell and object to the County plan. The Board should not vote to approve the plan until the landowners have been contacted.

Timothy Fitzgerald, County Administrator, stated that this is in regards to an agreement made to create a joint Complete Count Committee with the City of Staunton and the City of Waynesboro. 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FIRE/RESCUE APPARATUS

The Board considered funding for replacement of ambulance.

David Nichols, Augusta County Fire Chief, stated that in August approval was given for the purchase of a new ambulance. This will be the second ambulance purchase. At the time, the final price for the chassis was unknown. Also under consideration is a replacement ambulance for the one that was in the accident. Settlement from the insurance company for the lost ambulance was \$65,000.00. Chief Nichols discussed and reviewed with the Board the new design on the ambulance. All necessary equipment is mounted and secured within the work area to create a safer environment. Total cost for the replacement unit is the same price as the units that were previously approved for purchase. The cost to the County for the replacement ambulance would be \$190,667.00. The difference in the chassis cost for the previously approved unit would be \$2,280.00. This is a total cost to the County of \$192,947.00. The funds are available through the Capital Depreciation budget.

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STUARTS DRAFT SMALL AREA PLAN

The Board received an update from Staff.

Ms. Tate gave an overview of the planning process for the plan. The draft of the plan has been posted on the website since October. There is also the ability for the public to submit a comment directly through the form that can be evaluated. The Stuarts Draft Small Area Plan is intended to gather background data, population data and population projections, and estimates on how much growth is expected within the twenty-year

timeframe of the plan. The current population estimate of the Stuarts Draft Small Area Plan boundary is approximately 11,500 individuals. The population is projected to increase approximately 13,000 county wide by 2040. Using the planning policy area goals and the specific land use designated for the Stuarts Draft Small Area Plan boundary. It is estimated approximately 2,300 additional residents will locate in the small area bringing it to a total of 13,800 residents. A main element that has arose during the planning process is pedestrian and bloycle infrastructure and the importance of it and interconnectivity in an area that is planned for residential and business development. Ms. Tate showed the Stuarts Draft Future Land Use Map which has had minimal revisions. There was a transportation consultant hired for the planning process. The plan covers a range of topics such as agriculture, residential and land use, schools, fire, rescue and law enforcement. The intention of the plan is to lay out the goals and the vision statement. The policies that fall within the plan are making the goal and vision come to life. Stuarts Draft is a planned development area and it's a planned growth area. There will be growth and development in that area, but recognizing that it is framed by agriculture and will continue to be. The plan identifies the stormwater focus areas map to show the importance of the natural resource of the South River and the importance of protecting it. The map shows the source water protection overlay zoning district which is adopted to protect the public water supplies. There are recommendations for Parks and Recreation. There is a section on the economy, historic resources, housing, library, public education, public safety, utilities and broadband, water and sewer, electricity, entrance corridor overlay and design guidelines. There is an implementation strategy of the plan that takes every policy of all of the chapters and puts it in a matrix at the end that identifies what department or area would be evaluating. This is important and there have been comments received and will continue to receive comments. Ms. Tate is asking for Board approval to advertise the Stuarts Draft Small Area Plan for public hearing.

Ms. Bragg stated that this has been a long process. There are a great group of citizens from the community that serve on the Advisory Committee.

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VIRGINIA LIBRARY ASSOCIATION UP AND COMER AWARD-ALI MCCUE

Diantha McCauley, Augusta County Library Director, recognized Ali McCue as the Virginia Library Association Up and Comer Award recipient. Ms. McCue is the Librarian Assistant with less than five years of experience. She was chosen for the award because of her community outreach efforts and the innovative programming that she has brought to the library.

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Timothy Fitzgerald, County Administrator, stated that there has been discussion on Facebook concerning the animal shelter's budget and euthanasia policy. No discussion has been had on cutting the budget and there has never been discussion on time period of kill. There is a new director at the shelter and she was asked to look at policies and volunteers and get suggestions that would possibly improve the shelter. The owners have no desire to make changes to the budget or the euthanasia policy.

MATTERS TO BE PRESENTED BY THE PUBLIC

Laurie Day, 209 Cisco Lane, Stuarts Draft, stated that she is a volunteer with the animal shelter. Her intention was to bring awareness of the shelter to the Board of Supervisors. Her actions were misconstrued and the wrong information was posted on Facebook.

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Patrick Shipe, 180 Plum Tree Draft Road, Churchville, is concerned with the internet service in the West Augusta, Deerfield and North River areas. Schools are now requiring internet service to complete homework so it is crucial that the issue be addressed. Mr. Shipe is also concerned with Fire and Rescue. He questions whether new equipment and apparatus are needed or is a Maintenance Supervisor needed to oversee the upkeep of all equipment.

Steve Morris, 203 Hotchkiss Road, Churchville, thanked the volunteers that were present. He also thanked Supervisors' Pattle, Bragg and Coleman for their hard work and time spent on the Board of Supervisors. Mr. Morris does not think there should be secret meetings. The people of Augusta County need to be aware of what is going on in the County. Staffing levels at the jail need to be evaluated. He feels the jail is unsafe and overcrowded. Mr. Morris is also concerned with conditions of many roadways. The voting precinct at Clymore Elementary is unsafe and suggests using the high school because parking is better. He also suggests that when re-districting is done, the Churchville voting precinct be moved to a different location. The proposed middle schools for Buffalo Gap and Riverheads needs to be evaluated. Additional gym and cafeteria space will be needed and it is currently not in the plan.

Michael McGinnis, Jr., 876 North Mountain Road, Swoope, is the owner of the vineyard in Swoope. He came to answer questions concerning the use of cannons since he was unable to attend the previous meeting.

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WAYNESBORO AREA REFUGE MINISTRY-WARM

The Board heard a presentation on "Hunger & Homelessness Awareness Week".

Brian Edwards from the Waynesboro Area Refuge Ministry (WARM) presented on "Hunger and Homelessness Awareness Week" which is next week. He stated that many people in this area are living below the poverty level, and are homeless and hungry. One in five children in the United States live in poverty. One goal of WARM is to end Veterans' homelessness in the area by mid-2020. Mr. Edwards asks the Board to send a representative to WARM's regular meeting and to encourage the local housing authority representatives to support WARM's efforts.

NATURAL CHIMNEYS POOL RENOVATION

The Board considered a change order for Natural Chimney's Pool project in the amount of \$79,500.00 from the Parks & Recreation Depreciation account.

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Funding Source: Parks & Rec Depreciation 80000-8142 \$79,500.00

Jennifer Whetzel, Deputy County Administrator, stated that on July 11, 2019 a contract was executed with National Pools of Roanoke, VA. This contract is for the pool resurfacing and equipment upgrades at Natural Chimneys. The initial contract included the option for a splash pad. It was determined that the cost associated with the splash pad did not align with the intent of this project and would be explored in the future. During a recent visit to the site, the idea of a beach entry from the tot pool into the main pool was explored. The beach entry would also include a water feature similar to the water feature that was discussed for the splash pad as well as bench seating. This beach entry is presented to the Board as a change order in the amount of \$79,500.00. This is an economical option for renovating the facility while also extending the life. This will also be providing a third means of ADA compliant entry into the pool structure.

Dr. Pattie does not support this. Not necessarily the feature, but the order of work to be completed. He feels there are more important things to be done at the park.

FIRE ENGINE PURCHASE

David Nichols, Fire Chief, addressed the questions raised during Matter to be Presented by the Public regarding the vehicles and equipment that are being replaced. He updated the Board on the status of the recruits noting that, upon their graduation, Fire-Rescue will be close to filling all of the open positions.

FIRE ENGINE PURCHASE (CONT'D)

Chief Nichols also stated that the fleet is in various stages of age and condition. Authorization to apply for a grant was given and the grant request was not funded. Currently there are no front line equipment in service responding to incidents. The County has borrowed two from Waynesboro First Aid Crew, an engine from Staunton Fire Department and an engine from Riverheads Volunteer Fire Department. The reserve ladder 108 is running in place of Truck 11. The proposed cost from Atlantic Emergency Solutions/Pierce is \$597,148.00. this price is comparable to the final cost of the current unit including change orders. If purchased after January 30, 2020, it is anticipated that there will be a 6% increase. Aside from the known price increase, waiting to modernize the fleet will result in the continuation of challenges. If the unit is purchased in December 2019, delivery is anticipated to be July or August 2020.

CRESCENT DEVELOPMENT GROUP LLC-REZONING

This being the day and time advertised to consider a request to rezone from Single Family Residential to General Business, with proffers, approximately 4.6 acres (TMP's 66C(1)2D, 66C(5)A, 66C(5)C, 66C(1)3) owned by Crescent Development Group LLC located in the southeast quadrant of the intersection of Jefferson Highway (Rt. 250) and Life Core Drive (Rt. 636) in Fishersville in the Wayne District. The general use of the property stated in the Comprehensive Plan is Community Mixed Use which may include a variety of residential uses as a density of 6-12 units an acre and on up to 40% of the total land area, retail and office uses, and in some but not all cases, industrial uses. The Planning Commission recommends approval with proffer.

Leslie Tate, Senior Planner, discussed the proposed proffers.

Scott Williams, managing member of Crescent Group, stated that his company is the developer of Myers Corner which is a mixed use community being built on 140 acres along Route 250 and Lifecore Drive. He discussed the process that led to this rezoning. The rezoning request complies with the Comprehensive Plan. The site is in an Urban Service Area. The proposed change in zoning is in keeping with the County's desire to encourage more business development along Lifecore to pay back the money borrowed for the road. The residential portion of the project has been started which will include approximately 300 homes. The residential growth in this area will increase the need for businesses and services in the area. There is public concern about potential access along Route 250. It is unknown if there will be access on Route 250, but if there is one, it will not be a full access. They have tried to respond to concerns raised by staff and neighbors. Most have been addressed at this time. The projects that have been developed in Myers Corner to date have been of the highest quality. It is unknown what will be developed on the site, but it will be developed in a first class, professional way and as least impactful to the neighbors as possible.

The Chairman declared the public hearing open.

Vria Leach, 37 Woodlawn Drive, Staunton, stated that she is in the neighborhood beside Myers Corner. She questioned what the agreement was between Crescent Development and Augusta County.

Mr. Fitzgerald stated that Crescent Development did not give money for the road construction. Their contribution was in the form of land and material used for the roadway. The County worked a public private partnership with Crescent and Branch Highways. The money was borrowed to build the project and VDOT money that was on the project previously from the 6-year plan was used. The tax incentive is not with Crescent Development. There is an agreement in place that all taxes paid in Myers Corner go into an account with the County and the County gets paid back for what was borrowed.

Ms. Leach is concerned about the safety at the Lifecore intersection. The property needs to remain as residential on that side.

Alan Gilbert, 25 Woodlawn Drive, Staunton, agrees with Ms. Leach's concerns. He recommends that the Board of Supervisors discuss this request further.

Jason Earhart, 29 Birchwood Road, Staunton, compared the Comprehensive Plan to the Fishersville Small Area Plan. The zoning changes would conflict with what was planned for the property.

James Earhart, 1426 Jefferson Highway, Staunton, is in opposition of the zoning change. The property can be developed as residential.

There being no other speakers, the Chairman declared the public hearing closed.

This being the day and time advertised to consider a request to rezone from General Agriculture to Manufactured Home Park, with proffers, approximately 37.46 acres (portions of the following Tax Map Parcels: 49-57F, 49-57F1, 49-57F2, 49-57F2, 49-57V, 49-57V, 49-57V, 49-57V, 49-57V, and 49-57T) owned by Country Estates Mobile Home Park, LLC located east of Jerry Hill Drive, approximately 0.8 of a mile east of the intersection of Country Estates Boulevard and East Side Highway (Rt. 340), south of Jenni Lynn Circle and Jamie Street, west of Emery Drive, and approximately 0.14 of a mile north of Thorofare Road (Rt. 628) in Crimora in the Middle River District. The proposed general use of the property is manufactured and mobile homes. The general use of the property stated in the Comprehensive Plan Is Rural Conservation Area. The Planning Commission recommends approval with proffers.

Ms. Tate, discussed the proffers and showed a map on the screen. The area of the request is the portion not currently zoned Manufactured Home Park. Ten additional units would be constructed within the zoned area. Staff pointed out that because it is planned as a rural conservation area, staff would not recommend larger expansions to the park, but with this request and the specific proffers limiting the placement of new units, this is considered more of a cleanup of existing zoning issues with units placed outside of current zoning boundaries.

CHAPTER 25, SECTION 25-384-ORDINANCE AMENDMENT

Consider an ordinance to amend Chapter 25. Zoning. Division F. Industrial Districts. Article XXXVIII. General Industrial (GI) Districts. Section 25-384. Uses permitted by Special Use Permit. E. Batching plants for asphalt, cement, or concrete. The Planning Commission recommends approval.

Ms. Tate stated that the ordinance, the way it is currently written, in general industrial districts allows you to apply for a special use permit to have a concrete or asphalt batching plant. These requests go to the Board of Zoning Appeals for approval. The conditions related to that special use permit currently are that the neighboring area is not characterized by residential, commercial or industrial development which would be adversely impacted by the proposed use. Also, traffic generated by the proposed project will be compatible with the road serving the site and other traffic utilizing the said roads and onsite traffic flow will adequately and safely accommodate all traffic to and from the public highways. All building, structures and operations will be set back at least 100 feet from all property lines unless the Board of Zoning Appeals determines that greater setbacks are necessary to adequately protect neighboring properties. The proposed amendment would add or the Board of Zoning Appeals determines that lesser setbacks are adequate to protect neighboring properties.

The Chairman declared the public hearing open.

Randy Brock is the Technical Manager for the Hershey Company. He has concerns with the amendment and opposes it.

Meredith Moldenhauer, legal counsel for Hershey Company, stated that this a matter of right uses for low intensity manufacturing that are currently protected and that by reducing the buffer, many other uses could be affected. She cited research, provided to the Board, that supports the claim that particulate matter needs increased regulation of buffer zones.

There being no other speakers, the Chairman declared the public hearing closed.
