Workers' Compensation Policy Update

Human Resources has updated the policy guiding Workers' Compensation. In the past, the County has paid employees 100% of their salary when the employee is on workers' compensation. VACorp is the workers' compensation insurance carrier and they reimburse the County 66 2/3% and the County makes up the difference to ensure an employee maintains 100% of their pay.

Virginia Code notes that "when the incapacity for work resulting from the injury is total, the employer shall pay, or cause to be paid, as hereinafter provided, to the injured employee during such total incapacity, a weekly compensation equal to 66 2/3 percent of his average weekly wages...". The revised policy will allow VACorp to pay the employee directly, versus reimbursing the County for the 66 2/3% of wages. Payments are non-taxable according to the IRS and Workers' Compensation Commission. The following is an example of how the change will affect an employee that is out for an extended period of time on worker's comp:

Employee makes \$36,379 and earns no overtime

Gross monthly wage is \$3,032 less taxes of \$532 = \$2,500 less other deductions for health insurance, etc. Workers' Compensation payment at 66 2/3% is \$2,021 and employee would be responsible for reimbursing the County for the employee portion of insurance premium.

Many workers' compensation claims are for a short period of time, however, there have been occasions where an employee is out for an extended period of time. The policy is updated to workers' compensation standards and will speak to the employer and employee responsibilities and the guidelines for workers' compensation payments per Virginia law and will encourage employees to return to work.

It is before the Board to consider the updated policy.

#17 - Workers' Compensation

Purpose:

Workers' Compensation is provided to protect full time and part time employees who have sustained an injury or illness arising out of and in the course of their employment, which has been approved as compensable under the Workers' Compensation Act by the County of Augusta Workers' Compensation insurance carrier.

I. Workers' Compensation Benefit

- A. Compensability of an injury will be determined by the insurance carrier in accordance with the Virginia Workers' Compensation Act.
- B. An injured employee will receive "Workers' Compensation 1st Seven Days" for an absence from work for a compensable injury or illness of less than eight calendar days. Pay for "Workers' Compensation 1st Seven Days" will be based on the base salary of the employee and will not include other compensation such as overtime, etc.
- C. When an employee is absent from work for more than seven calendar days because of a compensable injury or illness, the employee shall receive indemnity payments as provided by the Workers' Compensation Act. Indemnity payments commence with the eighth calendar day as described in Section III. A. Indemnity payments are computed by the Workers' Compensation insurance carrier and subject to the provisions and limits set by the Workers' Compensation Commission.
- D. For absences that continue for more than 21 calendar days, the County of Augusta will be reimbursed for the first seven calendar days of the employee's absence by the Workers' Compensation insurance carrier. This payment will be made to the County of Augusta by an agreement signed by the County of Augusta and the insurance carrier.
- E. All reasonable and necessary authorized medical expenses associated with a compensable injury or illness will be paid in accordance with provisions of the Act.
- F. All payments to the employee will be in compliance with Section 65.2-300 of the Workers' Compensation Act and Rule 9.2 of the Virginia Workers' Compensation Commission.
- G. Should an injury be determined non-compensable by the Workers' Compensation carrier, the employee will be required to use any available paid leave beginning the day following the determination. If no other leave is available, the employee will be placed on leave without pay.
- H. Temporary and part-time employees will be paid based on the average hours worked in the previous 52 weeks at the hourly rate at the time of injury or illness.
- I. Employees released to modified or light duty for a compensable injury or illness will be offered light or modified duty where available. Failure to accept a light duty assignment may jeopardize the employee's Workers' Compensation benefits.

II. Reporting Procedures

- A. All accidents and/or injuries must be reported to a supervisor and the pre-determined reporting service immediately, or as soon as practical, but no later than 24 hours following the accident or injury. If an employee is unable to contact the supervisor, he should attempt to contact the Department Director or another supervisor in the department. In the event the employee is unable to personally report the accident, the Department Director or designee should report the accident.
- B. Employees must notify their supervisor of any medical treatment needed.
- C. Should treatment be needed, a doctor from the Panel of Physicians must be selected for coverage to occur. If treatment is not received from a Panel Physician, Workers' Compensation benefits may be terminated, in which event cost of treatment will be borne by the employee.
- D. Supervisors must complete all reporting associated with the injury or illness, providing accurate details and facts through the appropriate channel provided by the Human Resources Department.
- E. The first seven calendar days of an injured employee's time for a compensable injury will be coded as "Workers' Compensation 1st Seven Days".
- F. Beginning on the eighth day after a compensable injury, the employee's time will be coded as "Workers' Compensation."

III. Effect on Pay and Benefits

- A. Indemnity payments are computed by the Workers' Compensation insurance carrier, subject to the provisions and limits set by the Workers' Compensation Commission which will equal 66.66% of the employee's average weekly wage for the previous 52 weeks. Indemnity payments are not subject to taxes. Indemnity payments will be paid directly from the insurance carrier to the employee.
- B. Should an injury be determined non compensable by the Workers' Compensation insurance carrier, the employee's time off work beyond "Workers' Compensation 1st Seven Days" will be charged to their leave balance. If the employee does not have any leave, they will be placed on leave without pay.
- C. An employee receiving Workers' Compensation benefits will not be charged leave.
- D. An employee absent from missing work due to an injury or illness deemed compensable by Workers' Compensation will continue to accrue leave.
- E. The employee will continue to be covered by the County's health insurance. The employee is responsible for paying the employee portion of the premium.
- F. The employee will be responsible for paying the employee contributions, where required, to any applicable retirement and life insurance benefits.
- G. An employee receiving Workers' Compensation will not be eligible to receive a merit or performance increase until he has returned to duty and a performance evaluation has been completed. The effective date of the performance increase will be the first day of the pay period after the merit or effective date of the increase.

IV. Safety and Health Program

- A. The County will provide a health and safety program which provides a safe work environment and equipment for employees.
- B. The County will provide training to employees in accident prevention, hazard recognition and reporting of injuries.
- C. The County will investigate incidents and injuries to ensure prevention of recurrence.
- D. The County will provide a panel of physicians to be used if medical treatment is needed.
- E. The employee will adhere to all safety rules, procedures, and practices and will use personal protective equipment provided. Failure to do so may result in disciplinary action.
- F. The employee will immediately report all injuries, regardless of severity, to the supervisor or other designated staff member.
- G. The employee will take all standard safety precautions to prevent injury to themselves or others and follow all safety rules and regulations.
- H. Failure to follow safety rules and regulations may result in disciplinary action up to and including termination.

I am providing a Health Department response per request of the county regarding the event, Freedom Ride 12 to be held 10/16-18/2020 at Shenandoah Harley Davidson.

Per the event organizer a trash dumpster will be provided by Greenearth for refuse removal. They have indicated only 250 people will attend the event which includes event staff, volunteers, and patrons. They will be allowing use of the restrooms in the building and have indicated that 2 portable toilets will also be provided. They have been advised to obtain a handwashing station to be placed near the portable toilets. The existing building is connected to public water and sewer. A temporary food permit has been applied for through the Health Department.

ORDINANCE AMENDMENT-AUGUSTA COUNTY CODE SECTION 22-2 & 22-3

This being the day and time advertised to consider an ordinance amendment to Augusta County Code Section 22-2, which would reinstate the penalty for failure to pay the first installment of real estate taxes for tax year 2020 to ten percent (10%) as of September 1, 2020, and an amendment to Augusta County Code Section 22-3, which would reinstate the interest on unpaid real estate taxes due and payable for tax year 2020 to ten percent (10%) per annum as of September 1, 2020. The amendments rescind the reduced penalty and interest fees that are available to tax payers through August 31, 2020 for the first half installment of 2020 real estate taxes.

Jennifer Whetzel, Deputy County Administrator, stated that in May there was a public hearing to temporarily amend penalty to 0% and interest to 5% per annum on first half 2020 real estate taxes. This change is effective through August 31, 2020 and a public hearing is necessary to return the ordinance to the original language. The penalty for failure to pay the first installment of real estate taxes for tax year 2020 will return to 10% as of September 1, 2020. The interest on unpaid real estate taxes due for tax year 2020 will return to 10% per annum as of September 1, 2020.

Ms. Carter questioned if the amount could be reduced. Ms. Whetzel stated that it has

to go back to its original language and then can be revisited later.

The Chairman declared the public hearing open.

Tracy Pyles of Churchville emailed the following statement:

"I will not be attending tonight but would like to register my objection to these reinstatements and would suggest they be left alone. The evidence is that lowering the penalties had no discernible impact on the rate of payments. The penalties are meant to encourage payment. Our people overwhelmingly pay their taxes on time when they have the funds. Let us not unnecessarily penalize those how are having tough times. We have too many unemployed and the possibility of poor crop production due to excess rain to choose to return to penalties that do not fit our times. The 10% interest penalty, given what banks now pay for funds invested, borders on usury. Five percent is twice what is available from banks. Many of our folks depend on the USPS to deliver their checks to the Treasurer. Presently, their delivery performance is being questioned. The due date could remain but the late date should be extended by two weeks before penalties assessed."

There being no speakers, the Chairman declared the public hearing closed.

Ms. Whetzel read the sentence that would be removed from the ordinance that notes the dates of the reduced rates. The rates will revert back on September 1, 2020 with or without this sentence.

Ms. Carter moved, seconded by Dr. Seaton that the Board revisit at a later time at a lower rate.

AG FORESTAL DISTRICT WITHDRAWAL

This being the day and time advertised to consider a request to withdraw approximately 75 acres of land from the Middle River Agricultural and Forestal District owned by Buddy L. or Misty D. Shaver (TMP 38-53), located in the southeast quadrant of the intersection of Cline River Road and Craig Shop Road in Weyers Cave in the Middle River District. The Planning Commission recommends approval.

Leslie Tate, Senior Planner stated that this is a request from Buddy L., Jr. or Misty D. Shaver. Mr. Shaver would like to build a home on the property within the next few years. He purchased the property from Jane Fulton on 11/26/2019. In purchase negotiations with Ms. Fulton, he had asked her not to renew the parcel of land back in to the district during the 2018 renewal process, but Ms. Fulton kept it in. Mr. Shaver's plans do not comply with the current guidelines of the Middle River Ag Forestal District and the district will not expire until November 2028.

The Chairman declared the public hearing open.

There being no speakers, the Chairman declared the public hearing closed.

UTILITY SCALE SOLAR-COMPREHENSIVE PLAN AMENDMENTS

This being the day and time advertised to consider amendments to the Augusta County Comprehensive Plan with the addition of the following phrase to Goal #4/Objective C/Policy #6: "consideration of existing Augusta County Service Authority Infrastructure be made." The Planning Commission recommends approval.

Mr. Garber stated that he would abstain from voting and discussion due to a conflict of interest.

Ms. Tate stated that this public hearing is addressing amendments to the utility section of the 2014-2015 Comprehensive Plan update. The amendments add eleven different policy considerations siting and design of utility scale solar installations in Augusta County. The vision statement and goals have been reviewed in depth previously. Ms. Tate showed a map on the screen of the planning policy areas. It has been over a year since the Board denied the first received application for a utility scale solar project that Augusta County has had. Since that denial, Staff has conducted three meetings gaging input from a wide range of stakeholders that were appointed by Board members to a committee. Staff feels the language that is presented is written in a way that affords flexibility and allows a case-by-case project review, while providing a framework of guidance to developers, staff and citizens about what values the County holds when evaluating these projects. Staff feels the eleven policies put forth connect to the goals, but afford for flexibility for the Board to determine them as they review these projects. Policy 6 wording, the consideration of existing Augusta County Service Authority infrastructure be made, was included as a recommendation by the Planning Commission. The word consideration is not intended to be negative or positive and a consideration of existing Service Authority utilities would happen anyway as a request to the Service Authority as they comment on individual projects. Comprehensive Plan language is intended to guide a projects compatibility with the overall County vision and goals. A project may conflict in some way with one of the policies or a portion of one of the policies and still likely be approved because the overall project is brought closer in line with the Comprehensive Plan by trying to fit into the policy goals of the County.

The Chairman declared the public hearing open.

Phil Martin, 209 Raintree Road, Verona and the Executive Director of the Augusta County Service Authority, stated that he urges the Board to approve the language in the Augusta Comprehensive Plan specifically in Policy 6. This takes into consideration investments made by the Augusta County Service Authority ratepayers who are also County taxpayers. Substantial sums of money have been invested to provide water and/or sewer service into the two main areas designated for future growth by the County. The Service Authority's mission statement includes in part language that they would work together or with Augusta County to achieve the development objectives of the County's Comprehensive Plan. The Service Authority makes decisions about where to provide and expand services based on the County's Comprehensive Plan.

<u>UTILITY SCALE SOLAR-COMPREHENSIVE PLAN AMENDMENTS</u> (CONT'D)

Rick Pfizenmayer, 30 Round Hill Drive, Stuarts Draft, stated that this is a 240 acres farm and has lived there for 22 years. He has received at least three solicitations from solar project developers looking for farmland to put solar projects on. Mr. Pfizenmayer urges the Board not to adopt the language in the amendment that reads encourage distributed solar and carefully sited utility scale solar as a means of achieving renewable energy goals. Augusta County and the Shenandoah Valley is a unique and beautiful place.

Stan Sikorski, 169 Benz Road, Waynesboro, stated that this is not the right time to consider these impactful changes. People are concerned about COVID, the election, economic status and societal friction not making changes to the Comprehensive Plan.

Rodney Martin, 563 Houff School Road, Waynesboro, stated that he is speaking on behalf of the Martin Family Farm, which is located near McKee and Target Distribution Center in Stuarts Draft. As landowners, they disagree with the notion that the Augusta County Service Authority infrastructure should be a consideration if a property is not going through a rezoning. The family is concerned that the addition of this statement will get used to restrict landowners on properties they would choose to keep and use in ways that may never utilize water or sewer. As property owners, they have never been consulted by the County or the Service Authority before a sewer line or sewer system upgrade was being considered near their property. In 1990's McKee purchased land in Stuarts Draft. The new factory needed a sewer line. The Martin Family agreed to run a main sewer line across their property to the sewage treatment plant. They did not agree to hand over the surrounding land or the future potential development of this property to the County. The County did not caution them, at that time, that if the sewer line went through their property, it would have to become industrial in the future. Approval of the Comprehensive Plan 30 years ago was not consent by landowners to control the future of their land as long as they own it. Solar is not farming, but it is not industry either. Solar is a utility.

Nancy Sorrells, 3419 Cold Springs Road, thanked Staff for their hard work on solar. She does not agree with the Augusta County Service Authority infrastructure addition to the words. She appreciates the thought behind protecting the Service Authority's Infrastructure, however, the Comprehensive Plan is a broad vision. No other land use and development type in the Comprehensive Plan is pulled out in this way. The Augusta County Service Authority infrastructure is not exclusive with solar or any other development.

There being no other speakers, the Chairman declared the public hearing closed.

Mr. Shull thanked Staff for the amount of time working on this process. He thanked the public for their input.

Mr. Shull moved, seconded by Mr. Wells that the Board approve the Comprehensive Plan amendmends as presented.

Dr. Seaton stated that he has a series of amendments to be made to the motion put forth by Mr. Shull.

Mr. Slaven moved, seconded by Mr. Wells to call for the question.

WHEREAS, the Commonwealth of Virginia has adopted a project prioritization program "Smart Scale" whereby transportation projects are selected for funding based on the cost effectiveness of those projects to meet performance goals, and

WHEREAS, the Staunton Augusta Waynesboro Metropo'itan Planning Organization is seeking funding for the Woodrow Wilson Complex Long Term Access Improvements Project under the Smart Scale program; and

WHEREAS, Fishersville is one of Augusta County's Designated Growth Areas; and

WHEREAS, US 250 is a Corridor of Statewide Significance, serving this community and finking Fishersville with other destinations via Interstates 64 and 81; and

WHEREAS, the Woodrow Wilson Complex Long Term Access Improvements Project will add a second entrance to the Woodrow Wilson Complex, which will improve access, reduce congestion and delay, and improve safety, thereby addressing multiple needs identified as part of the 2019 update of VTRANS mid-term needs; and

WHEREAS, the Woodrow Wilson Complex Long Term Access Improvements Project is identified in the County's Comprehensive Plan as a priority transportation project; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary that a resolution be received from the sponsoring local jurisdiction or agency requesting the Virginia Department of Transportation funding.

NOW THEREFORE be it resolved that the Augusta County Board of Supervisors does hereby endorse the proposed Woodrow Wilson Complex Long Term Access Improvements Project to compete for state and federal funding under the Smart Scale program.

A RESOLUTION OF SUPPORT FOR A SMART SCALE APPLICATION FOR CROZET TUNNEL TRAIL IN WAYNESBORD, VIRGINIA

WHEREAS, the City of Waynesboro has submitted a \$5.5m SMART SCALE application for a 1.3 mile shared use path running roughly parallel to US-250 from 1800 East Main Street, including a pedestrian tunnel underneath the Buckingham Branch rail line, to the western trail of the Blue Ridge Tunnel Phase III project; and,

WHEREAS, in conjunction with the previously funded East Main Street Shared Use Path, this project is intended to address Regional Network and Corridor of Statewide Significance needs by creating a continuous bike and pedestrian connection from Downlown Waynesboro to Route 6 in Afton, providing an alternative route to US-250 for non-motorized traffic; and,

ROUND 4 SMART SCALE RESOLUTIONS (CONTID)

WHEREAS, the Commonwealth of Virginia has adopted a project prioritization program under the SMART SCALE Program whereby transportation projects are selected for funding based on the costeffectiveness of those projects to meet performance goals; and,

WHEREAS, a significant portion of this trail will be located in the jurisdiction of Augusta County and the trail will be a major recreational and economic development asset for properties in Augusta County:

NOW THEREFORE be it resolved that the Augusta County Board of Supervisors does hereby support the application by the City of Waynesboro, to compete for state and federal funding under the Smart Scale program.

A RESOLUTION OF SUPPORT FOR A SMART SCALE APPLICATION FOR US 250 (WEST MAIN STREET) IN WAYNESBORD, VIRGINIA

WHEREAS, the Commonwealth of Virginia has adopted a project prioritization program "Smart Scale" whereby transportation projects are selected for funding based on the cost effectiveness of those projects to meet performance goals, and

WHEREAS, the City of Waynesboro is seeking funding for the US 250 West Main Street STARS Study Recommendations in the City of Waynesboro under the Smart Scale program; and

WHEREAS, West Main Street is a key commercial corridor with safety and accessibility needs identified in the City's Comprehensive Plan and in regional transportation plans, and

WHEREAS, US 250 is a Corridor of Statewide Significance, serving this community and linking the community with other destinations via Interstates 64 and 81; and

WHEREAS, the US 250 West Main Street STARS Study Recommendations will make improvements on US 250 from the intersection of US 250 and Hopeman Parkway to the Waynesboro City limits; and

WHEREAS, such improvements will reduce crashes and improve pedestrian safety along US 250 in the City of Waynesboro through access management, addition of sidewalk on one side of the roadway, revision of signal phasing, and systemic signal safety and operational improvements addressing multiple needs identified as part of the 2019 update of VTRANS mid-term needs; and

WHEREAS, the Augusta County is seeking funding for similar improvements along the segment of US 250 west of the City limits to the Intersection of US 250 and Old White Bridge Road.

NOW THEREFORE be it resolved that the Augusta County Board of Supervisors does hereby support the proposed US 250 West Main Street STARS Study Recommendations Project, being applied for by the City of Waynesboro, to compete for state and federal funding under the Smart Scale program.

Ms. Tate stated that there are seven different resolutions that are in support of Round 4 Smart Scale application projects. Smart Scale is a transportation funding mechanism that is Statewide and it is a competitive process. Based on the size, Augusta County is limited to applying for four applications. Four of the resolutions are for applications which staff submitted and a resolution of support is required. These resolutions include the Route 11 STARS Study, Route 250 STARS Study, Route 254 (3 intersections), and Route 256. In addition, the Staunton, Augusta, Waynesboro MPO, on behalf of Augusta County, submitted an application for a secondary access to the Woodrow Wilson Workforce and Rehabilitation Center. Two Resolutions of Support are for City of Waynesboro projects that are within close proximity to Augusta County; the Crozet Tunnel and US 250 from City limits where the County's project terminates.

PERSONAL PROPERTY TAX RELIEF PROGRAM-RESOLUTION

The Board considered a resolution establishing the rate of tax relief of qualifying vehicles for purposes of the Personal Property Tax Relief Act.

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF AUGUSTA COUNTY, VIRGINIA

.

WHEREAS, the Personal Property Tax Relief Act of 1998, Va. Code §§ 58.1-3523 et seq. ("PPTRA"), has been substantially modified by the enactment of Chapter 1 of the Acts of Assembly, 2004 Special Session I (Senate Bill 5005), and the provisions of Item 503 of Chapter 951 of the 2005 Acts of Assembly (the 2005 revisions to the 2004-06 Appropriations Act).

WHEREAS, by its enactment of an ordinance on December 14, 2005 ("Ordinance"), the Board of Supervisors of Augusta County, Virginia (the "Board of Supervisors") has previously implemented such modifications of the PPTRA.

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors now desires to set the rate of tax relief for tax year 2020 for purposes of the Ordinance.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF AUGUSTA COUNTY, VIRGINIA

- For purposes of § 3(c) of the Ordinance, the rate of tax relief with respect to qualifying vehicles with assessed values of more than \$1,000, and applied to the first \$20,000 in value of each such qualifying vehicle, shall be thirty-six (36%)
- 2. All other provisions of the Ordinance shall be implemented by the Commissioner of the Revenue or the County Treasurer, as applicable, including, without Ilmitation, those set forth in § 3(b) of the Ordinance, partaining to the elimination of personal property taxation of each qualifying vehicle with an assessed value of \$1,000 or tess, and in § 4, pertaining to liability of taxpayers whose taxes with respect to a qualifying vehicle for tax year 2005 or any prior tax year remain unpaid.
 - 3. This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

Jennifer Whetzel, Deputy County Administrator, stated that this resolution is approved annually. At the State level there is \$950 million set aside to reimburse localities for personal property tax. The County gets approximately \$4.3 million of those funds. The total value of personal property is reviewed in relation to the \$4.3 million and a percentage that is credited back to the taxpayers is established. This year's percentage is 36%.
