Dear Mr. Fitzgerald:

We wrote to you on May 5, 2015, including, with our letter, the petition and all the signatures **required by your office** for SLOW – CHILDREN PLAYING, SHARE THE ROAD, or CAUTION - PEDESTRIANS, or similar signage, on the north and south end of Middlebrook Village.

About a week after that, in May, I received one phone message from you, stating that your office would wait until it saw what VDOT was going to do after their study in the Village of Middlebrook. We had requested signage and some sort of "calming devices" in the road, attaching photos of VA calming examples.

After writing a follow-up email to all of you on September 8th, a week or so later I received an email from Kay Vance. It was a confusing email – we are not sure whether they WILL or will NOT put in striped crossing lines across the road from the Middlebrook General Store to the PO and library. It was not clear.

We were also not sure from his email if they will put up any pedestrian/safety signs.

When VDOT did its survey early in the summer, the Middlebrook General Store had had a change of management, and the customer base had fallen dramatically. Since then, under new management, customers have returned, and there is much foot traffic between the parking lot, the PO and the library. This is in addition to the dozens of children that live in Middlebrook on Middlebrook Village Road.

The Augusta County Sheriff's Department has been very responsive, adding radar and occasionally installing the flashing speed limit sign. We are grateful to them.

Again we want to stress that this is a *SAFETY ISSUE*, to emphasize that we *complied* with your requirements, and that we anticipate *action* to address safety.

Dear Mr. Fitzgerald:

We are imploring the Augusta County Community Development office to act before a child is injured.

This letter is a formal request to the Augusta County Community Development Office for "SLOW – CHILDREN" signs and other speeding abatement devices in Middlebrook Village. Signed petitions, as required, are attached.

Middlebrook, Virginia, is a tiny village in southern Augusta County bisected north & south by Route 252 (Middlebrook Road). The road slopes downward at both ends of the village.

Although the census shows it as a small community in its population count, Middlebrook is busy and thriving. It boasts a doctor's office, a post office, a library, an antique car garage, and a general store. Four families with children of various ages live at the north end, and two are at the south end. During the warm months children ride up and down on their bikes on the street, often crossing it to go to the library or the general store. The Middlebrook General Store generates much foot traffic crossing the road from the parking lot to the store. Middlebrook is the only village along Rt. 252 that has business establishments on both sides of the road. A total of 18 children now live on that one-mile stretch of road.

In April, 2014, we wrote to Secretary of Transportation, the Honorable Aubrey Layne, about our concerns. He had the courtesy to promptly respond and referred us to Jeremy Mason, of the VDOT Residency in Harrisonburg. Recently we spoke to Mr. Mason, asking for signs such as "SLOW – CHILDREN PLAYING" or something similar. Explaining that recent Virginia legislation requires that our request must go through the Augusta County Community Development Office, he referred us to that department.

After contacting the Augusta County Community Development office, we were told we needed to get signatures from the residents. Enclosed are the petition sheets.

We are requesting "CAUTION – CHILDREN PLAYING" or "SLOW", or "SHARE THE ROAD," or "RADAR AHEAD" signs, calming bricks at intervals in the roadway as you approach Middlebrook and possibly occasional use of portable speed signs as you come into the Village.

When we had contacted Mr. Mason in 2014, he was able to reduce the speed limit in Middlebrook from 30 MPH to 25 MPH, and 25 MPH signs were installed. He stated that double lines were not feasible, since there are no shoulders (the double lines stop at Middlebrook Village proper at both ends). We had asked for a crosswalk from the parking lot to the Middlebrook General Store, but Mr. Mason said that a painted crosswalk was not possible (but did not state a reason).

We also asked Mr. Mason about TRAFFIC CALMING DEVICES in Middlebrook, and suggested he look at the ones on Virginia highway Rt. 50 used on that highway coming in and out of Upperville, VA ("35 mph strictly ENFORCED"). He was not familiar with those, but said he would send his engineers to look at them. Tasteful grey brick pavers are embedded into the highway, about 300 yards apart at the juncture of the



first 35 MPH sign posting and then at regular intervals going into Upperville until it becomes 25 MPH, where center-of-the-road calming devices are installed, in addition to pedestrian painted crosswalks in Upperville proper. The pavers are not noisy, but simply remind drivers to slow down. (See attached photos of the calming bricks in Upperville).

The posted speed limit in Middlebrook is 25 mph. Very few drivers obey that speed limit, *ESPECIALLY* the large commercial and farm trucks. Those drivers get up a head of steam from the downhills coming into the village at each end. Their average speed is *at least* 45 MPH *or higher*.

Additionally, including the children that live in Middlebrook, many bicyclists use Rt. 252 and ride through Middlebrook. Last year a minister and his wife moved into the area. She rides her bike with her child on the back of the bike from Bethel Presbyterian Church on Howardsville Road and along Middlebrook Road to the general store, the library, or the post office. Middlebrook Road through the village is narrow, no shoulders, and has steeply edged drop-offs. It is terribly dangerous for them (AND pedestrians) with those trucks and other vehicles regularly exceeding the speed limit.

Last year we contacted the Augusta County Sheriff's Department and later were told that they had instructed their officers to occasionally park their cruisers in Middlebrook and issue speeding tickets (or warnings). However, cruisers are seldom seen in Middlebrook, so this has not been a deterrent to speeders breaking the law. We encourage the Augusta County Sheriff's Department to increase its presence in Middlebrook Village. It was encouraging to see, last week, an Augusta County deputy conducting radar in Middlebrook at noon.

We respectfully request that the Augusta County Community Development Office install some sort of SLOW DOWN – CHILDREN PLAYING and/or warning signage at the north and south ends of Middlebrook before there is a tragedy.

I shall be looking forward to a prompt reply.

As you will recall, the Augusta County Board of Supervisors, at the beginning of 2015, ranked priorities for the coming year. An updated master plan for Mill Place Commerce Park ranked in the top overall items to be pursued.

Mill Place Commerce Park went through an initial master planning process after the property purchase. The current master planning documents are dated 2001. Since that time, the 400+ acre site has seen several lots developed, including those for Shamrock Farms and Dascom, as well as additional infrastructure (natural gas, fiber, and a water storage tank) brought to the park. Additionally, overall attraction efforts have shifted from a "high tech only" strategy to a mixed-use strategy and the zoning for the park has been updated to reflect that change in focus. However, the covenants and master plan have not been updated accordingly. Development requirements related to stormwater management and transportation have also changed during this time period. More than ever before, sites that are most "ready" attract the highest and best uses.

In order most efficiently market the park for future development and to effectively complete in an increasingly-competitive environment, a comprehensive assessment of the park's target markets, wastewater capacity, infrastructure, transportation network,

and stormwater in an effort to develop site and grading concepts, and a long-range business plan for the park is needed. This development plan will help us market the park, complete requests for information, match prospects with the best-suited site, prepare for future development, and help us take advantage of unanticipated opportunities (such as fill dirt becoming available). This development plan will help us target and recruit the highest and best, yet realistic, uses for the park.

Staff has engaged the Timmons Group, our first on-call firm for economic development services, to prepare a **proposal for an updated business/development plan for Mill Place Commerce Park**. As the attached proposal outlines, the Timmons Group will provide a fresh perspective and develop a master plan that will be targeted towards developing the park for the next 10-20 year planning horizon with a realistic eye towards the target industries and businesses and maintaining flexibility towards the development of the park. Using a business plan approach to development, Timmons has even indicated that it will provide appropriate metrics to compare the potential investment in this park relative to the potential for jobs and investment yield (See section 9, paragraph 3).

TOTAL COST: \$77,000

Also included in this packet related to Mill Place Commerce Park Improvements are the following:

A proposal for installation of a new aerating fountain for the front pond, in an effort to maintain the water quality and pong appearance and draw visual interest from Laurel Hill Road. Cost to operate this fountain will be less than half of the cost to operate the previous fountain and this fountain will move more water. This a one proposal and if the Board would like us to pursue this, we would still need to get two additional proposals to meet our procurement guidelines.

TOTAL COST: \$10,264

A proposal for updating the Mill Place Commerce Park interstate sign, as requested by the Economic Development Committee.

TOTAL COST: \$3,500

Dear Ms. Glover:

Thank you for taking the time to engage the Timmons Group team about providing master planning services with regards to Mill Place Commerce Park, located off Mill Place Parkway, in Augusta County, VA. We are excited about the possibilities that exist for the County and look forward to working with you to develop a comprehensive Business / Development Plan and revisiting the Master Planning process at this point in the park's development.

In accordance with your request, we are pleased to submit the following proposal for your consideration by the Augusta County.

Project Background

Mill Place Commerce Park went through an initial Master Planning several years ago. Since then the 300+ acre site has seen a handful of lots developed, including those for Shamrock Farms and Dascom, as well as additional infrastructure brought to the site. The Park is conveniently located off of Route 81, providing connectivity to major transportation networks to serve the Mid-Atlantic region.

Since there has been various development and infrastructure improvements in the park, the County would like to revisit the master plan as well as the overall development strategy, including the possibility of adding acreage form the Nancy Brandon Moore Brannon property at the southeast corner of Mill Place Commerce Park (the triangle).

Current Market Conditions

Given the speed at which decisions are being made by today's prospects (literally in months), it's important to have "ready to go" product that has achieved a Tier 4 or Tier 5 status in terms of site readiness. A Tier 4 site is a certifiable site that has minimal development issues associated with it and a Tier 5 site is a "pad ready" or "shovel ready" site in which a prospect can start construction on a building almost immediately.

As such, the County has asked Timmons Group to provide a more global perspective based upon experience working as, and with, site selection consultants to help develop a master plan that will identify a road map for the County to achieve a Tier 4 or Tier 5 status and will accommodate the County's target market sectors.

Scope of Services:

Under this proposal, Timmons Group will provide the following services:

Master Planning Process

Timmons Group will provide a fresh perspective and develop a master plan that will be targeted towards developing the park for the next 10-20 year planning horizon with a realistic eye towards the target industries and businesses and maintaining flexibility towards the development of the park, with a plan to achieve a Tier 4 and Tier 5 site ranking. In addition, Timmons Group will coordinate this master planning effort with the adjoining Government Center complex, existing businesses, and the historic Grandma Moses house addressing opportunities for shared stormwater management strategies, enhancing a potential trail system and evaluating any other economies of scale that can be integrated.

As part of the master planning process, we will perform the following tasks:

1. Target Sector / Market Analysis

Currently, Mill Place Commerce Park has Planned Commerce Zoning, which accommodates a variety of uses ranging from hospitality to industrial in a compatible and complementary format.

Specifically, <u>Area 1</u> allows professional and business offices, research and development uses, light industrial uses, hospitality establishments, retail and service businesses, upper-story residential uses, common open space, and limited outdoor storage.

Area 2 allows professional and business offices, research and development uses, light industrial uses, hospitality establishments, retail and service businesses, upper-story residential uses, and common open space.

<u>Area 3</u> allows professional and business offices, research and development uses, retail and service businesses, warehouse uses, general industrial uses, common open space, limited outdoor storage and general outdoor storage by special use permit.

In addition, Augusta County has several target sectors/markets which the County as a whole is pursuing, including

- a. Advanced manufacturing,
- b. Food processing/packaging,
- c. Life sciences, and
- d. Valued-added agriculture and forestry.

Logistics and distribution companies naturally select the area based on Augusta County's strategic location at the intersection of interstates 81 and 64 and easy access to global markets.

We will research general commonalities for infrastructure and site development (i.e. generally to include building footprints, traffic needs, water and sewer needs, etc) for the existing approved planned commerce uses as well as the overall county target markets and then analyze Mill Place Commerce Park infrastructure relative to the uses. With this information, we will determine if these uses and targets are realistic and appropriate targets for the build out of the park. We will make recommendations to changes in zoning uses and targets and will develop lot layouts for the potential best, highest, and most realistic uses and targets based upon feedback provided by Augusta County staff.

2. Food Processing - Wastewater Analysis

Timmons Group will work with Augusta County Service Authority to understand the overall wastewater treatment system that serves Mill Place Commerce Park, including capacity and limitations.

With an understanding of the system, Timmons Group will evaluate potential subcategories for the food processing industry (i.e. Beverage and Bottling, Dairy, Meat processing, etc.) and determine the potential wastewater composition for each respective category as well as potential demands.

Timmons Group will forward information regarding potential subcategories for the food processing industry to the Augusta County Service Authority (ACSA) so it can determine the ability of the ACSA to handle each respective food processing category, both from a wastewater composition and capacity perspective.

Should we determine working with the ACSA that certain food processing facilities will not work, or the ACSA can take a "tiered" approach to accepting certain industry waste streams, we will identify those types of facilities in the report such that the County can understand what industries it can or cannot recruit.

3. Infrastructure and Utility Assessment / Concept Master Plans

Concurrent with the target market analysis, we will perform an infrastructure and utility assessment. This will include:

- 1. Evaluating the existing water and sewer system and recent improvements to accommodate the Shamrock Farms project (including a new 750,000 gallon elevated storage tank).
- 2. Determining approximate capacity remaining in the water and sewer system.
- 3. Depending on lot layouts, evaluate location(s) of pump station(s).
- 4. Review of other critical infrastructure that might be relevant to achieving successful build-out (i.e. coordination with electrical, natural gas, fiber, etc.)

Based upon this review, we will develop up to two (2) concept master plans showing both dry and wet utility layouts / corridors (i.e. colocation of compatible utilities). We will make recommendations for potential infrastructure improvements necessary, identify potential locations and develop order of magnitude costs for wet utilities (i.e. costs per LF of water & sewer extensions, etc.) for the potential build-out of the park.

4. Transportation Assessment, Conceptual Roadway Design, Entrance Concepts & Cost Estimating

Prepare up to three (3) conceptual park/road layouts assuming the inclusion of a portion of the adjacent parcel (per the attached property map) along with potential interconnections to Technology Drive, the Government Center and Industry Way in the City of Staunton. We will also prepare up to two (2) entrance concepts for the park. Representatives from Augusta County will be included in this process and will be responsible for assisting the team in finalizing a development/land use plan for the park.

Assess the feasibility and constructability of preliminary alignments offered in the transportation master plan recommendations, including a review of conformance with VDOT minimum standards. Once the alignments are determined to be feasible and reasonable, we will provide the following information in support of the master plan:

- 1. Intersection analysis of Mill Place Parkway (Route 901) and Laurel Hill Road (Route 612) with and without potential connection(s) to the City of Staunton;
 - a. Collect AM/PM peak directional turning movement count at the Mill Place Parkway/Laurel Road intersection.
 - b. Coordinate with VDOT and obtain existing signal timing/phasing info.
 - c. Perform and existing and future background conditions capacity analysis (note: VDOT and/or count will provide an approved development year and annual growth rate).
 - d. Prepare a trip generation estimate for the agreed upon master plan using provided land uses and square footages
 - e. Estimate traffic at the Mill Place Parkway/Laurel Road intersection for the following two (2) scenarios:
 - i. Single park entrance at Mill Place Parkway/Laurel Road
 - ii. Multiple points of ingress/egress (i.e. reduced traffic at Mill Place Parkway/Laurel Road)
 - f. Perform future total conditions capacity analysis for the Mill Place Parkway/Laurel Road intersection for each of the aforementioned scenarios.
 - g. Prepare necessary documentation and incorporate analysis results into the final report.
- 2. Typical Roadway Sections for the proposed internal roadways in accordance with VDOT standards;
- 3. Summary of recommended geometric design criteria (i.e., VDOT functional class, recommended design speed, etc.) for all proposed roadway improvements;
- 4. One (1) planning-level cost estimate for internal roadways and offsite improvements such as traffic lights, turn lanes, etc. recommended under the master plan; and
- 5. An overall pedestrian circulation plan. This will include trail access points and parking areas consistent with County requirements (3 spaces for each fitness trail and 1 space for each picnic table).

5. Site Concepts & Preliminary Grading Concepts

Based upon the target sector / market analysis, Timmons Group will develop up to three concept plans for the park that will include an effort to balance out the site development and infrastructure improvements necessary to accommodate the potential industries / end users for the park.

Site concepts will be utilized to develop preliminary grading concepts and perform basic cut/fill analysis to determine a realistic development scenario. These numbers will be utilized to determine the order of magnitude site development costs (i.e. costs per developable acre) for developing a "pad ready" or "shovel ready" site to achieve a Tier 5 level site in today's market.

6. Stormwater Management Review and Recommendations

In conjunction with Site Concepts and Preliminary Grading Plan above, Timmons Group will review the existing stormwater management basin in place concurrent with the current stormwater management plans in place. We will make basic recommendations for stormwater implementation (i.e. LID's, individual on-site stormwater basins, regional facilities, etc.) for the concepts noted above and for future development. To date, two basins have been constructed and one additional basin has been designed with construction slated for early 2016.

7. Signage Concepts

Timmons will develop entrance concepts and signage concepts for the park that will provide for a "sense of arrival" that will be consistent with the County marketing strategy for the park and signage for the County.

8. Review of Zoning, Declaration of Covenants and Restrictions and Design Standards

In conjunction with the master planning process, Timmons Group will review the existing zoning currently in place as well as the Declaration of Covenants and Restrictions and Design Standards for the park. We will make recommendations as to what, if any rezoning might be required to accommodate the updated master plan and what, if any changes might be required to the Declaration of Covenants and Restrictions to be consistent with the master plan and updated zoning.

9. Business / Development Plan and Preliminary Engineering Report (PER)

Once the Master Planning exercise is complete, Timmons Group will develop a preliminary engineering report (PER) identifying the appropriate infrastructure upgrades on site required to serve the site and summarize the order of magnitude costs for those potential improvements based upon our experience in the region. We will identify any potential off-site improvements and potential order of magnitude costs associated with those improvements.

The Business / Development Plan will include a Capital Improvement Plan and Phasing Plan and will identify potential funding sources for the improvements of the park. We will identify build-out potential for the scenarios studied above and identify the potential number of jobs and investment (a reasonable assessment) based upon recent announcements in the industry.

This will provide the County with an outline for how to move forward with the development of the park and identify the appropriate costs per acre to develop the park such that the County can determine the appropriate return on investment model when negotiating with a prospect. We will provide appropriate metrics to compare the potential investment in this park relative to the potential for jobs and investment yield.

At the completion of the Master Planning exercise, Timmons Group will present the Master Plan and basic findings of the Preliminary Engineering Report to the County, during a scheduled staff briefing with the Board of Supervisors, noting strategies and options the County may want to take in its effort to best market the property and County. We will incorporate these comments into the final Master Plan, PER and Park Development / Business Plan.

Assumptions

The following assumptions have been made in preparation this scope of work:

- Topographical and environmental constraints will be available, and acceptable for use, in GIS format for preliminary evaluation (no field work required);
- All work will be maintained at concept level and no detail engineering design will be required;
- Existing utility information provided will be adequate for evaluation and additional investigation work will not be required;
- Subsurface conditions are assumed to be suitable for roadway construction without a preliminary geotechnical investigation on the site for the proposed road corridors.

Augusta County Responsibilities

Augusta County will be responsible for providing the following items.

- 1. Provide any existing due diligence reports or information available on the property.
- 2. Provide any existing environmental information on the site (previous wetlands, Phase 1 ESA's, etc.)
- 3. Coordinate right of entry to properties
- 4. Assistance with coordination of stakeholders for a Stakeholder Input meeting
- 5. Provide CAD drawings for previously prepared design (Roads, Infrastructure, Water & Sewer, etc.)
- 6. Provide recent PER based upon water tank installation and/or water models (if needed) & information relevant to capacity and wastewater process schematics at the ACSA Middle River treatment facilities and other information Consultant may deem necessary
- 7. Timely feedback (as soon as reasonably possible) on items submitted to the County and ACSA for their review
- 8. County will provide up to date topo survey on the site once completed

Deliverables

Timmons Group will provide the following deliverables:

- 1. Master Planning Document & Preliminary Engineering Report with sections as outlined above
- 2. Traffic Impact Analysis (meets Chapter 527)
- 3. Preliminary Plat for proposed Ordinance
- 4. Concept map with Zoning to meet requirements of Chapter 25 of the County Zoning Ordinance
- 5. In addition to one hard copy (printed and mounted on 24x36 size foam board) for each final plan, all marketing materials for the site will be provided in electronic media for easy modification by the County.

Project Schedule

Timmons Group will complete the above work in approximately 6-9 months from notice to proceed.

Please note this schedule takes into account timely feedback from the County, ACSA and VDOT in regards to issues related to the planning and development of the site.

Proposed Fee:

Timmons Group will perform this work under a lump-sum fixed-fee arrangement in accordance with the following fee schedule.

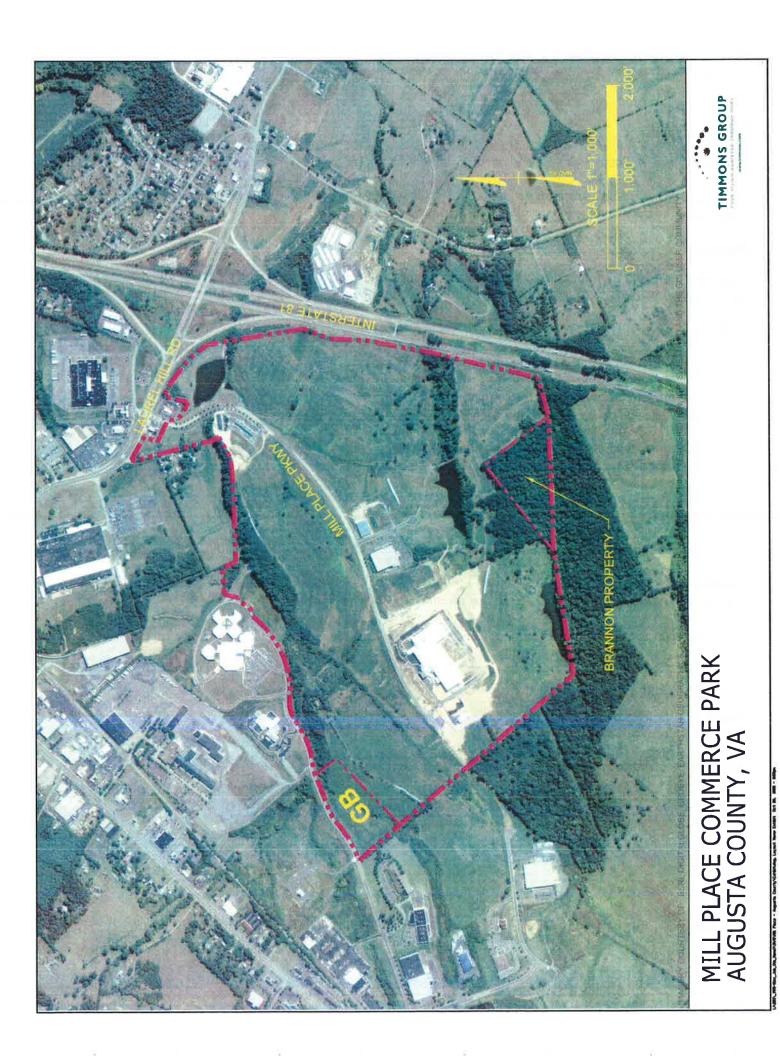

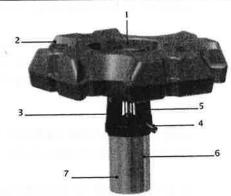

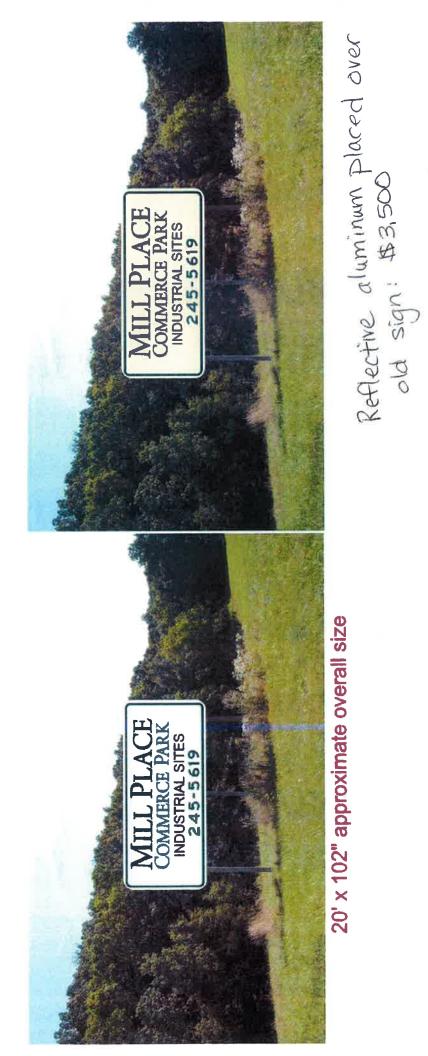

AUGUSTA COUNTY FIRE-RESCUE REPORT

September 2015

In September, fire and rescue agencies that serve the County of Augusta received a combined total of 1,467 calls, of which 46 were calls turned over to next due agencies. Of those calls turned over, 22 were due to being on a previous call. Fire agencies received 607 fire and EMS calls, of which 21 were turned over to next due agencies. Rescue agencies received 860 EMS calls, of which 23 were turned over to next due agencies.

Chief Carson Holloway conducted 20 station visits and responded to 3 Duty Officer calls. The Chief attended numerous staff meetings, a Truck Committee meeting, an Emergency Services Committee meetings, meetings with New Hope Volunteer Officers, and the ACESOA meeting. He participated in the monthly Chiefs' Luncheon, the Boards & Commissions dinner, a Hazmat Drill, and multiple meetings and conference calls regarding weather briefings. Chief Holloway conducted 3 interviews for fulltime positions and an ACFR Officer level training session on the evaluation process. He continued to work on SAFER grant award documentation and staffing throughout the month.

Budget Analyst, Corey Richie participated in numerous staff meetings and SAFER grant meetings. She completed the 2011 SAFER closeout, participated in the EMS billing vendor interviews and selection, as well as a conference call with Finance and the current vendor. Revenue recovery funds collected during the month were \$86,485.83. September transport numbers; Deerfield-3, Churchville-32, Stuarts Draft-93, Preston L. Yancey-110, Craigsville-Augusta Springs-30, New Hope-8, Mount Solon-12, Riverheads-41, and Weyers Cave-24, total for the month-353.

Volunteer Coordinator Lieutenant Minday Craun worked on several projects in September, including preparing for a public awareness event; "Touch a Truck", to be held on October 11th at Lowes of Staunton for all Fire and EMS. She worked with the Greater Augusta Regional Chamber of Commerce in providing volunteer fire and medical support for an event they hosted at Shenandoah Acres. Lt. Craun also participated in the Shenandoah Valley Regional Airport Disaster Drill providing support in getting volunteers to assist with being patients. She visited several agencies and attended several other meetings during the month. Statistics for September 2015 include 25 recruitment contacts, 25 volunteer visits and 17 station visits.

The Training Division instructed and/or provided logistics for FFI, ACFR Company Drill, Volunteer Officer Hours, ACFR Pump Tests, Burn Building usage, VCTC, BPO/RWS for new hires, ACSA Fire Extinguisher Training, BPO, and EMT; 398 students with 3,582.5 student man-hours.

Battalion Commander Nathan Ramsey conducted 20 station visits and responded to 5 Duty Officer calls. He continues to order and stock EMS supplies. BC Ramsey had several meetings with the BCs, Chief, and EMS Supervisors, attended Middlebrook's membership meeting and assisted with their RSAF grant. He assisted with the ACFR Company Drills, prepared the old 10-07 to be sold, assisted in distributing new Minitor XI pagers to staff, and with Medic Class at CSEMS. In addition, he hosted ALS skills drill, attended the Chief's evaluation training, and the after action review of the school bus crash. BC Ramsey reviewed staff timesheets, and attended the Hazmat Drill. He met with the School Board on County AEDs that will need to be replaced in the near future.

Battalion Commander Schacht responded to 7 Duty Officer calls, reviewed 3, and conducted 40 station visits. He continues to attend Station 11 and Station 18 volunteer membership meetings, numerous meetings with ACFR staff personnel, and a meeting with Fort Defiance High School on the Emergency Services Recognition game. BC Schacht met with the Hiring Committee to develop a hiring plan for SAFER personnel, attended a meeting on Fire Boxes, and a meeting with the Truck Personnel Selection Committee. In addition he attended the Fire Wise Community 5 year dedication to Chinquapin Subdivision, worked with a new part-time employee, attended 3 Career training skills days, taught Building Construction to the FFI Class, conducted 2 football standbys, and administered pump tests to staff.

Battalion Commander Jeff Hurst responded to 4 Duty Officer calls and conducted 48 station visits, delivering supplies and equipment. He completed 2 hours of online Fire Rescue Academy training, coordinated the September 26th Hazmat Drill, and the remaining hose testing for volunteer departments. BC Hurst assisted admin staff with developing a hiring plan for SAFER, met with vendors for services and pricing, and attended dam inspections. In addition, participated with the Ladder Truck Committee in finalizing the specifications for pricing. BC Hurst continues to manage the department's drug testing program, vehicle fleet maintenance, and Quartermaster duties. He attended several staff meetings and has been working on employee evaluations throughout the month.

The Shift Captains made multiple station visits and responded to a combined total of 26 calls as Duty Officer. They attended several meetings, participated in training, coordinated or provided coverage, and worked on various station projects throughout the month.

EMS Supervisor Rod Pierce administered the CQI, Precepting, and Infection Control programs, conducted EMS scenario practice and other precepting to prepare staff to be released at new ALS levels, and prepared and ran the ALS skills drill for A shift and daylight shift 2. EMS Supervisor Pierce participated in billing company interviews, represented ACFR at Augusta Health during an audit for Ebola preparedness by the Virginia Department of Health, worked with Linda Beathe in getting the Active911 App set up for staff to demo for a 120 day free trial, and worked with BC Ramsey to prepare for the conversion to a 24hr shift and new EMS Supervisors. He was standby at 1 football game, assisted on 15 EMS calls, participated in daily training at Co10 and Co11.

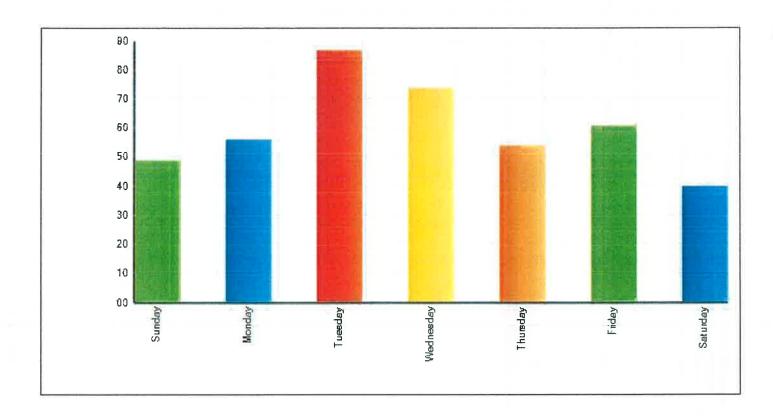

### Calls For Service by Day of Week

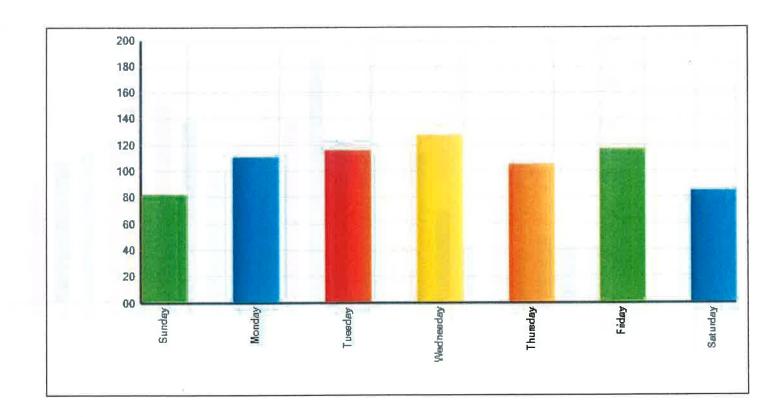

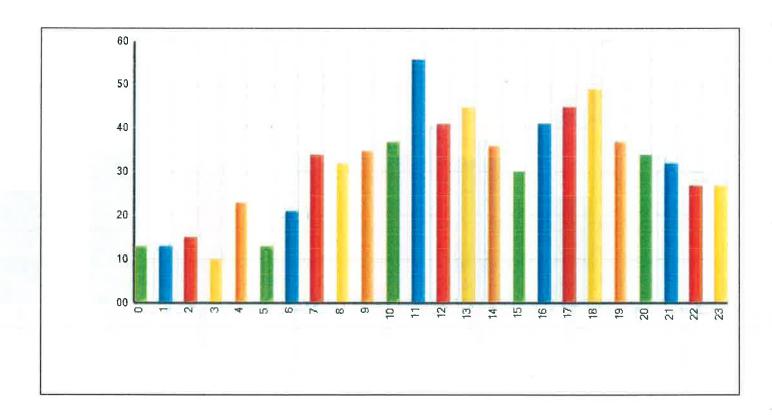

#### Calls For Service by Hour of Day

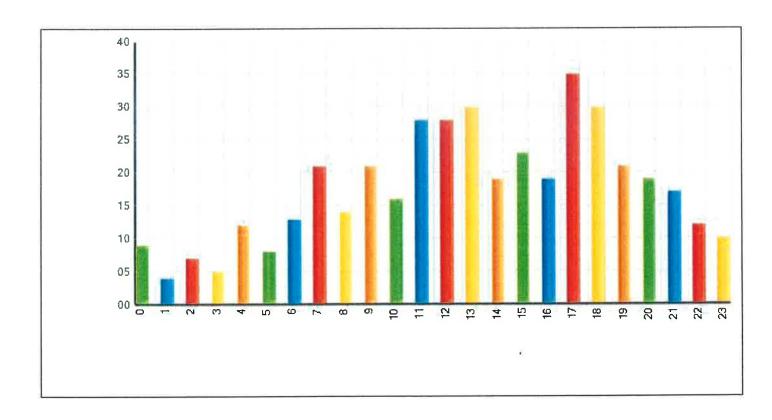

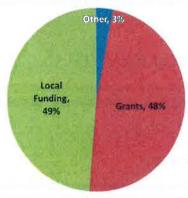

## How impactful is the OOY Office?

An office of 10 full-time staff and 5 part-time staff served 7,606 youth or over one-third (35%) of all school aged youth in the Staunton, Waynesboro, and Augusta County area. In addition, OOY staff served 177 parents.

The Office on Youth reached youth and families through drop-out prevention, juvenile crime prevention, teen pregnancy prevention, substance abuse prevention, employment training, and family support programs.

Refund Requested by Valentina Hristova

On October 18, in accordance with Section 58.1-3981 of the Code of Virginia the Commissioner of Revenue delivered a memorandum reporting that she had corrected the assessment of Valentina Hristova and has certified that the sum of \$2,671.59 was over paid by the tax payer. Ms. Hristova owns a cleaning business. Under the provision of the State Code, the Commissioner of Revenue has requested that the Board of Supervisors authorize the Treasurer to refund the sum over paid.

Section 58.1-3981 of the Code of Virginia reads in part:

If the commissioner of the revenue, or other official performing the duties imposed on commissioners of the revenue under this title, is satisfied that he has erroneously assessed such applicant with any such tax, he shall correct such assessment. If the assessment exceeds the proper amount, he shall exonerate the applicant from the payment of so much as is erroneously charged if not paid into the treasury of the county or city. If the assessment has been paid, the governing body of the county or city shall, upon the certificate of the commissioner with the consent of the town, city or county attorney, or if none, the attorney for the Commonwealth, that such assessment was erroneous, direct the treasurer of the county, city or town to refund the excess to the taxpayer, with interest if authorized pursuant to § 58.1-3918 or in the ordinance authorized by § 58.1-3916, or as otherwise authorized in that section. However, the governing body of the county, city or town may authorize the treasurer to approve and issue any refund up to \$2,500 as a result of an erroneous assessment.

Before the Board can authorize a refund, the consent of the County Attorney is necessary. I have researched all of the facts that I could before making any recommendation.

The original assessments were statutory assessments made by the Commissioner because Ms. Hristova failed to file business personal property tax returns. Ms. Hristova has since presented the Commissioner with detailed federal and state tax returns that prove the true value of her business personal property for the tax years subject of this request.

Under the provisions of Section 58.1-3980 of the Code of Virginia, a taxpayer may apply for a correction for all assessments within three years of the last day of the tax year. That is why the correction involves tax years 2012, 2013, and 2014. I have examined the material that was presented to the Commissioner and found the documents to be in order. Therefore, I recommend that this Board authorize a refund of \$461.70 for tax year 2012, \$932.33 for tax year 2013 and \$1,277.56 for tax year 2014 for a total sum of \$2,671.59 to Valentina Hristova.

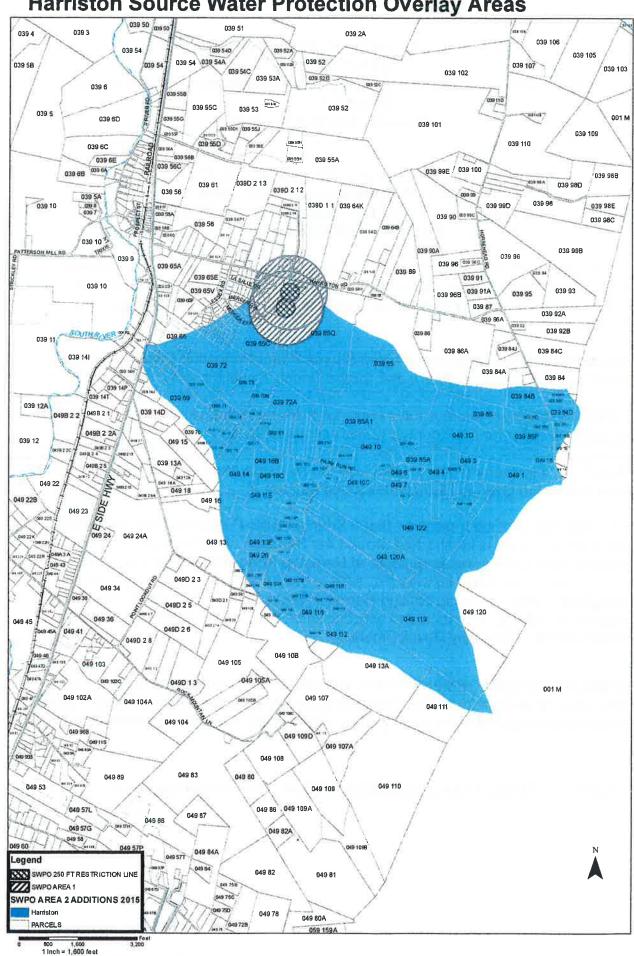

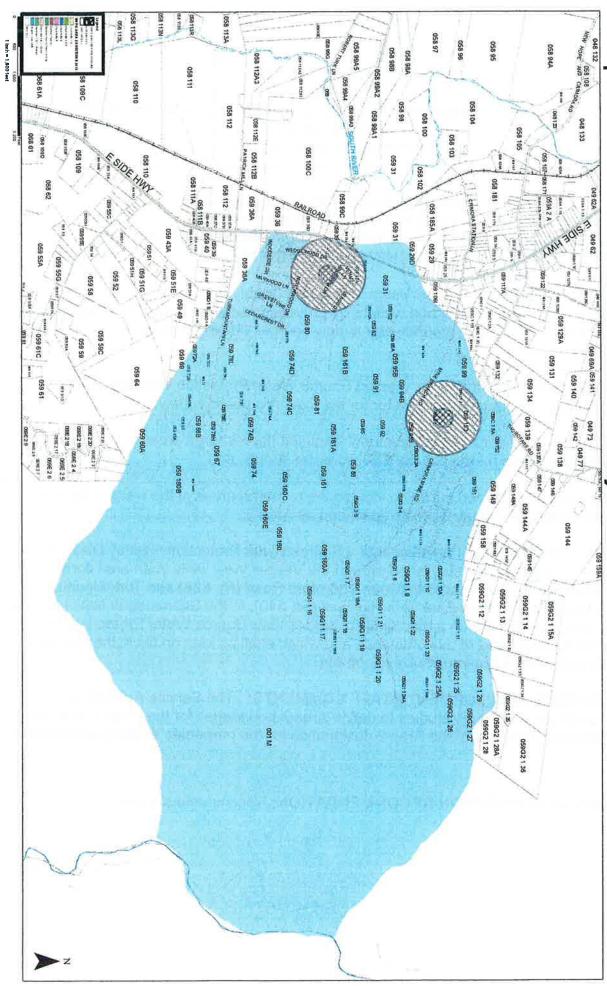

(Rt. 834) in the South River District.

#### PROPOSED PROFFERS:

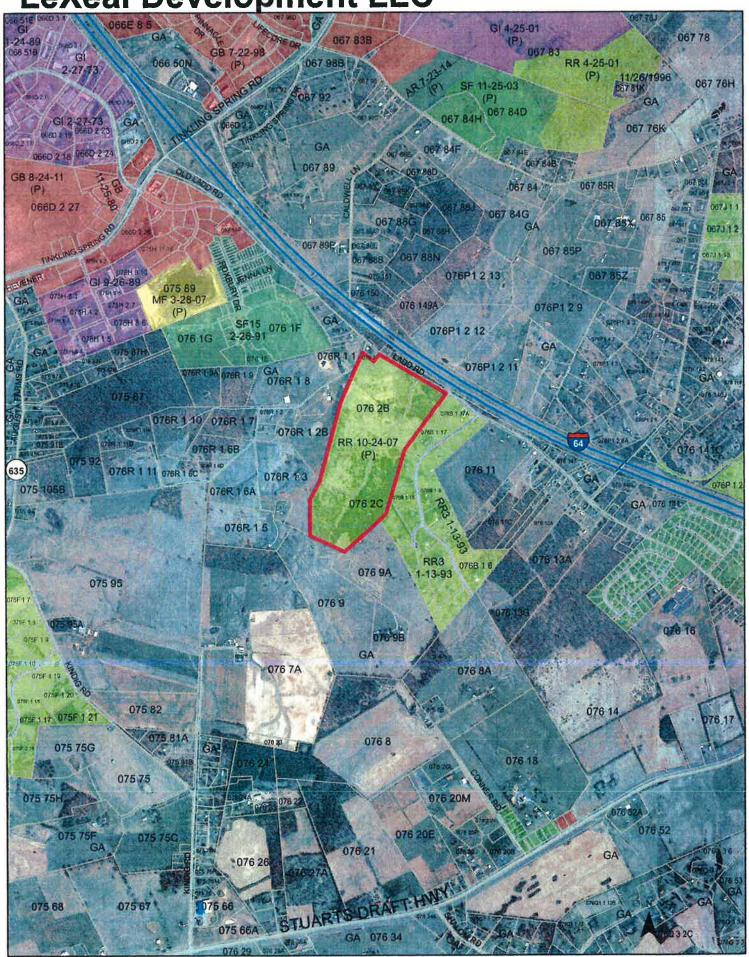

### **PROPOSED PROFFERS:**

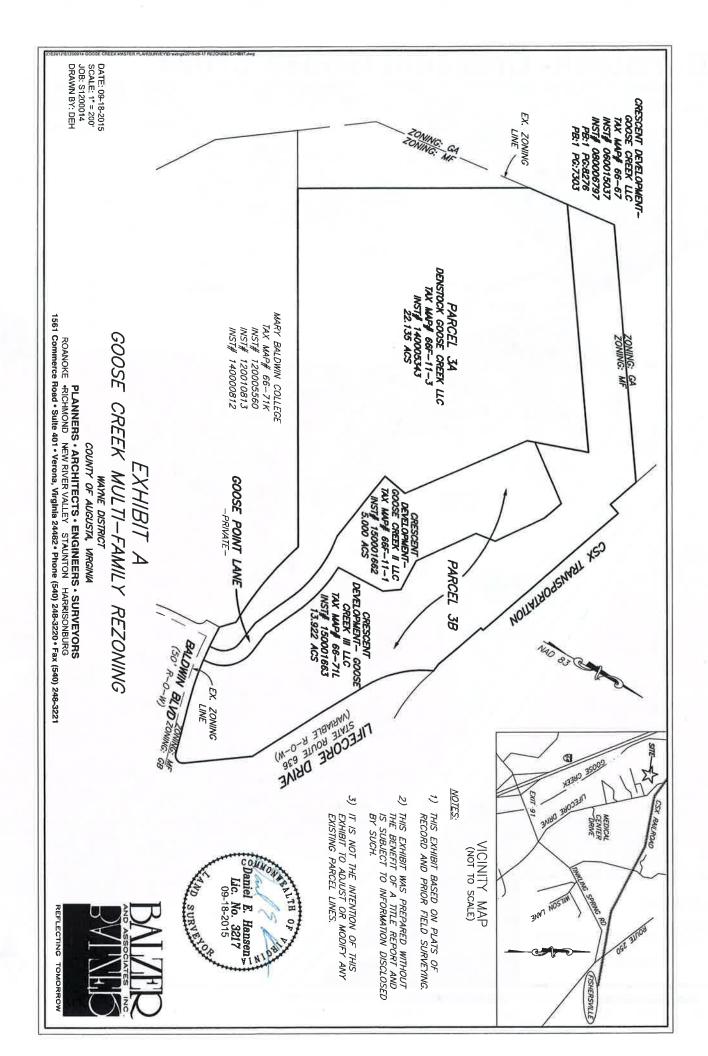
school board staff comments: The rezoning of approximately 41 acres zoned Multi-family to amend existing proffers to increase density from 250 to 400 units will have an impact on the above schools. If rezoned and once fully developed, the additional 150 housing units added to the already existing approved and/or pending units, has the potential of exceeding current instructional student capacity levels at WES and WMS. Although, WMHS is approaching capacity with no plans for expansion, students from this development would need to be absorbed. If this request and the request for Tax Map 66C(1)2 and 2C; 66-72; 66-92; and 66-74A; and 66C1(1)1 are approved then the impact will offset each other keeping these three (3) schools status quo regarding potential units and their impact.

**COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT STAFF COMMENTS:** In 2006, this property was zoned Attached Residential and townhouses and duplexes built on a portion of the property. In 2012, the property was rezoned from Attached Residential to Multi-Family Residential with a proffered density of 250 units. A portion of the property was sold to allow for the construction of the Murphy Deming School of Health Sciences. Along with the college, 204 apartments have been built. This request is to amend the proffers to allow for a total of 400 apartments to be built on the 41 acres.

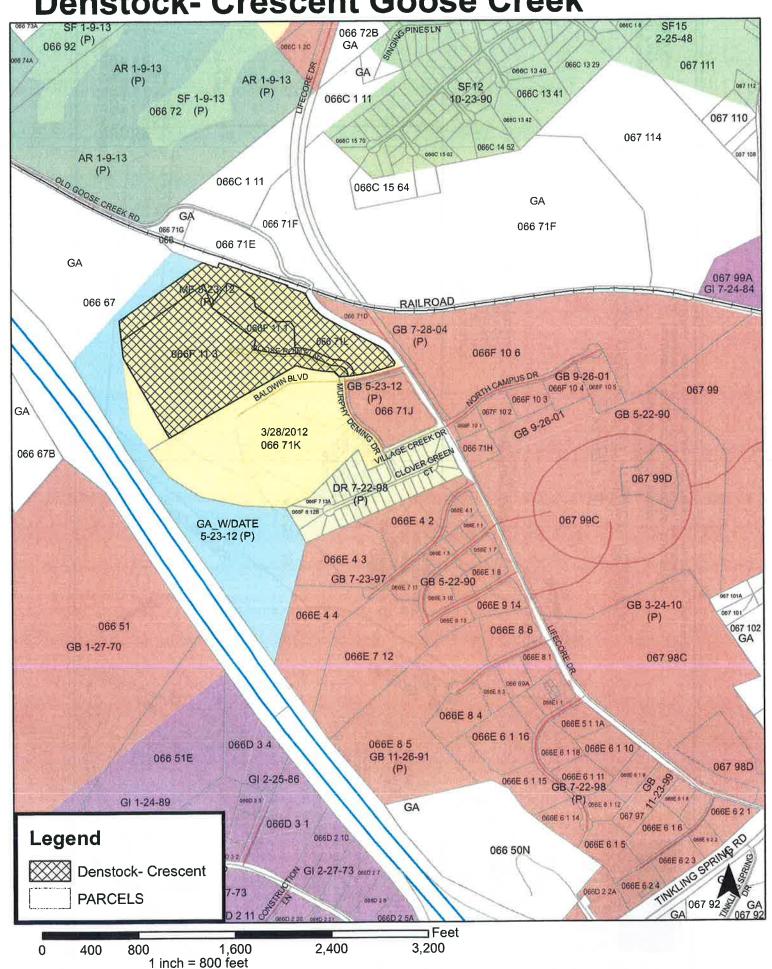
One way to look at the request is they are not seeking a substantial increase in apartment units in the area. Currently, 6.348 acres of Myers Corner is zoned Multi-Family Residential. Crescent is seeking to change that zoning to General Business which could result in 127 less by right units in Myers Corner. They are in essence asking to move the MF density from Myers Corner to Village at Goose Creek. This request is for an increase of 150 units, but if you consider they are moving 127 units from Myers Corner, the net increase in the area is only 23 units. However, the overall density on this tract will exceed the 4-8 units per acre called for on the Comprehensive Plan Future Land Use Map.

**COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT STAFF RECOMMENDATION:** Normally, staff wouldn't support an increase in the density of a development once it has been approved, especially one that exceeds the recommendations of the Comprehensive Plan. However, in this case, the net additional units when considered in tandem with the other Crescent Development request is relatively minor. All other proffers remain the same on the property. **SUMMARY OF REQUEST:** A request to rezone 6.348 acres from Multi-Family Residential to General Business, .004 acre from Multi-Family Residential to Single Family Residential, 46.209 acres from Attached Residential to Single Family Residential, and 8.024 acres from Single Family Residential to Attached Residential owned by Crescent Development Group, LLC and Melissa Jurick located in the southwest quadrant of the intersection of Jefferson Highway (Rt. 250) and Lifecore Dr. (Rt. 636)/Woodrow Wilson Avenue (Rt. 358) in Fishersville in the Wayne District. This request also restates the existing proffers on the entire 122 acres known as Myers Corner.

### **EXISTING AND RESTATED PROFFERS:**
