March 21, 2016

Mr. Shull (Riverheads)

- RTE 717 (Stagecoach Rd.) New pipe has been installed, work complete.

Mrs. Bragg (South River)

- Update on Route 610 (Howardsville Turnpike) – design complete, in R/W phase.
- RTE 656 (Offliter Rd) - speed study in progress, this road is scheduled for resurfacing in 2017.
- RTE 970 (Hall School Rd.) speed study recommends 45 MPH, scheduling sign installation.
- RTE 632 (Shalom Road) has several speed zones between Route 340 and Route 664 due to various roadside developments; we will see if it warrants consolidations, we will review further.

Mr. Coleman (Wayne)

- WWRC are working with VA LOGOs for directional signs on Route 285 at Route 636 (Lifecore Drive)
- Route 794 (Sanger Lane) grading and spot stone placement completed. Waiting on environmental clearances for ditch and pipe cleanouts.
- Route 795 (Entry School Road) repairs are being addressed.

Mr. Kelley (Beverly Manor)

- Update on Route 612 Project – design is complete; working on R/W and utilities relocations.

Mr. Garber (Middle River)

- RTE 1916 Rural Rustic tree removal is still underway and will be completed by the April. Construction phase of this project to begin in July 2016.
- RTE 616 Rural Rustic tree removal has been completed. Construction phase scheduled for July 2016.

Mr. Pattie (North River)

- RTE 742 (Lebanon Church Rd) asphalt and scratching repairs will begin as soon as asphalt plants have opened up in mid-April.
- RTE 730 (North River Road) Ms. Eaver's drainage concerns have been reviewed and are being addressed.

- Intersection RTE 262 and RTE 613 (Springhill Road) – intersection traffic engineering safety study has been requested.

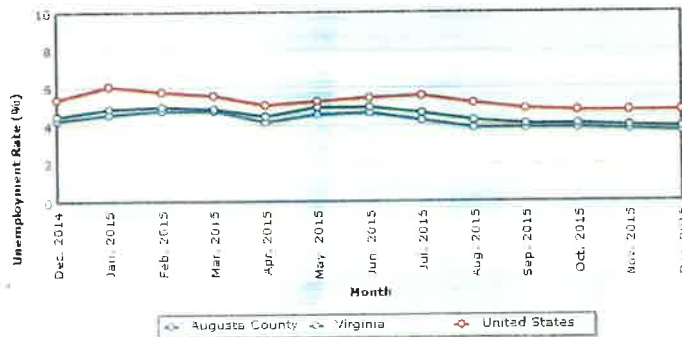

Past 12 Months

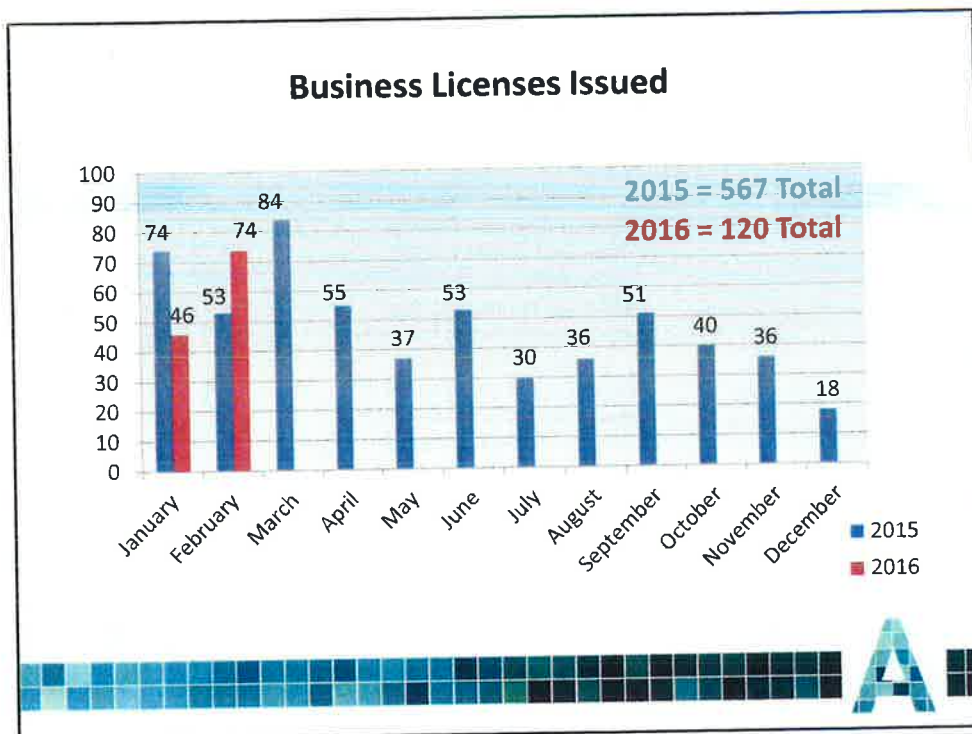

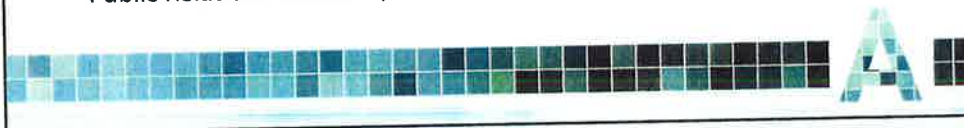

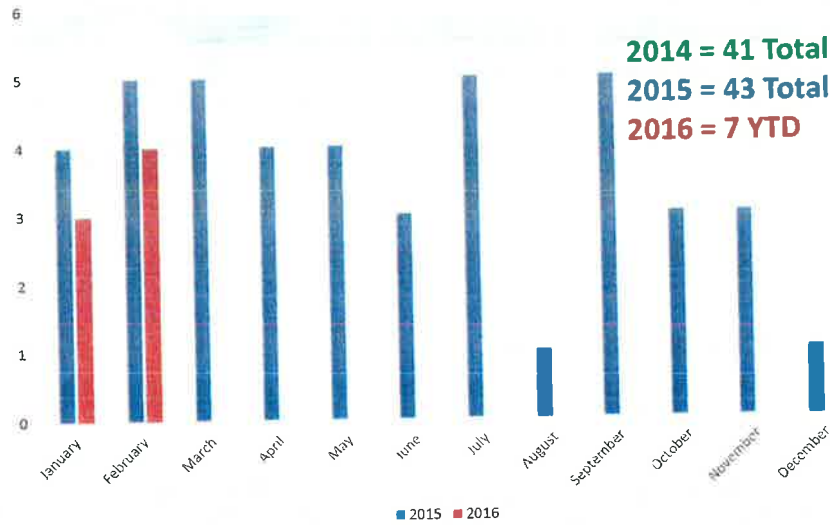

AUGUSTA COUNTY FIRE-RESCUE REPORT

February 2016

In February, fire and rescue agencies that serve the County of Augusta received a combined total of 1,455 calls, of which 48 were calls turned over to next due agencies. Of those calls turned over, 27 were due to being on a previous call. Fire agencies received 576 fire and EMS calls, of which 15 were turned over to next due agencies. Rescue agencies received 879 EMS calls, of which 33 were turned over to next due agencies.

Chief Carson Holloway worked with the County Administrator on Fire-Rescue Administrative and Operational structure. He attended the Augusta County School Safety Audit meeting, the BRCC Drill meeting, met with the Sheriff's Office to discuss department assistance, and participated in an FY17 budget meeting. Chief Holloway also attended the annual Fire & Rescue Conference (12 hours- Leadership Management Symposium), a Volunteer Recruitment and Retention meeting, a DFP training meeting, an 8 hour 1033 Investigator Recertification, and a 2 hour class on maximizing Quint effectiveness. In addition, he attended the monthly Chiefs' Luncheon, Emergency Services Committee meeting, Staff Briefing, and a meeting at Wilson Volunteer Fire Company. The Chief along with other staff traveled to KME for the Ladder Truck prebuild. He participated in Region 3 weather conference calls, attended a volunteer Chiefs' dinner, the ACESOA meeting, and several admin staff meetings.

Budget Analyst, Corey Richie continued working with Intermedix on transition. She met with the Chief, Finance, and County Admin on FY17 budget, participated in several meetings regarding Imagetrend upgrade, and several admin staff meetings. Revenue Recovery funds collected in February were \$29,939.44. February transport numbers; Deerfield-9, Churchville-30, Stuarts Draft-108, Preston L. Yancey-81, Craigsville-Augusta Springs-29, New Hope Vol-7, New Hope Career-6, Mount Solon-13, Riverheads-48, and Weyers Cave-34, total for the month-365.

Volunteer Coordinator Lieutenant Minday Craun continues to visit area high schools setting up recruitment displays with the volunteer agencies. She met with several agencies to discuss recruitment strategies. Lt. Craun is working with multiple agencies on different projects including; TimeClock, banquets, and ACFR's promotional ceremony. She also worked with staff on budget preparation for Mr. Fitzgerald. In addition, Lt. Craun participated in the State Recruitment and Retention meeting. She also participated in several other agencies/meetings. Statistics for February 2016 include; 175 recruitment contacts, 10 public education contacts, 14 volunteer visits, 24 station visits, and 2 training events.

The Training Division instructed and/or provided logistics for Fire Academy Class, Volunteer Officer Training, VCTC, SAFER BPO/RWS, SAFER Fire Skills, CE Class, and EMT; 84 students with 3,389 student man-hours.

Battalion Commander Nathan Ramsey conducted 18 station visits, ran 4 Duty Officer calls, ordered and stocked EMS supplies for the department, and ordered accountability tags for volunteer and career staff. He had several meetings with the BCs and Chief and the EMS Supervisors, attended Company 3 and Rescue 6 membership meetings, and updated ACFR's Emergency Response Plan. BC Ramsey prepared the new ambulance for service, met with the OMDs and updated the contact for the coming year. He assisted the Training Division in training the new staff, taught a Command Class at Stuarts Draft Fire Company, and met with the health and wellness committee to develop a plan on physical fitness.


Battalion Commander Schacht conducted 23 station visits, responded to 4 Duty Officer calls, and reviewed 9 site plans. He attended Station 11 and Station 18 meetings, numerous staff meetings, meetings with the Chief, the BOS meeting, and a VDOF meeting. BC Schacht met with the building official on the hood system at Station 11 and Lovegrove Construction on the Station 11 bathroom renovations. He attended the Chiefs' Luncheon, a volunteer banquet, and the 2016 Fire & Rescue Conference. In addition, BC Schacht conducted EMS skills training with the new hires, burning exercises, and other fire skills training.

Battalion Commander Jeff Hurst conducted 38 station visits and responded to 4 Duty Officer calls. He continued to manage vehicle maintenance and repairs and issue uniforms and gear as it arrived. BC Hurst worked on a plan to reprogram the Opticom systems throughout the County on emergency vehicles that are equipped. He continued to collectively work with policy writing and review of existing policies. In addition, he participated with the new hires during orientation at their PTSD and Burn Building training exercises, attended the prebuild conference at KME for new ladder truck, and continued to administrate the current drug and alcohol testing program. BC Hurst conducted training on the online Fire Academy, attended a meeting with Chief Holloway at BRCC to talk about training and a possible drill, attended Chiefs' Luncheon, and attended the retirement social for Mr. Coffield. He also attended the public relations event hosted by Community Development at Accutec Blade and made several volunteer contacts throughout the County.

The Shift Captains made multiple station visits and responded to a combined total of 11 calls as Duty Officer. They attended several meetings, participated in training, coordinated or provided coverage, and worked on various station projects, as well as assisting with storm preparations.

EMS Supervisors responded to a total of 46 calls, 15 of which ALS assistance was provided. The EMS Supervisors continue to administer the Infection Control Program, CQI, precepting, and conduct or participate in various station training. In addition, they assisted with various training of new hires.

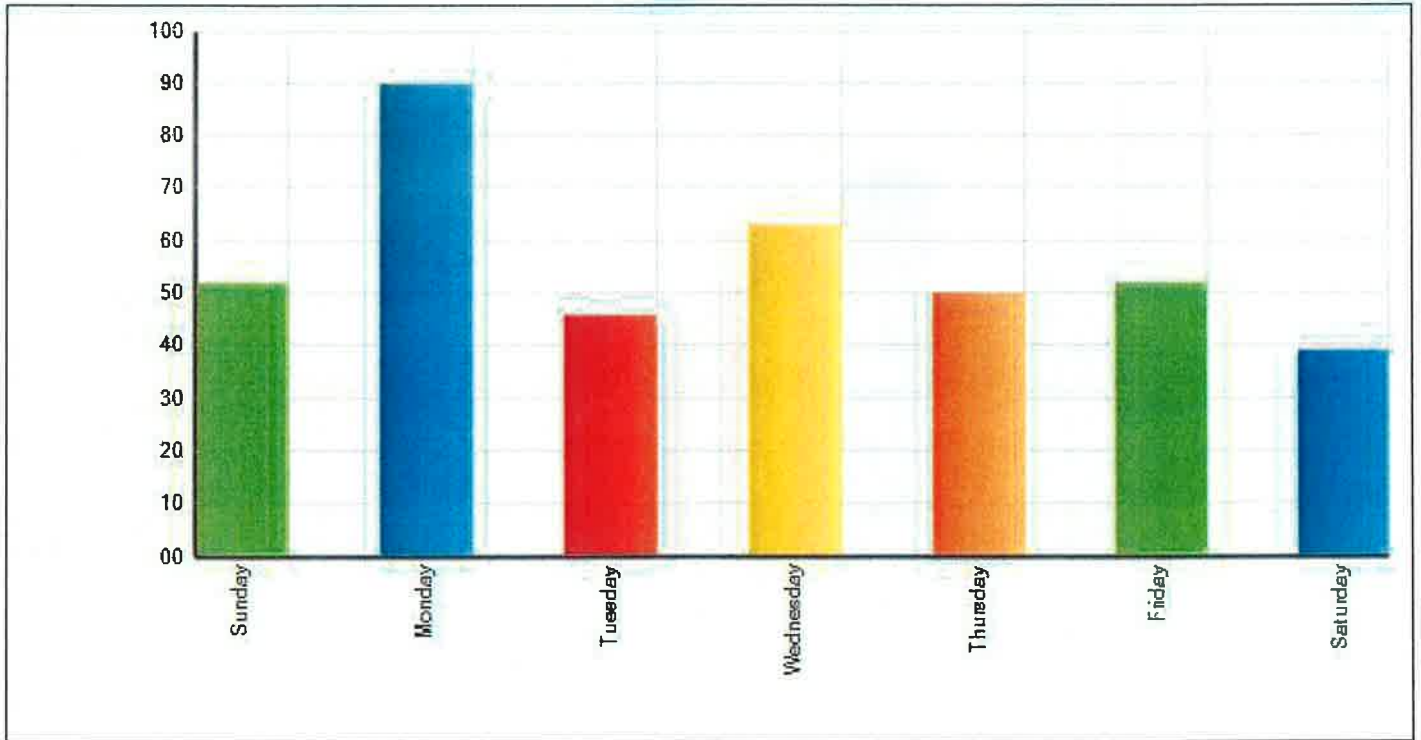

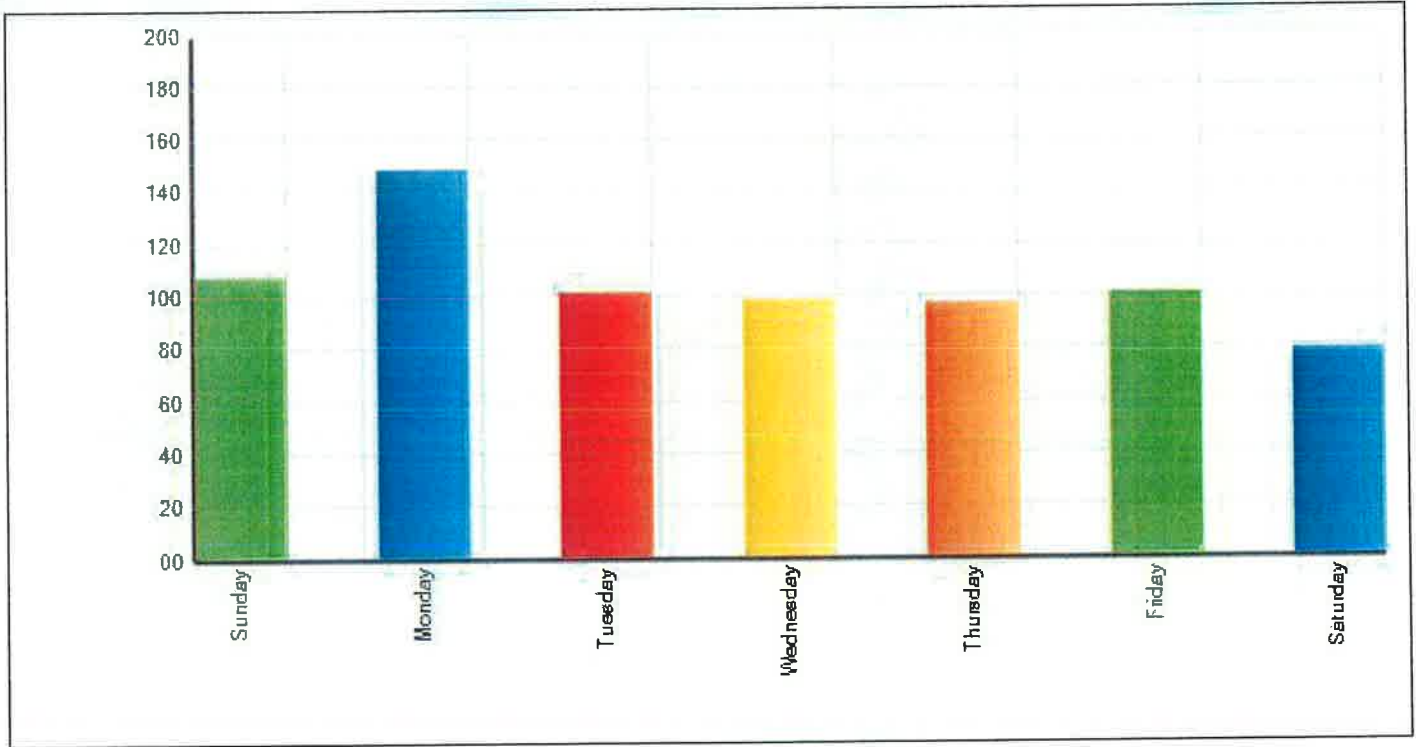

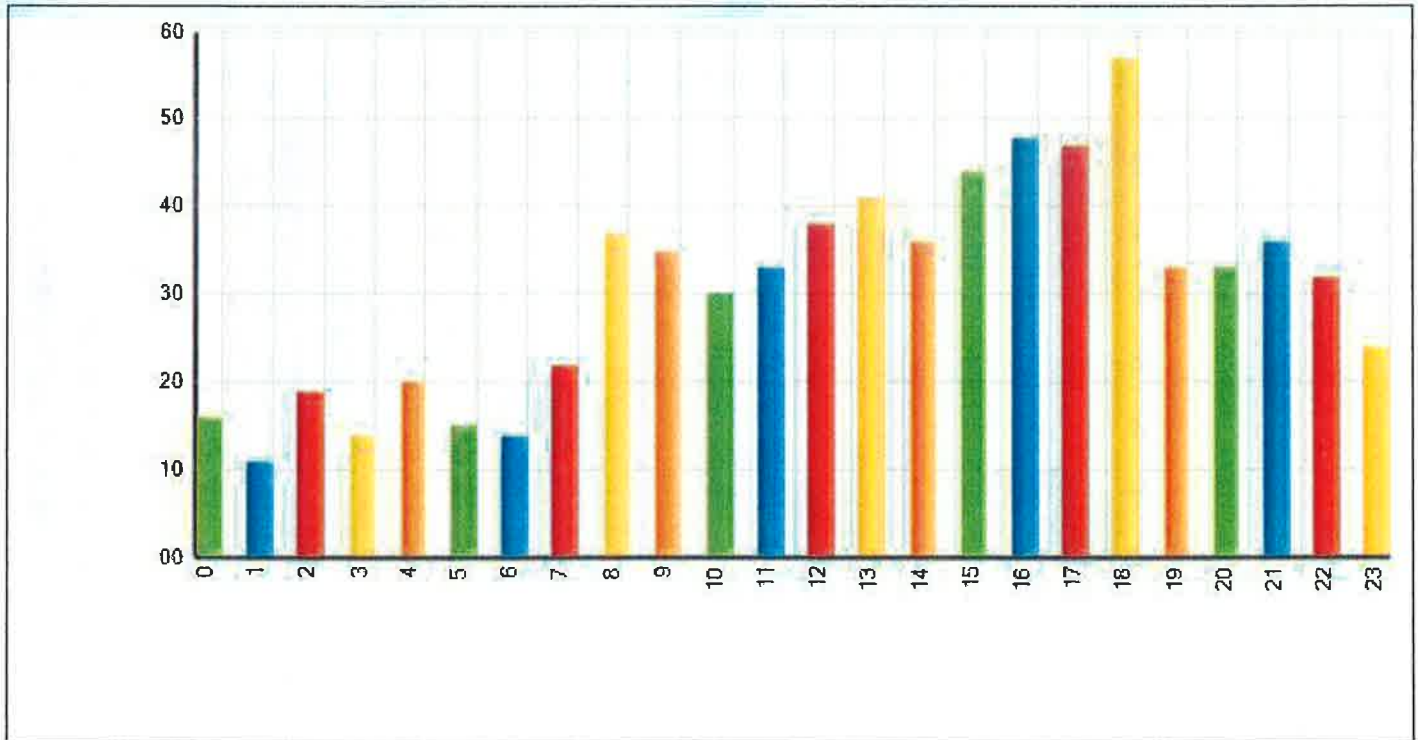

Calls For Service by Hour of Day

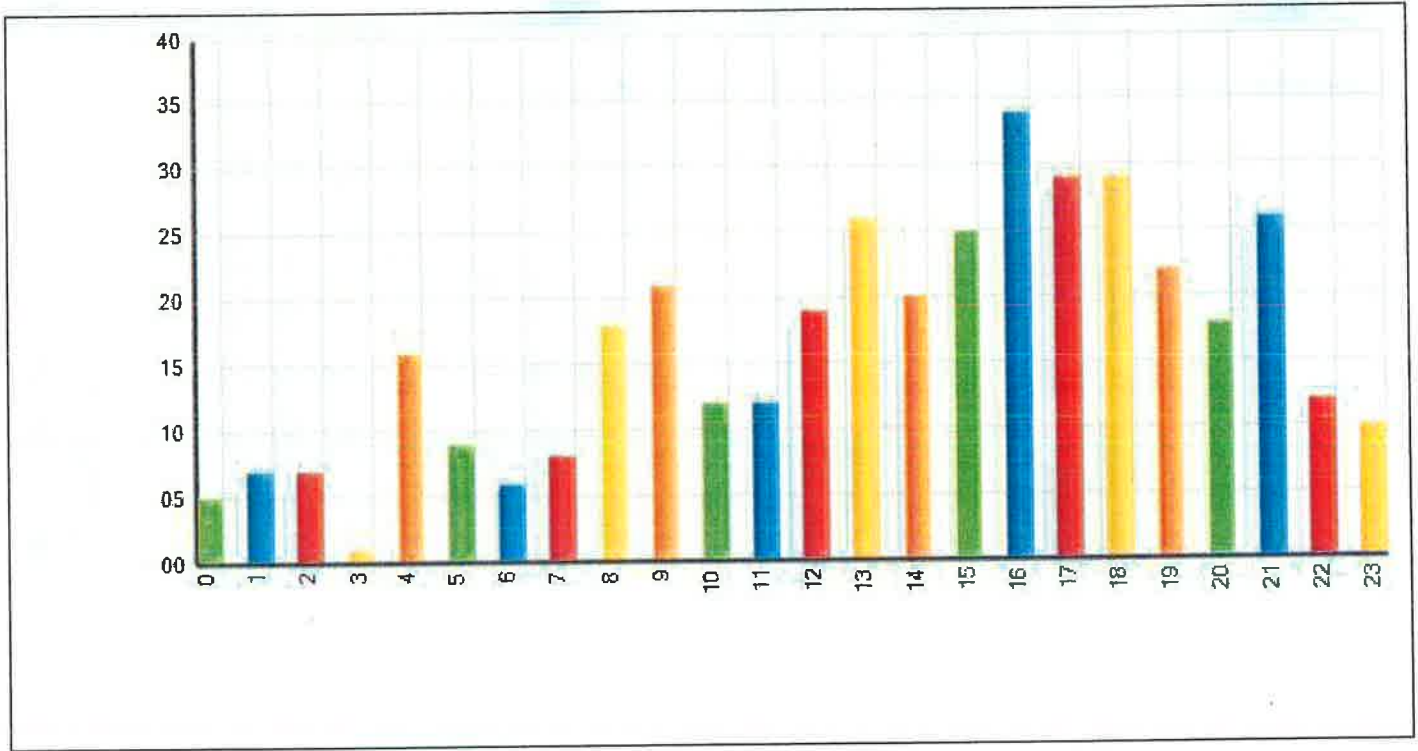

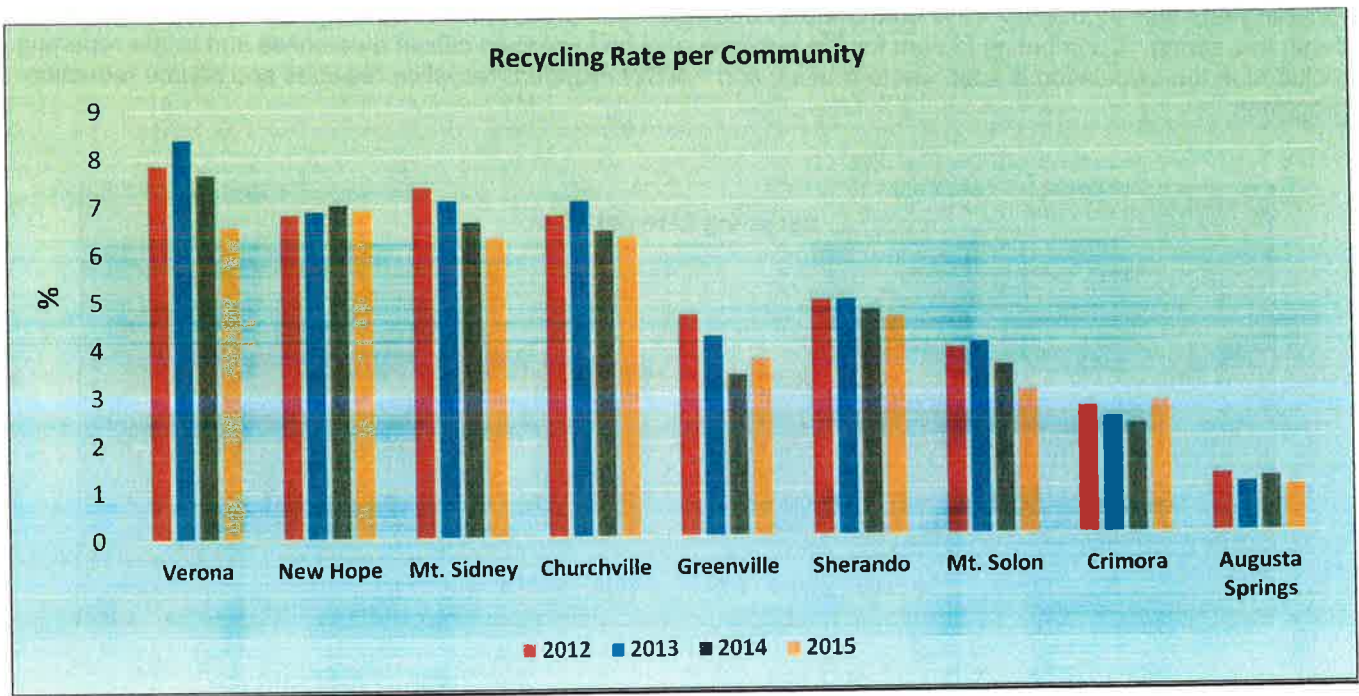
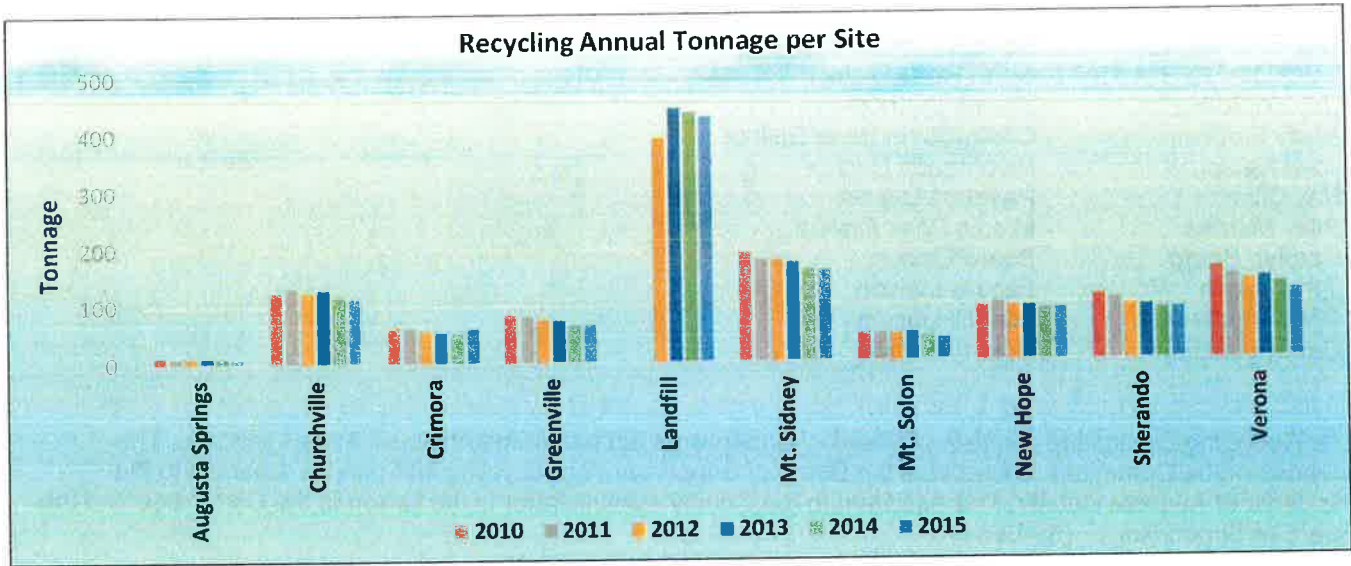
Recycling Rate

The State of Virginia currently requires a 25% recycling rate (VA Code §10.1-1411). In 2014, Augusta County, Staunton and Waynesboro's recycling rate was 40.6%, up 1.7% from the previous year. The State's overall recycling rate was 42.5%, up 1.3% from the previous year. The process for calculating 2015's recycling rate will begin this spring. Contributing factors for the increase may be increased citizen awareness and better reporting. Included in the calculation is solid waste reused, non – MSW recycled, recycling residues and source reduction programs.



Recycling by Community

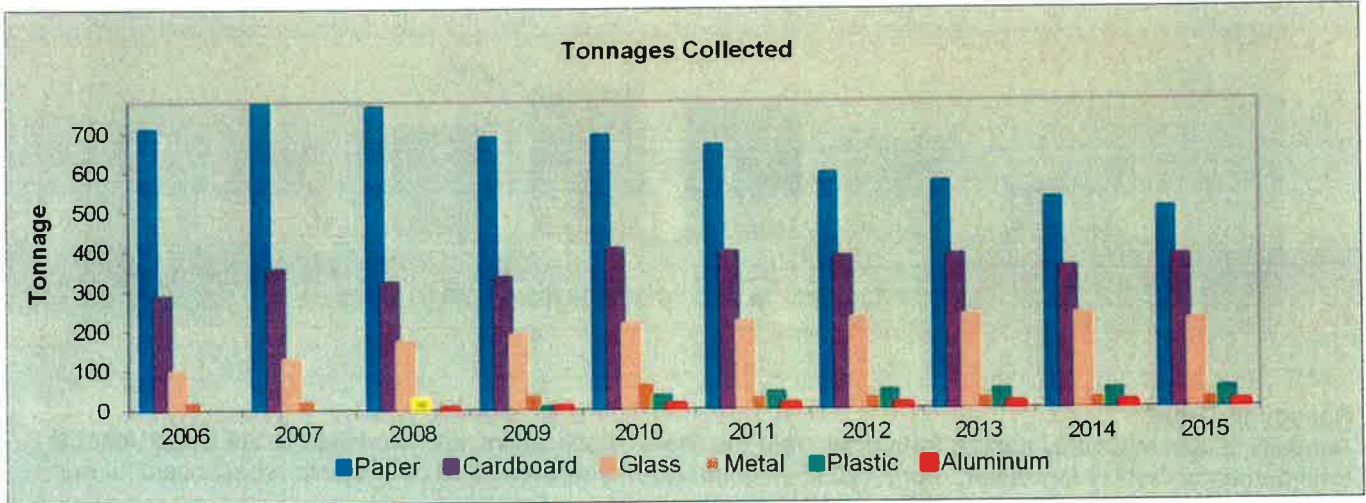
In 2010, the Recycling Committee began looking at recycling rates for communities (compactor sites). The Recycling Committee also started recognizing communities with the highest percentage collected. The hope is to increase recycling through community competition. The communities are recognized with a recycling champ sign that is displayed at the compactor site. This percentage is based on the total waste collected at the site and the percentage that is recycled.

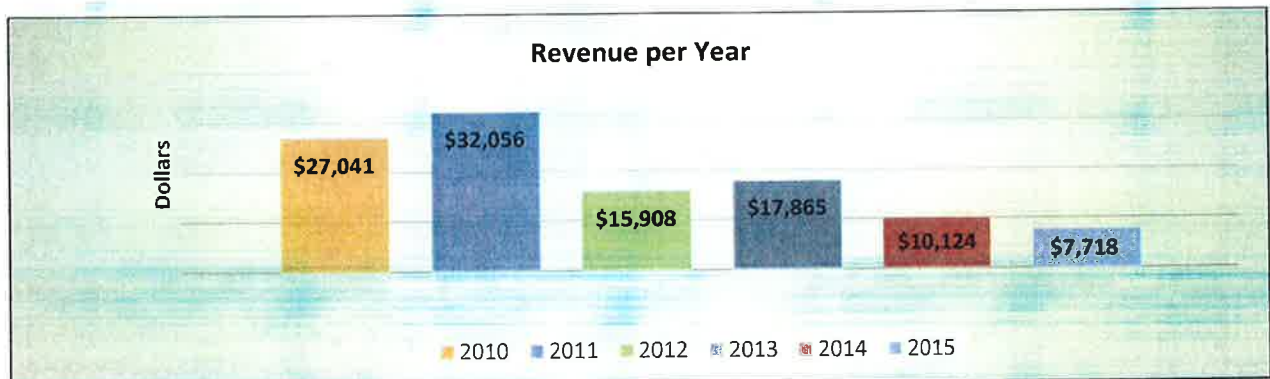

Recycling Grant

Annually, Augusta County applies for a grant from the State. Applications are submitted to the Department of Environmental Quality for review. For FY2015 Augusta County received \$18,062 to help off-set costs for our recycling program.

Landfill staff executed an agreement with Goodwill Industries in 2010 in order for Goodwill to place a pod at the Landfill and provide an attendant 2 to 3 days per week. Residents may drop off computers, small electronics, furniture, clothing, shoes, etc. In 2015, 54 tons was collected and averted from the landfill.

Spring Clean-Up Event

Augusta County has sponsored a Spring Clean-up event for 22 years. The County budgets \$25,000 to pay expenses, mainly tire recycling.

This event not only gives waiver to 6 or less tires per households at the Augusta Regional Landfill, but coordinates community clean-up events with area Ruritan Clubs. The County pays the cost for hauling open-top containers to the Landfill. The following can be reported for participating Clubs:

Additional services for citizens included providing an additional open-top container and collection of appliances and white goods at compactor sites. Please note that the County has partnered with Rose Time Scrap Metal and Recycling to collect appliances and white goods at their cost as well as handle freon. In return they retain the revenue.

Fall Household Hazardous Waste Collection Event

At the Fall Household Hazardous Waste event, Committee Members and volunteers provided service to 169 vehicles that dropped off herbicides, pesticides, oil-based paint, antifreeze, batteries, used oil, and other chemicals from the County, Staunton and Waynesboro. Invista proudly sponsored our event.

The Recycling Committee also partnered with Goodwill Industries to accept computers, computer equipment, small kitchen appliances, and small electronics. Goodwill Industries recycles the equipment that cannot be reused.

Local High school teachers and students volunteered services.

Invista continues to sponsor this event at no cost to Augusta County. This costs Invista approximately \$15,000. Staunton and Waynesboro do not host events at this time, but they do send employees to help.

Christmas Tree Recycling

The Recycling Committee promotes Christmas tree recycling annually. Staff coordinates efforts with local Ruritan Clubs and area contractors to recycle the trees. Trees are dropped off at many of the satellite locations. The County also partnered with Black Bear Composting in Crimora. Black Bear collected trees from Crimora and New Hope compactor sites at no cost to the County. They will be placed in their compost pile.

Public Outreach and Education

The Recycling Committee performs many outreach activities every year. The past year the Committee:

- Displayed materials relating to the Household Hazardous Waste Event and Recycling
- Advertised the annual Spring Clean-Up Week and Household Hazardous Waste Collection Event
- Manned a booth at the Augusta County Fair and Sweet Dreams
- Posted recycling information on the County's website
- Spoke with children at various schools
- Gave tours of the landfill

Many years ago the Recycling Committee made recycling education kits that were distributed to elementary schools in the County. The kits were available to aid teachers when teaching their unit on recycling. In 2014 the Committee requested the kits be updated. At the same time Hannah Hensley was seeking a project for her Girl Scout Gold Award. Ms. Hensley obtained approvals from School Administration, the County and Girl Scout Council. Ms. Hensley's project included obtaining items that can be recycled and items made out of recycled material. In addition, she created a teaching guide for teachers, meeting SOL requirements that included how items are recycled, games and crafts. She also worked with Wilson Memorial High School and the Governor's School to create videos. The education kits has been sent to all 11 elementary schools and included a home school group. Ms. Hensley's mentor for this project was Jo-el Nelson who is a Recycling Committee member and Governor's School teacher.

Regional Recycling

The Regional Recycling Committee (County, Staunton, Waynesboro) has discussed a regional materials handling facility to be located at the landfill. A regional processing facility will require a significant investment (\$1,000,000). In return materials can be processed and baled for recycling which will increase the value. However, at this time the Committee feels there would be a significant return period due to the market fluctuations. This would not be a feasible approach at this time; however, as market or recycling technology changes it should be addressed in the future.

School Recycling

The Recycling Committee encourages Augusta County Public Schools to recycle. The Committee supports school recycling efforts including education. Every year the County solicits public schools to submit applications for competitive grants for recycling programs. In 2015 grants were given to:

Buffalo Gap High School - \$250
Clymore Elementary School - \$250
Riverheads High School - \$300
Stuarts Draft Middle School - \$250
Wilson Elementary School - \$250
Wilson Memorial High School - \$300
Wilson Middle School - \$500

Augusta County Schools provide containers for cardboard at all public schools except Wilson Elementary, Middle and High schools since they are located on the Woodrow Wilson Post. The schools recycled approximately 21 tons of cardboard generating approximately \$510 to help pay for container rental and hauling.

Woodrow Wilson Complex Recycling Program

Augusta County Public Schools Maintenance and Operations Director and the Environmental Programs Manager developed a regional recycling center in 2009 at the Woodrow Wilson Rehabilitation Complex with the assistance of facilities at the Complex. Mixed paper, plastic and cardboard is being recycled by Wilson Elementary, Middle and High Schools, Valley Vo-tech, ACSA maintenance and field office and Woodrow Wilson Rehabilitation facility. Augusta County Public Schools currently includes recycling expenses in their hauling budget. Approximately 16 tons of material was recycled in 2015.

Recycling in Offices

The Recycling Committee encourages County offices to recycle. Currently mixed paper, cardboard and aluminum are being recycled. Vector Industries is contracted to collect paper at the Administration Building. Aluminum and cardboard is taken to the Food Pantry to be recycled. 8 tons of paper was recycled during 2015 by Vector Industries.

The Verona Food Pantry collects paper and cardboard from the Social Services Building. The Food Pantry utilizes Dave's Recycling.

The Library is also participating in recycling activities that includes paper and cardboard. They utilize Vector Industries for their hauling.

Advertising

All events are advertised by public service announcements, advertising on the County's website and posting holiday closings at the landfill and compactor sites. In addition, ads are placed in Parks and Recreation's Guide for the Household Hazardous Waste Event and Spring Clean-Up

In addition, display cabinets are used at all satellite locations in order to post public service announcements, closures, etc.

Plastic Recycling

The Recycling Committee is continually discussing the need for plastic recycling, and citizens are asking for this service. Unfortunately, plastic recycling is expensive due to trucking high volumes with little weight. Loose plastic is not a revenue-producing commodity.

Plastic recycling was established at the landfill in 2009 and produces approximately 47 tons per year of mixed plastics 1 – 7.

In 2013's annual report, staff identified that Sherando, Greenville, New Hope, and Crimora would be good locations to establish a plastic recycling container based on the size of the sites. Also it has been suggested to locate a plastic recycling on the northern side of the County.

The cost to complete excavation, purchase a container and establish plastic recycling is estimated to be \$27,000. The annual cost for transportation is estimated to be \$6,000 per year.

If the Board of Supervisors wishes to provide plastic recycling, funding will need to be budgeted.

Changes to Caretaker Program

In 2015, and due primarily to the Affordable Health Care Act, the County began tracking hours worked by dumpsite caretakers. Two caretakers have been hired to work for each dumpsite except Deerfield, which is an open top container and New Hope, which is operated by the New Hope Ruritan Club. Except for breaks, there is a caretaker present open hours except Mt. Solon. Having attendants present has been a benefit to citizens, trash is being compacted at a better rate and hazardous wastes nor large items being dropped off.

Summary of Current Activities

- Our overall recycling rate increased by 1.7%.
- Recycling tonnage decreased by 1% as compared to last year.
- Revenue from recyclables decreased by approximately 24%.
- Transportation decrease (3%) due primarily to gas costs.
- Tires collected at Spring Clean-up decreased by 32%.
- Invista continues to sponsor the Fall Hazardous Waste Collection Event saving taxpayers approximately \$15,000 annually. 169 vehicles were served, which as down by 12%.

Committee Recommendations

1. Budgeting for additional plastic recycling centers.
2. Consider re-instituting Adopt-A-Highway by hiring a litter control officer and seeking Judge approval for utilizing probationers completing community service hours. Probationers (not parolees) would pick up litter along County roads. This program was previously in place in the County. It has not be re-instituted with the current Circuit Court Judge nor was a new litter control officer hired upon the retiring of the previous person that held the position. This position would work with the probationers and VDOT to ensure roads assigned are cleaned. Funding would be needed for the position.

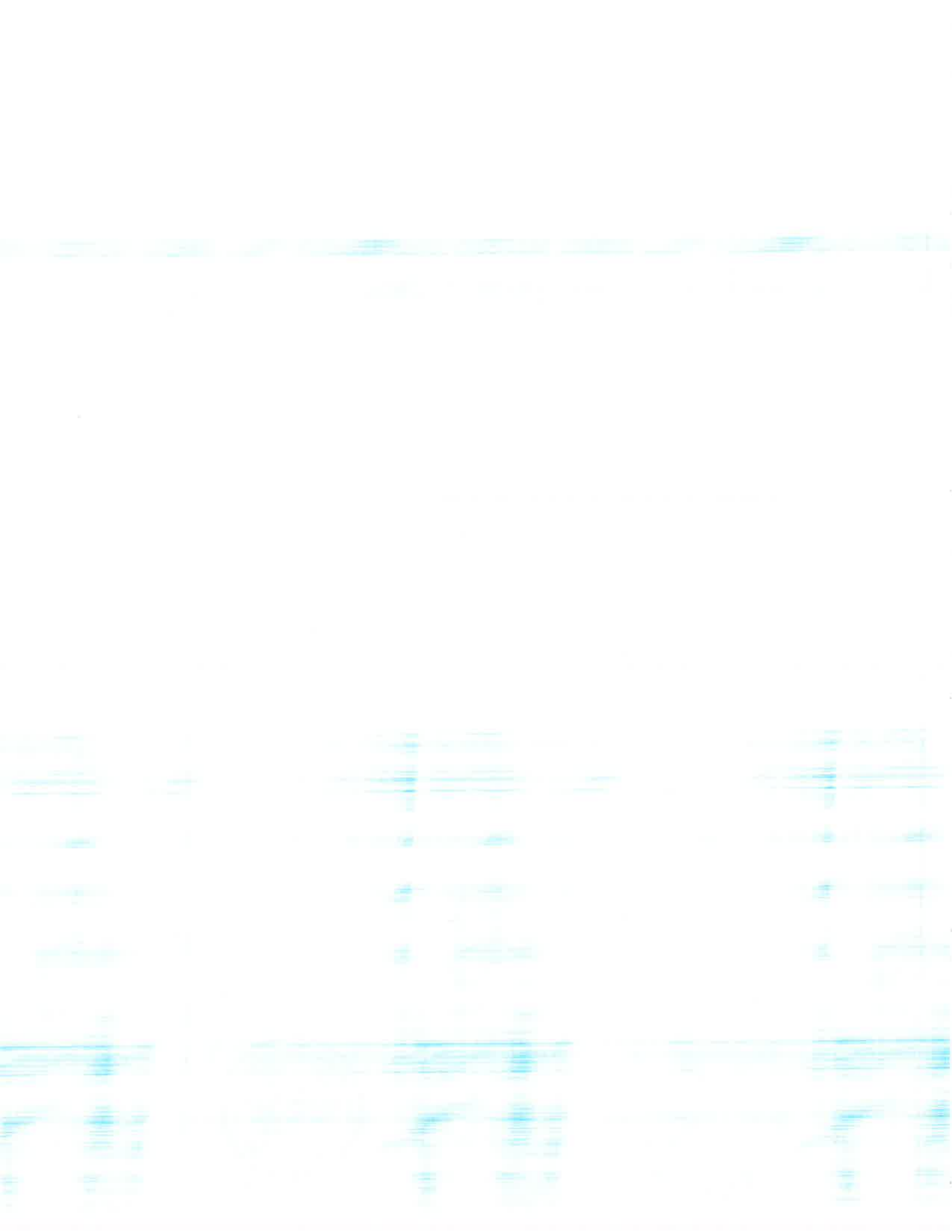

**RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF NOT TO EXCEED
\$32,000,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION SCHOOL BOND OF THE
COUNTY OF AUGUSTA, VIRGINIA, TO BE SOLD TO THE
VIRGINIA PUBLIC SCHOOL AUTHORITY AND PROVIDING
FOR THE FORM AND DETAILS THEREOF.**

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors (the "Board") of the County of Augusta, Virginia (the "County"), has determined that it is necessary and expedient to borrow an amount not to exceed \$32,000,000 and to issue its general obligation school bond (as more specifically defined below, the "Local School Bond") for the purpose of financing a portion of the costs of capital projects for school purposes, primarily the design, construction and equipping of a new Riverheads Elementary School, a new Hugh K. Cassell Elementary School and an expansion of Wilson Middle School, as well as the demolition of the existing Hugh K. Cassell Elementary School and Riverheads Elementary School buildings (collectively, the "Project");

WHEREAS, the County held a public hearing, duly noticed, on March 23, 2016, on the issuance of the Local School Bond in accordance with the requirements of Section 15.2-2606, Code of Virginia 1950, as amended (the "Virginia Code");

WHEREAS, the School Board of the County has, by resolution, requested the Board to authorize the issuance of the Local School Bond and consented to the issuance of the Local School Bond;

WHEREAS, the Virginia Public School Authority ("VPSA") has offered to purchase the Local School Bond along with the local school bonds of certain other localities with a portion of the proceeds of certain bonds to be issued by VPSA in the spring of 2016 (the "VPSA Bonds");

WHEREAS, the Bond Sale Agreement (as defined below) shall indicate that \$30,000,000 is the amount of proceeds requested (the "Proceeds Requested") from VPSA in connection with the sale of the Local School Bond;

WHEREAS, VPSA's objective is to pay the County a purchase price for the Local School Bond which, in VPSA's judgment, reflects the Local School Bond's market value (the "VPSA Purchase Price Objective"), taking into consideration such factors as the amortization schedule the County has requested for the Local School Bond relative to the amortization schedules requested by other localities, the purchase price to be received by VPSA from the sale of the VPSA Bonds and other market conditions relating to the sale of the VPSA Bonds; and

WHEREAS, such factors may result in the Local School Bond having a purchase price other than par and consequently (i) the County may have to issue the Local School Bond in a principal amount that is greater than or less than the Proceeds Requested in order to receive an amount of proceeds that is substantially equal to the Proceeds Requested, or (ii) if the maximum authorized principal amount of the Local School Bond set forth in section 1 below does not exceed the Proceeds Requested by at least the amount of any discount, the purchase price to be paid to the

County, given the VPSA Purchase Price Objective and market conditions, will be less than the Proceeds Requested.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF AUGUSTA, VIRGINIA:

1. **Authorization of Local School Bond and Use of Proceeds.** The Board hereby determines that it is advisable to contract a debt and issue and sell its general obligation school bond in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$32,000,000 (the "Local School Bond") for the purpose of financing the Project. The Board hereby authorizes the issuance and sale of the Local School Bond in the form and upon the terms established pursuant to this Resolution.

2. **Sale of the Local School Bond.** The sale of the Local School Bond, within the parameters set forth in paragraph 4 of this Resolution, to VPSA is authorized. Given the VPSA Purchase Price Objective and market conditions, the County acknowledges that the limitation on the maximum principal amount of the Local School Bond set forth in paragraph 1 of this Resolution restricts VPSA's ability to generate the Proceeds Requested, however, the Local School Bond may be sold for a purchase price not lower than 100% of the Proceeds Requested. The Chairman of the Board, the Vice Chairman of the Board, the County Administrator, the Deputy County Administrator and the Finance Director, any of whom may act (each a "Delegate"), and such other officer or officers of the County as a Delegate may designate are each hereby authorized and directed to enter into an agreement with VPSA providing for the sale of the Local School Bond to VPSA (the "Bond Sale Agreement"). The Bond Sale Agreement shall be in substantially the form submitted to the Board at this meeting, which form is hereby approved, with such completions, insertions, omissions and changes not inconsistent with this Resolution as may be approved by the Delegate executing the Bond Sale Agreement.

3. **Details of the Local School Bond.** The Local School Bond shall be dated 16 days prior to the date of its issuance and delivery or such other date designated by VPSA; shall be designated "General Obligation School Bond, Series 2016A"; shall bear interest from its dated date payable semi-annually on each January 15 and July 15 beginning January 15, 2017 (each an "Interest Payment Date"), at the rates established in accordance with paragraph 4 of this Resolution; and shall mature on July 15 in the years (each a "Principal Payment Date") and in the amounts acceptable to a Delegate (the "Principal Installments"), subject to the provisions of paragraph 4 of this Resolution.

4. **Interest Rates and Principal Installments.** Each Delegate is hereby authorized and directed to accept the interest rates on the Local School Bond established by VPSA, provided that each interest rate shall be five one-hundredths of one percent (0.05%) over the interest rate to be paid by VPSA for the corresponding principal payment date of the VPSA Bonds, a portion of the proceeds of which will be used to purchase the Local School Bond, and provided further that the true interest cost of the Local School Bond does not exceed five and fifty one-hundredths percent (5.50%) per annum. The Interest Payment Dates and the Principal Installments are subject to change at the request of VPSA. Each Delegate is hereby authorized and directed to accept changes in the Interest Payment Dates and the Principal Installments at the request of VPSA based on the final term to maturity of the VPSA Bonds, requirements imposed on VPSA by the nationally-recognized rating agencies and the final principal amount of the Local School Bond; provided,

however, that the principal amount of the Local School Bond shall not exceed the amount authorized by this Resolution and the final maturity of the Local School Bond shall not exceed twenty-one (21) years from the date of the issuance and delivery of the Local School Bond. The execution and delivery of the Local School Bond as described in paragraph 8 hereof shall conclusively evidence the approval and acceptance of all of the details of the Local School Bond by the Delegate as authorized by this Resolution.

5. **Form of the Local School Bond.** The Local School Bond shall be initially in the form of a single, temporary typewritten bond substantially in the form attached hereto as Exhibit A.

6. **Payment; Paying Agent and Bond Registrar.** The following provisions shall apply to the Local School Bond:

(a) For as long as VPSA is the registered owner of the Local School Bond, all payments of principal, premium, if any, and interest on the Local School Bond shall be made in immediately available funds to VPSA at, or before 11:00 a.m. on the applicable Interest Payment Date, Principal Payment Date or date fixed for prepayment or redemption, or if such date is not a business day for Virginia banks or for the Commonwealth of Virginia, then at or before 11:00 a.m. on the business day next succeeding such Interest Payment Date, Principal Payment Date or date fixed for prepayment or redemption.

(b) All overdue payments of principal and, to the extent permitted by law, interest shall bear interest at the applicable interest rate or rates on the Local School Bond.

(c) U.S. Bank National Association, Richmond, Virginia, is designated as Bond Registrar and Paying Agent for the Local School Bond. The County may, in its sole discretion, replace at any time the Bond Registrar with another qualified bank or trust company as successor Bond Registrar and Paying Agent for the Local School Bond. The County shall give prompt notice to VPSA of the appointment of any successor Bond Registrar and Paying Agent.

7. **Prepayment or Redemption.** The Principal Installments of the Local School Bond held by VPSA coming due on or before July 15, 2026, and the definitive bond for which the Local School Bond held by VPSA may be exchanged that mature on or before July 15, 2026, are not subject to prepayment or redemption prior to their stated maturities. The Principal Installments of the Local School Bond held by VPSA coming due on or after July 15, 2027, and the definitive bond(s) for which the Local School Bond held by VPSA may be exchanged that mature on or after July 15, 2027, are subject to prepayment or redemption at the option of the County prior to their stated maturities in whole or in part, on any date on or after July 15, 2026, upon payment of the prepayment or redemption prices (expressed as percentages of Principal Installments to be prepaid or the principal amount of the Local School Bond to be redeemed) set forth below plus accrued interest to the date set for prepayment or redemption:

<u>Dates</u>	<u>Prices</u>
July 15, 2026 through July 14, 2027	101%
July 15, 2027 through July 14, 2028	100½
July 15, 2028 and thereafter	100

Provided, however, that the Principal Installments of the Local School Bond shall not be subject to prepayment or redemption prior to their stated maturities as described above without first obtaining the written consent of VPSA or other registered owner of the Local School Bond. Notice of any such prepayment or redemption shall be given by the Bond Registrar to VPSA or other registered owner by registered mail not more than ninety (90) and not less than sixty (60) days before the date fixed for prepayment or redemption.

If VPSA refunds the VPSA Bonds in the future and such refunding causes the Local School Bond to be deemed refunded, the prepayment or redemption of the Local School Bond will be subject to VPSA approval and subject to similar prepayment or redemption provisions as set forth above that correspond to the call period of the VPSA bonds issued in part to refund the Local School Bond.

8. Execution of the Local School Bond. The Chairman or Vice Chairman and the Clerk or any Deputy Clerk of the Board are each authorized and directed to execute and deliver the Local School Bond and to affix the seal of the County thereto.

9. Pledge of Full Faith and Credit. For the prompt payment of the principal of, premium, if any, and the interest on the Local School Bond as the same shall become due, the full faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged, and in each year while any portion of the Local School Bond shall be outstanding there shall be levied and collected in accordance with law an annual ad valorem tax upon all taxable property in the County subject to local taxation sufficient in amount to provide for the payment of the principal of and premium, if any, and the interest on the Local School Bond as such principal, premium, if any, and interest shall become due, which tax shall be without limitation as to rate or amount and in addition to all other taxes authorized to be levied in the County to the extent other funds of the County are not lawfully available and appropriated for such purpose.

10. Use of Proceeds Certificate and Tax Compliance Agreement. Each Delegate and such other officer or officers of the County or the School Board as a Delegate may designate are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver on behalf of the County a Use of Proceeds Certificate and Tax Compliance Agreement (the "Tax Compliance Agreement") setting forth the expected use and investment of the proceeds of the Local School Bond and containing such covenants as may be necessary in order to show compliance with the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"), and applicable regulations relating to the exclusion from gross income of interest on the VPSA Bonds. The Board covenants on behalf of the County that (i) the proceeds from the issuance and sale of the Local School Bond will be invested and expended as set forth in such Tax Compliance Agreement and that the County shall comply with the other covenants and representations contained therein and (ii) the County shall comply with the provisions of the Code so that interest on the VPSA Bonds will remain excludable from gross income for federal income tax purposes.

11. **State Non-Arbitrage Program; Proceeds Agreement.** The Board hereby determines that it is in the best interests of the County to authorize and direct each Delegate and the County Treasurer to participate in the State Non-Arbitrage Program in connection with the Local School Bond. Each Delegate, the County Treasurer and such officer or officers of the County as a Delegate or the County Treasurer may designate are each hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver a Proceeds Agreement with respect to the deposit and investment of proceeds of the Local School Bond by and among the County, the other participants in the sale of the VPSA Bonds, VPSA, the investment manager and the depository.

12. **Continuing Disclosure Agreement.** Each Delegate and such other officer or officers of the County as a Delegate may designate are each hereby authorized and directed to execute a Continuing Disclosure Agreement, as set forth in Appendix D to the Bond Sale Agreement, setting forth the reports and notices to be filed by the County and containing such covenants as may be necessary in order to show compliance with the provisions of the Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12, under the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, as amended, and directed to make all filings required by Section 3 of the Bond Sale Agreement should the County be determined by VPSA to be a MOP (as defined in the Bond Sale Agreement).

13. **Refunding.** The Board hereby acknowledges that VPSA may issue refunding bonds to refund any bonds previously issued by VPSA, including the VPSA Bonds issued to purchase the Local School Bond, and that the purpose of such refunding bonds would be to enable VPSA to pass on annual debt service savings to the local issuers, including the County. Each Delegate is authorized to execute and deliver to VPSA such allonge to the Local School Bond, revised debt service schedule, IRS Form 8038-G or such other documents reasonably deemed necessary by VPSA and VPSA's bond counsel to be necessary to reflect and facilitate the refunding of the Local School Bond and the allocation of the annual debt service savings to the County by VPSA. The Clerk to the Board of Supervisors is authorized to affix the County's seal on any such documents and attest or countersign the same.

14. **Filing of Resolution.** The appropriate officers or agents of the County are hereby authorized and directed to cause a certified copy of this Resolution to be filed with the Circuit Court of the County.

15. **Election to Proceed under Public Finance Act.** In accordance with Section 15.2-2601 of the Virginia Code, the Board elects to issue the Local School Bond pursuant to the provisions of the Public Finance Act of 1991, Chapter 26 of Title 15.2 of the Virginia Code.

16. **Further Actions.** The members of the Board and all officers, employees and agents of the County are hereby authorized to take such action as they or any one of them may consider necessary or desirable in connection with the issuance and sale of the Local School Bond and otherwise in furtherance of this Resolution and any such action previously taken is hereby ratified and confirmed.

17. **Effective Date.** This Resolution shall take effect immediately.

Principal of and interest and premium, if any, on this Bond are payable in lawful money of the United States of America.

For as long as VPSA is the registered owner of this Bond, U.S. Bank National Association, Richmond, Virginia, as bond registrar and paying agent (the "Bond Registrar"), shall make all payments of the principal of and interest and premium, if any, on this Bond, without the

presentation or surrender hereof, to VPSA, in immediately available funds at or before 11:00 a.m. on the applicable Payment Date or date fixed for prepayment or redemption. If a Payment Date or date fixed for prepayment or redemption is not a business day for banks in the Commonwealth of Virginia or for the Commonwealth of Virginia, then the payment of the principal of and interest and premium, if any, on this Bond shall be made in immediately available funds at or before 11:00 a.m. on the business day next succeeding the scheduled Payment Date or date fixed for prepayment or redemption. Upon receipt by the registered owner of this Bond of said payments of principal, premium, if any, and interest, written acknowledgment of the receipt thereof shall be given promptly to the Bond Registrar, and the County shall be fully discharged of its obligation on this Bond to the extent of the payment so made. Upon final payment, this Bond shall be surrendered to the Bond Registrar for cancellation.

The full faith and credit of the County are irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and the premium, if any, and interest on this Bond. The resolution adopted by the Board of Supervisors authorizing the issuance of this Bond provides, and Section 15.2-2624, Code of Virginia 1950, as amended (the "Virginia Code"), requires, that there shall be levied and collected an annual tax upon all taxable property in the County subject to local taxation sufficient to provide for the payment of the principal of and interest and premium, if any, on this Bond as the same shall become due which tax shall be without limitation as to rate or amount and shall be in addition to all other taxes authorized to be levied in the County to the extent other funds of the County are not lawfully available and appropriated for such purpose.

This Bond is duly authorized and issued in compliance with and pursuant to the Constitution and laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia, including the Public Finance Act of 1991, Chapter 26, Title 15.2 of the Virginia Code, and resolutions duly adopted by the Board of Supervisors of the

This Bond is registered in the name of the VPSA on the books of the County kept by the Bond Registrar, and the transfer of this Bond may be effected by the registered owner of this Bond only upon due execution of an assignment by such registered owner. Upon receipt of such assignment and the surrender of this Bond, the Bond Registrar shall exchange this Bond for definitive bonds as hereinabove provided, such definitive bonds to be registered on such registration books in the name of the assignee or assignees named in such assignment.

The principal installments of this Bond coming due on or before July 15, 2026 and the definitive bonds for which this Bond may be exchanged that mature on or before July 15, 2026, are not subject to prepayment or redemption prior to their stated maturities. The principal installments of this Bond coming due on or after July 15, 2027, and the definitive bonds for which this Bond may be exchanged that mature on or after July 15, 2027, are subject to prepayment or redemption at the option of the County prior to their stated maturities in whole or in part, on any date on or after July 15, 2026, upon payment of the prepayment or redemption prices (expressed as percentages of principal installments to be prepaid or the principal amount of this Bond to be redeemed) set forth below plus accrued interest to the date set for prepayment or redemption:

VPSA has defined a Material Obligated Person ("MOP") for purposes of the Continuing Disclosure Agreement as any Local Issuer (as defined therein) the principal amount of whose local school bond(s) pledged under VPSA's 1997 Resolution comprises more than 10% of the total principal amount of all bonds of VPSA outstanding under the 1997 Resolution. Upon written request, VPSA will also advise you of your status as a MOP as of any other date. You hereby covenant that you will provide the certificate described in clause (e) of Section 5 below if VPSA includes Your Information by specific reference in its disclosure documents in connection with this sale or any future sale, whether or not you are a participant in such sale.

5. VPSA's commitment to purchase your local school bond is contingent upon satisfaction of the following conditions.

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CONTINUING DISCLOSURE AGREEMENT

[This Continuing Disclosure Agreement will impose obligations on the Local Issuer if and only if the Local Issuer is or has become and remains a "Material Obligated Person," as defined below]

This Continuing Disclosure Agreement (the "Disclosure Agreement") is executed and delivered by the County of Augusta, Virginia (the "Local Issuer") in connection with the issuance by the Virginia Public School Authority (the "Authority") of \$ _____ aggregate principal amount of its School Financing Bonds (1997 Resolution) Series 2016A (the "Series 2016A Bonds") pursuant to the provisions of a bond resolution (the "1997 Resolution") adopted on October 23, 1997, as amended and restated. The Series 2016A Bonds and all other parity bonds heretofore and hereafter issued under the 1997 Resolution are collectively called the "Bonds." A portion of the proceeds of the Series 2016A Bonds is being used by the Authority to purchase the general obligation school bond (the "Local School Bond") of the Local Issuer pursuant to a bond sale agreement between the Authority and the Local Issuer (the "Bond Sale Agreement"). Pursuant to paragraph 3 of the Bond Sale Agreement, the Local Issuer hereby covenants and agrees as follows:

Section 1. Purpose of the Disclosure Agreement. This Disclosure Agreement is being executed and delivered by the Local Issuer for the benefit of the holders of the Series 2016A Bonds and in order to assist the Participating Underwriters (defined below) in complying with the Rule (defined below). The Local Issuer acknowledges that it is undertaking primary responsibility for any reports, notices or disclosures that may be required under this Agreement.

Section 2. Definitions. In addition to the definitions set forth in the 1997 Resolution, which apply to any capitalized term used in this Disclosure Agreement unless otherwise defined in this Section, the following capitalized terms shall have the following meanings:

"Annual Report" shall mean any Annual Report provided by the Local Issuer pursuant to, and as described in, Sections 3 and 4 of this Disclosure Agreement.

"bond sale agreement" shall mean the Bond Sale Agreement and any other comparable written commitment of the Local Issuer to sell its Local School Bond to the Authority.

"Dissemination Agent" shall mean the Local Issuer, acting in its capacity as Dissemination Agent hereunder, or any successor Dissemination Agent designated in writing by such Local Issuer and which has filed with such Local Issuer a written acceptance of such designation.

"Filing Date" shall have the meaning given to such term in Section 3(a) hereof.

"Fiscal Year" shall mean the twelve-month period at the end of which financial position and results of operations are determined. Currently, the Local Issuer's Fiscal Year begins July 1 and continues through June 30 of the next calendar year.

"holder" shall mean, for purposes of this Disclosure Agreement, any person who is a record owner or beneficial owner of a Series 2016A Bond.

“Listed Events” shall mean any of the events listed in subsection 5(b)(5)(i)(C) of the Rule.

“local school bonds” shall mean the Local School Bond and any other bonds of the Local Issuer pledged as security for Bonds issued under the Authority’s 1997 Resolution.

“Material Obligated Person” (or “MOP”) shall mean the Local Issuer if it has local school bonds outstanding in an aggregate principal amount that exceeds 10% of the aggregate principal amount of all outstanding Bonds of the Authority.

“MSRB” shall mean the Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board, or any successor thereto or to the functions of the MSRB contemplated by this Disclosure Agreement.

“Participating Underwriter” shall mean any of the original underwriters of the Authority’s Series 2016A Bonds required to comply with the Rule in connection with the offering of such Bonds.

“Rule” shall mean Rule 15c2-12 adopted by the Securities and Exchange Commission under the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, as the same may be amended from time to time.

Section 3. Provision of Annual Reports.

(a) The Local Issuer shall, or shall cause the Dissemination Agent to, provide the MSRB, in the format prescribed by the MSRB, an Annual Report which is consistent with the requirements of Section 4 of this Disclosure Agreement. Such Annual Report shall be filed on a date (the “Filing Date”) that is not later than 12 months after the end of any Fiscal Year (commencing with its Fiscal Year ending June 30, 2016) as of the end of which such Local Issuer was a MOP, unless as of the Filing Date the Local Issuer is no longer a MOP.¹ Not later than ten (10) days prior to the Filing Date, the Local Issuer shall provide the Annual Report to the Dissemination Agent (if applicable) and shall provide copies to the Authority. In each case, the Annual Report (i) may be submitted as a single document or as separate documents comprising a package, (ii) may cross-reference other information as provided in Section 4 of this Disclosure Agreement and (iii) shall include the Local Issuer’s audited financial statements prepared in accordance with applicable state law or, if audited financial statements are not available, such unaudited financial statements as may be required by the Rule. In any event, audited financial statements of such Local Issuer must be submitted, if and when available, together with or separately from the Annual Report.

(b) If the Local Issuer is unable to provide an Annual Report to the MSRB by the date required in subsection (a), the Local Issuer shall send a notice to the MSRB in substantially the form attached hereto as Exhibit A.

¹ The Authority will covenant in the Bond Sale Agreement to advise the Local Issuer within 60 days of the end of each Fiscal Year if such Local Issuer was a Material Obligated Person as of the end of such Fiscal Year. Upon written request, the Authority will also advise the Local Issuer as to its status as a MOP as of any other date.

Section 4. Content of Annual Reports. Except as otherwise agreed, any Annual Report required to be filed hereunder shall contain or incorporate by reference, at a minimum, annual financial information relating to the Local Issuer, including operating data,

(a) updating such information relating to the Local Issuer as shall have been included or cross-referenced in the final Official Statement of the Authority describing the Authority's Series 2016A Bonds or

(b) if there is no such information described in clause (i), updating such information relating to the Local Issuer as shall have been included or cross-referenced in any comparable disclosure document of the Local Issuer relating to its tax-supported obligations or,

(c) if there is no such information described in clauses (i) or (ii) above, initially setting forth and then updating the information referred to in Exhibit B as it relates to the Local Issuer, all with a view toward assisting Participating Underwriters in complying with the Rule.

(d) Any or all of such information may be incorporated by reference from other documents, including official statements of securities issues with respect to which the Local Issuer is an "obligated person" (within the meaning of the Rule), which have been filed with the MSRB or the Securities and Exchange Commission. If the document incorporated by reference is a final official statement, it must be available from the MSRB. The Local Issuer shall clearly identify each such other document so incorporated by reference.

Section 5. Reporting of Listed Events. Whenever the Local Issuer is a Material Obligated Person required to file Annual Reports pursuant to Section 3(a) hereof and obtains knowledge of the occurrence of a Listed Event, such Local Issuer shall file in a timely manner, not in excess of ten business days after the occurrence of the event, a notice of such occurrence with the MSRB with a copy to the Authority.

Section 6. Termination of Reporting Obligation. The Local Issuer's obligations under this Disclosure Agreement shall terminate upon the earlier to occur of the legal defeasance or final retirement of the Local School Bond.

Section 7. Dissemination Agent. The Local Issuer may, from time to time, appoint or engage a Dissemination Agent to assist it in carrying out its obligations under this Disclosure Agreement and may discharge any such Dissemination Agent, with or without appointing a successor Dissemination Agent. The Local Issuer shall advise the Authority of any such appointment or discharge. If at any time there is not any other designated Dissemination Agent, the Local Issuer shall be the Dissemination Agent.

Section 8. Amendment. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Disclosure Agreement, the Local Issuer may amend this Disclosure Agreement, if such amendment has been approved in writing by the Authority and is supported by an opinion of independent counsel, acceptable to the Authority, with expertise in federal securities laws, to the effect that such amendment is permitted or required by the Rule.

Section 9. Additional Information. Nothing in this Disclosure Agreement shall be deemed to prevent the Local Issuer from disseminating any other information, using the means of dissemination set forth in this Disclosure Agreement or any other means of communication, or including any other information in any Annual Report or notice of occurrence of a Listed Event, in addition to that which is required by this Disclosure Agreement. If the Local Issuer chooses to include any information in any Annual Report or notice of occurrence of a Listed Event, in addition to that which is specifically required by this Disclosure Agreement, such Local Issuer shall have no obligation under this Disclosure Agreement to update such information or include it in any future Annual Report or notice of occurrence of a Listed Event.

Section 10. Default. Any person referred to in Section 11 (other than the Local Issuer) may take such action as may be necessary and appropriate, including seeking mandate or specific performance by court order, to cause the Local Issuer to file its Annual Report or to give notice of a Listed Event. The Authority may, and the holders of not less than a majority in aggregate principal amount of Bonds outstanding may, take such actions as may be necessary and appropriate, including seeking mandate or specific performance by court order, to challenge the adequacy of any information provided pursuant to this Disclosure Agreement, or to enforce any other obligation of the Local Issuer hereunder. A default under this Disclosure Agreement shall not be deemed an event of default under the applicable resolution or bonds of the Local Issuer, and the sole remedy under this Disclosure Agreement in the event of any failure of the Local Issuer to comply herewith shall be an action to compel performance. Nothing in this provision shall be deemed to restrict the rights or remedies of any holder pursuant to the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, the rules and regulations promulgated thereunder, or other applicable laws.

Section 11. Beneficiaries. This Disclosure Agreement shall inure solely to the benefit of the Authority, the Local Issuer, the Participating Underwriters, and holders from time to time of the Authority's Bonds, and shall create no rights in any other person or entity.

Section 12. Form of Filings. Unless otherwise required by the MSRB, all notices, documents and information provided to the MSRB pursuant to this Disclosure Agreement shall be provided to the MSRB's Electronic Municipal Market Access (EMMA) system, the current Internet address of which is www.emma.msrb.org. All notices, documents and information provided to the MSRB shall be provided in an electronic format prescribed by the MSRB (currently, portable document format (pdf) which must be word-searchable except for non-textual elements) and shall be accompanied by identifying information as prescribed by the MSRB. The Local Issuer shall include with each filing made under this Disclosure Agreement the CUSIP identifier related to each of the Series 2016A Bonds and all other Bonds that are outstanding at the time of such filing. The Local Issuer may obtain the relevant CUSIP identifiers from the Authority in connection with any filing required under this Disclosure Agreement.

Section 13. Counterparts. This Disclosure Agreement may be executed in several counterparts, each of which shall be an original and all of which shall constitute but one and the same instrument.

Samara is the Senior Reporter for the FFA and is involved in a lot of FFA events: Parliamentary Procedure; Stockmans; and the Market Animal Show. She hopes to become an Ag teacher or study Veterinary Science.

Jyssica participates with FFA and went to the National Convention last year for the Agricultural Communications Team. The Parliamentary Team won last weekend and will participate in the Nationals again. She hopes to major in Political Science and go to Law School. She also shows horses.

Timothy K. Fitzgerald introduced Angela Michael who will be replacing Ms. Austin when she retires in the next few weeks. Ms. Michael is leaving the Treasurer's office for this new employment.

MATTERS TO BE PRESENTED BY THE PUBLIC

Larry and Joyce Craun, of Mount Solon, asked if the Board of Supervisors would consider amending the Noise Ordinance. They realize that the Noise Ordinance restricts noise from 12:00 a.m. to 6:00 a.m. but are experiencing a neighbor who plays rock band drums and uses loud speakers three to four nights a week. The noise vibrates their windows and causes them to be unable to watch television or sleep. They have spoken with the neighbor who said they would only play twice a week. This has not occurred. They have also spoken with Dr. Pattie and the Sheriff's office. The Crauns offered to play a recording that has been taken of this disturbance to the Board at the next meeting.

MATTERS TO BE PRESENTED BY THE PUBLIC (cont'd)

Katherine Williamson, George Drumheller and Chris McGuffin expressed road drainage issues at Old Laurel Hill Road south of the Laurel Hill Baptist Church. It was noted that Aaron and Kathy Sheets was unable to attend tonight's meeting to address their concerns, also. Ms. Williamson noted that there was evidence of a problem prior to her purchase of the home in 2003, which was evidenced by erosion channels that have run from Old Laurel Hill Road down her driveway and into the garage as well as algae growth outside the garage foundation. She noted that the prior owner used to maintain a ditch at the top of the property at the edge of the road which helped to channel the runoff between hers and Mr. McGuffin's garages. In 2011, VDOT did a site visit and said nothing could be done. In the Spring 2015, a neighbor across the road obtained a building permit from Augusta County. During the construction, it was observed that water was being pumped from the construction project out to the road and the driveway was modified so that the slope from it to the road was steeper causing heavy waterflow onto Ms. Williamson's property. She added that a 4-inch drain pipe for the dwelling terminates at the edge of the road. In 2015, VDOT installed an apron at the top edge of her property; however, channeling the runoff away from her garage is still a problem. She reiterated that the channeling is still bringing the water on to her property and that it would be ideal that her "property not be a repository for runoff from a state maintained road or from a neighboring property". In early December 2015, Ms. Williamson contacted Mr. Fitzgerald in Community Development regarding marginal effectiveness of the apron installed by VDOT. Mr. Fitzgerald reported her concerns to VDOT. She noted that the original apron was silted in and flattened out by the normal flow of traffic in and out of Mr. McGuffin's driveway. The apron with concrete was working better than prior aprons or ditches. With the considerable additional drainage from the construction project, the apron is insufficient. She expressed further concerns with Mr. Fitzgerald and VDOT and had received no response. She was also concerned with the possibility of having to replace her septic system. She reiterated two issues: 1) Excess runoff that occurs from the aforementioned neighboring property as well as from the driveway of another property directly across from her; 2) If state maintained road, why is it not being maintained? Mr. Drumheller added that he has met with VDOT and an engineer who constructs the ditches, and it was determined that a ditch needed to come down the other side of the road and culverts needed to be installed. Mr. McGuffin added that, because of the slope of the road, water is funneled into his back yard causing a "quagmire".

Mr. Fitzgerald said he was very familiar with the location and has talked with Ms. Williamson and VDOT several times regarding this issue. He noted there is a significant difference in the elevation of her property. A building permit was issued for the property across the road from Ms. Williamson. Currently, there is no ditch to capture the drainage. They are meeting with Mr. Dunlap with VDOT on Saturday to determine what is to be done. He had understood that VDOT was trying to resolve this problem and apologized for not responding back to Ms. Williamson.

Mr. Pyles suggested that they inform their supervisor, Terry Kelley, of the problem. "Sometimes your supervisor can make things work."

In response to the Crauns, Chairman Bragg said this would be referred to the Ordinance Review Committee.

Mr. Pyles added that amending the Noise Ordinance is difficult to do. "We cannot fix everything. Sometime these ordinances get used to create problems rather than solve them. The farmer, who gets up in the middle of the night, could also be in violation."

Mr. Craun understood that Rockingham County resolved the issue through using the Special Use Permit process for non-agricultural activities.

Mr. Shull asked if the Crauns' home was the closest to the neighbor. Mr. Craun said that the house sits at the base of a hill and across the road at a higher elevation. Behind the house are three other houses in the woods. Dr. Pattie said there was nothing restricting the sounds and the other houses are protected a little better. Mr. Craun said that he had visited with those who lived directly behind the house and noted the disturbance there, also. He stated that those neighbors did not want to get involved. Mr. Shull asked how many houses were affected by this; Mr. Craun said there were about four houses.

Chairman Bragg said this would be added to the Ordinance Review Committee's list.

* * * * *

SHENANDOAH NATIONAL PARK - PRESENTATION

The Board received an annual update by Jim Northup, Superintendent of Shenandoah National Park.

Superintendent Jim Northup stated that he had pledged to the Board last year that he would provide an annual visit to the Board with an update on the major happenings in the Shenandoah National Park. He anticipated it to be a very special year throughout the National Park System known as the National Park Service Centennial – the 100th Anniversary of the establishment of the National Park Service, the federal agency which is now the Chief Steward of 410 national parks throughout the country. This agency provides a wide variety of conservation services throughout the nation. He reported there were 1.3 million visitors, an increase of 5% from 2014. He expected higher visitation in 2016 and was pleased that Congress had reached a 2-year budget agreement where there would not be another shutdown in 2016. The Park continues to be a "huge economic engine for the region". The latest study indicates that those 1.3 million visitors spend over \$80 million annually in the local communities surrounding the Park and that the presence of the Park in the communities supports over 1,000 jobs. They also send a lot of business to local contractors through a wide variety of work taking place in the Park. He was pleased to report that community relationships are good. He continues to meet with the leaders of all eight counties that surround the Park, with the Blue Ridge Committee on Community Relations, and the Celebrate Shenandoah Group on a regular basis. The Park continues to have a good relationship with the Park partners: Concessioner, Delaware North Parks and Resorts, which operates the lodging and food facilities in the Park; the Potomac Appalachian Trail Club, which provides 100s of volunteers to help maintain trails in the Park; the Shenandoah National Park Association, which operates the bookstores and the Park Visitors Centers; and the Shenandoah National Park Trust, the Park's philanthropic partner. Delaware North and the Association reported record years in 2015. The Potomac Appalachian Trail remains an invaluable partner and the Shenandoah National Park Trust is successfully raising money to support a wide variety of projects throughout the Park. A copy of the Foundation Document Overview was distributed to the Board. Superintendent Northrup explained that the Foundation Plan is the basis upon which all future decisions about how the Park is to be managed for the next 10-15 years would be based. Delaware North continues making significant improvements to the Park including major room upgrades, complete renovations of all the public restrooms and shower facilities, renovations of historic cabins, fresh paint on many of the buildings, new sidewalks, better food and better service. The Park has replaced all outdoor interpretive media (information kiosks) and outside interpretive exhibits. Entrance fees have been increased (May 2015) from \$15 to \$20 a car for a seven-day pass. This increase has been well received. He noted that 80% of those funds stay in Shenandoah National Park and is used only for projects that benefit the visitors. The "Last Visitor Survey" indicates that 97% of visitors were satisfied with their visit to the Park. In a series of public meetings, there has been a completion of

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SHENANDOAH NATIONAL PARK – PRESENTATION (cont'd)

a plan for Chronic Wasting Disease (disease that impacts the whitetail deer population). The Park will not begin taking any action until a documented case occurs. As to the status of Hemlock trees in the Park, 95% have died. The Park continues to actively treat the remaining 5% Hemlock trees and the Ash trees in the Park since the Emerald Ash Borer, which is the invasive insect, has arrived in the Park. They are continuing to make Park operation more sustainable and climate-friendly with the use of hybrid vehicles, propane-powered lawnmowers, night-sky compliant solar powered lighting and new electric charging stations for electric vehicles. They also continue with partnering neighbors on issues important to the Park: air quality; maintaining critical view sheds; protecting night skies; wilderness character; and natural quiet. There is a new mobile Visitor Center in the Park, which is being used to provide better public service at the south-end of the Park. The Park has signed a new Sister Park Agreement with a national park in China, which will promote international tourism.

There have been several special events dedicated to the Park this year: 1) Rose Bowl Parade (January 1) where many floats were devoted to national parks; 2) Every Kid in the Park Program will provide every fourth-grader in the United States and his or her family a free pass to enter every national park in the country; 3) the release by the U.S. Mint of the Shenandoah National Park Centennial coin in both silver and gold (on sale March 24th); 4) IMAX film has been developed to celebrate the Centennial, called "National Parks Adventure" (showing at the Smithsonian, in Washington, D.C., Richmond, and Virginia Beach).

Superintendent Northrup also distributed to the Board a schedule of events for the year associated with the Centennial. This includes 13 free days in the Park this year in addition to the traditional Park Neighbor Day in June, where residents of all adjoining counties are invited to enjoy the Park free. Staff participated last week in "Read Across America", where many of the rangers went into local schools to read books including "Dr. Seuss". Shenandoah National Park is being featured this week in the Philadelphia Flower Show. During National Park Week in April, there will be a "National Park-wide Clean-up Day" on Earth Day. Four live musical performances are scheduled during the year from April to October. For each of those performances, there will be one in the Park and one at a gateway community near the Park. A "National Quilt Show" will happen in October. On Saturday, August 20, the Park will rededicate the historic stone observation platform, which is on the summit of Hawksbill Mountain. At that rededication ceremony, discussion will be made on what needs to be done as citizens to help to protect and enjoy Shenandoah National Park for the next century. He emphasized the goal for this Centennial was to connect with that next generation of Park visitors and to become active supporters of parks. He ended by expressing an invitation to "come and enjoy Shenandoah National Park, which we think is a wonderful place for recreation, education, inspiration, physical challenge, relaxation, and even spiritual renewal".

Mr. Shull asked if there has been a problem with Gypsy Moths? Superintendent Northrup said this was on a very small scale in comparison to 15 years ago.

Patrick J. Morgan, County Attorney, asked what the condition was of the Hemlock trees at Camp Hoover. Superintendent Northrup said not very well, "Camp Hoover is a very different place than it used to be. It is a wonderful place with great history, but the Hemlock trees are largely gone". He noted that there is staff treating the individual Hemlock and Ash trees.

Mr. Coleman commended Superintendent Northrup for his excellent presentation.

BUCKINGHAM BRANCH RAILROAD COMPANY

The Board considered a resolution supporting State funding request by Buckingham Branch Railroad Company.

Gale Wilson, of Buckingham Branch Railroad Company (BBRC), thanked the Board for its consideration of the resolution. This is a continued ongoing process for BBRC. It is 200 miles long with the interchange starting at Richmond to Clifton Forge, Virginia. This request is granted through the Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation and is available from the Commonwealth that supports the preservation of railroads in the State of Virginia. This program is Year 1 of a five-year program. Mr. Wilson stated that this BBRC would provide the 30% match. It is a transportation tool and an economic development factor.

Mr. Pyles moved, seconded by Dr. Pattie, that the Board adopt the following resolution:

**SUPPORT OF RAIL PERSERVATION APPLICATION
BUCKINGHAM BRANCH RAILROAD**

WHEREAS, the Buckingham Branch Railroad desires to file an application with the Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation for funding assistance for the Richmond and Alleghany Tie Replacement Project, which will replace mainline ties, switch ties, siding ties and mainline bridge deck ties. Work will also include adding ballast, tamping, surfacing and drainage improvements on the Buckingham Branch Railroad line located between MP 85.5 in Richmond and MP 276 in Clifton Forge, VA; and

WHEREAS, the Buckingham Branch Railroad has estimates that this project will cost \$10,000,000; and

WHEREAS, the General Assembly, through enactment of the Rail Preservation Program, provides for funding for certain improvements and procurement of railways in the Commonwealth of Virginia; and

WHEREAS, Buckingham Branch Railroad is an important element of the Augusta County transportation system; and

WHEREAS, Buckingham Branch Railroad is instrumental in the economic development of the area, and provides relief to the highway system by transporting freight, and provides an alternate means of transportation of commodities; and

WHEREAS, the County of Augusta supports the projects and the retention of the rail service; and

WHEREAS, the Commonwealth Transportation Board has established procedures for all allocation and distribution of the funds provided.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the County of Augusta Board of Supervisors does hereby request the Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation to give priority consideration to the Richmond and Alleghany Tie Replacement Project proposed by Buckingham Branch Railroad for inclusion in the projects funded in the Rail Preservation Program.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be spread upon the minutes and sent to Buckingham Branch Railroad.

ROAD ABANDONMENT – WINDY RIDGE ROAD

The Board considered abandonment of Windy Ridge Road (extension of State Route 743) (North River District).

Mr. Morgan reminded the Board that the Catheys had previously asked the Board of Supervisors for permission to put a gate across what is not a state-maintained road but a public road. The question arose as to why the Catheys had not petitioned to have the road abandoned. In response, the Catheys have filed a petition asking the Board to consider that abandonment. - 8. City Assessor packet – distributed to the Board. This is information from Staunton and Waynesboro on their City Assessment offices. Both have approximately 10,000 parcels and they do their general reassessments every two years and have three full-time employees in their assessment office. Staunton's budget, which included costs for changes being made to its software, was approximately \$321,000 for FY16. Waynesboro's budget was approximately \$243,000. If Augusta County were to do a 4-year assessment, you would double the cost. Augusta County has approximately 40,000-45,000 parcels that may need to be taken into account in regards to the number of personnel. Lastly, the assessment offices for the cities are doing some of the deed changes and work of tracking the building permits, etc., which the Augusta County Commissioner of Revenue's office is currently doing with its Real Estate staff.


