On March 1, 2016, the Crimora United Methodist Church informed the Electoral Board that it could no longer be used as a polling place. The Electoral Board has performed an extensive search for an alternate site, but cannot find one in the precinct. Therefore, we proposed to collocate the Crimora precinct polling place with the Dooms precinct polling place, Hugh K. Cassell Elementary School. The school is less than a mile outside of the precinct, so it does meet the requirements of §24.2-310 of the Code of Virginia. Since a Republican Primary is scheduled for June 14, 2016 it is asked that the change be made through emergency ordinance on April 13, 2016 and by permanent ordinance within 60 days.

On August 27, 2015, the Board of Supervisors approved \$10,000 (CIP Electoral Board Acct# 80000-8049) to be spent towards modification at County voting precincts to meet requirements of the Department of Justice related to the America Disability Act (ADA). The memorandum to the Board dated August 18, 2015 (attached) proposed 3 actions. Staff's goal was to complete Action 1 with the approved \$10,000 and request additional funding for Actions 2 and 3 at a later date.

Staff is happy to report that the majority of work in both Actions 1 and 2 where completed with the approved \$10,000 with exception of Verona and Churchville Elementary Precincts. Separate funds were approved to complete architectural work at Verona and repairing sidewalk cracks and handicapped parking upgrades at Churchville Elementary.

To date, the following is the total to be expended.

Churchville Elementary \$ 3,175.00
Government Center Architectural \$21,380.00
Total \$27,935.40

DATE:

Background

In response to a citizen complaint, the US Department of Justice (Department) conducted an investigation in July 2013 into accessibility at Augusta County polling places. The Electoral Board has received a letter from the Department dated May 13, 2015 regarding the results of that investigation and specifying recommended remedial measures in order to bring our polling places into compliance with accessibility requirements under the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) (Attachment 1).

Following receipt of the Department's letter, County staff and Tom Long, Electoral Board Secretary, visited County polling places and prepared a report of their findings detailing to what extent the recommended remedial measures are feasible (Attachment 2).

Actions to be taken

The Electoral Board met on July 13, 2015 to discuss said findings and to develop a Plan of Action. The Plan of Action proposed is as follows:

- 1. Immediate work to be completed by the November 3, 2015 election. The County and Electoral Board recommends completing purchase of temporary measures (signs, ramps, cones, etc.) and/or completing minor work for the following polling locations prior to the November 3, 2015 election. All of these sites with the exception of North River Elementary School will be brought into compliance with ADA accessibility requirements. The estimated cost for this work is \$10,000.
 - a. New Hope Precinct, 202 (New Hope United Methodist Church) Seek approval from New Hope United Methodist Church to change the entrance from current to the "Sunday School" entrance in order to meet doorway width requirements.
 - North River Precinct, 302 (North River Elementary School) Provide signs and cones only. Site cannot meet ADA requirements fully because of topography. Site will only be made better.
 - c. Mt. Solon Precinct, 303 (Sangerville Towers Ruritan Hall) A cone will be placed under the protruding object during voting.
 - d. Craigsville Precinct, 403 (Craigsville Community Center) A ramp will be placed near the entrance in order to meet ADA slope requirements.
 - e. Deerfield Precinct, 404 (Deerfield Fire Station) Cones and signs will be provided in order to meet ADA slope requirements. A threshold wedge for the entrance will be provided as well.
 - f. Cedar Green Precinct, 405 (Beverley Manor Elementary School) The gym doors will be kept open during voting. Parking signs will be provided since existing signs do not meet height requirements (not noted by Department).
 - g. Spottswood Precinct, 503 (Spottswood Community Center) Cones and signs will be provided to meet ADA slope requirements.
 - h. Sherando Precinct, 601 (Sherando Community Center) Exterior doors will remain open during voting and a ramp will be provided in order to meet ADA slope requirements. In addition, cones and signs will be provided to meet parking requirements.
 - Lyndhurst Precinct, 603 (Wilson Fire Station) Cones and signs will be provided to meet parking requirements. A ramp and landing edging will be provided to meet ADA slope requirements. The protruding object inside of the building will either be removed or a cone placed underneath during voting.

- j. Fishersville Precinct, 802 (Yancey Fire Station) A cone will be placed where there is a rise in the expansion joint east of the entrance. Proper door hardware will be provided and any obstructions inside will be eliminated or a cone placed underneath during voting.
- 2. Additional work to be undertaken as soon as possible. Some of the needed work cannot be completed in time for the November election; however, the County and Electoral Board will work with appropriate agencies to implement remedial measures at the following precinct locations.
 - a. Stuarts Draft Precinct, 102 (Stuarts Draft Elementary School) Sidewalk reconstruction at Stuarts Draft Elementary or relocation to Stuarts Draft High School. Full ADA compliance can be met at Stuarts Draft High School without modifications. If the sidewalk is reconstructed, estimates will need to be received and funding approved by the Board of Supervisors.
 - b. Verona Precinct, 103 (Augusta Government Center) Obtain a scope of work and fee from the architecture firm on retainer to reconstruct the ramps and associated sidewalks to ADA requirements. Completion of design and construction would need approval from Board of Supervisors.
 - c. Churchville Fire Precinct, 304 (Churchville Fire Station) Seek approval from Churchville Fire Station to change the entrance door to south of the current voting entrance. If approval is denied, request approval to replace the current voting entrance landing and a portion of the sidewalk to meet ADA requirements. Estimates will need to be received and funding approved by the Board of Supervisors.
 - d. Churchville Elementary Precinct, 402 (Churchville Elementary School) (upon school approval) – Provide cones and signs to meet parking requirements. Fill concrete sidewalk expansion joints to meet ADA open floor requirements.
 - e. White Hill Precinct, 504 (White Hill Church of the Brethren) (upon church approval) Provide a temporary curb ramp and raise the van accessible sign to meet sign height requirements.
 - f. Dooms Precinct, 801 (Hugh Cassell Elementary School) (upon school approval) Curb ramp requirements can be met by providing a cone. Sign requirements can be met by replacing the existing signs and providing the height requirement.

- 3. Waivers/Alternative voting locations to be sought. The following locations cannot meet ADA requirement through either temporary or permanent modifications. The County and Electoral Board should determine whether suitable alternative polling place locations are available and, if not, seek waivers from the Department and implement improvements, where feasible.
 - a. Crimora Precinct, 201 (Crimora United Methodist Church)
 - b. Ft. Defiance Precinct, 301 (Clymore Elementary School)
 - c. North River Precinct, 302 (North River Elementary) (But, note non-compliant improvements proposed under Number 1 above)
 - d. Buffalo Gap Precinct, 401 (Buffalo Gap High School)
 - e. Middlebrook Precinct, 502 (Middlebrook Fire Station)
 - f. Ridgeview Precinct (formerly Stuarts Draft Rescue Precinct), 602 (Ridgeview Christian School)

The Electoral Board shares the Department's goal of making all of the County's polling places accessible to voters, within the constraints of our topography and the limited availability of suitable voting locations. The Electoral Board recommends that the Board of Supervisors fund the work in Number 1 above, estimated by County staff to cost \$10,000. The Electoral Board and County staff will continue to work and bring recommendations for proposed work under Numbers 2 and 3 above before the Board of Supervisors at a later date.

The Electoral Board remains on course to purchase new voting equipment that will serve the people of Augusta County for elections in 2017 and the following decade or longer.

Along with six of our most experienced chief officers of election and staff of the Registrar's Office, we had in-depth presentations by the four voting equipment vendors certified by the State Board of Elections to do business in the Commonwealth. Because of the time and expense in obtaining that certification, we do not believe additional equipment will be offered in the foreseeable future.

Based on those presentations we have selected two vendors – Election Services Online/Unisyn Voting Solutions and Atlantic Election Services/Dominion Voting for further investigation and negotiations. We will seek information and references from other localities that have already made the transition to digital/optical scan equipment. The meeting of the Virginia Electoral Board Association, April 8-10, will be a wonderful opportunity for our board to continue that process.

These two vendors offered the most competitive prices for the initial purchase of the equipment and for services required for each election. Based on this new information, we estimate the maximum cost to be under \$300,000.00 which is a reduction of at least \$50,000.00 from the estimate we presented on February 22.

Kensington Drive Basin Outfall

The purpose of the Kensington Basin is to retain the high volumes of storm water that was created when part of Teaverton subdivision was built. The outfall of this basin flows between the properties of 25 and 35 Kensington Drive.

The basin was designed to hold the increased volume of stormwater and release it slowly to reduce damage to the natural streams that existed before construction of the subdivision. At times the basin outfalls can carry high volumes of water at high velocities causing damage downstream as well as to adjacent properties. Regular maintenance has been performed on this outfall several times in the past.

The proposed design would reduce the overall velocity of stormwater as well as replace current materials with new materials that are less susceptible to erosion, such as concrete. For this project we requested quotes from various contractors that the County has utilized in the past.

The project was sent out to bid on February 9, 2016 and H. C. Eavers has been selected to do the work. They have performed work in Teaverton Subdivision, as well as worked on this project in the past.

Attached is an action plan, the scope of work, and the quote from H.C. Eavers.

Kensington Basin Outfall Scope of Work

The purpose of this project is to rework the outfall of the storm sewer outfall between 25 and 35 Kensington Dr. Water exits the 48" HDPE pipe at a high velocity causing downstream erosion immediately after the end of the riprap. There is also a pool of standing water causing concerns with the two adjacent neighbors.

The existing metal end section will be removed and excavated to prepare for the pouring of a new Standard EW-2 concrete end wall with wing walls. A standard PG-5 (W= 2 FT, D=1 FT, 2:1 side slopes) will extend downstream for a distance of 20 If from the floor of the new end wall. The wing walls will measure 6 inches taller than the existing pipe and taper to 12 inches tall at the end of the concrete floor. Paved ditch will be reinforced with 6 X 6 welded wire fabric.

Contractor will remove and reinstall existing Class I riprap (with new fabric underlayment) in the channel from the end of the PG-5 through the entire length of the flow line to the back of the adjacent properties. Class I riprap will be choked off with Class A1 riprap to fill in voids.

Contractor will excavate downstream side of the existing manhole adjacent to Kensington Drive and reseal HDPE to manhole connection with non-shrink grout. Contractor will excavate and repair the depression downstream of the large manhole ensuring good compaction.

Access to the work will be from Kensington Drive at the perpendicular intersection of the drainage easement. There are utilities parallel to and crossing the easement. Contractor will mark all utilities prior to beginning work. All disturbed areas will be top soiled, seeded with season specific turf grass mix and covered with straw matting. 10% of payment will be held until grass is sufficiently established.

Anticipated start time for this project will be in the spring/early summer when the channel should be dry and to aid in seed germination upon completion of the project.

- Provide all necessary equipment and labor to remove the existing flared end section from the pipe

Lease of Private Property for Use as Public Walking Trails

You have asked whether the County could lease the Goose Creek Trail from Crescent Development-Goose Creek, LLC, in a manner that the trail could be open for public use yet absolve Crescent Development from liability for injuries that might occur on the trail. The answer is found in §29.1-509 of the Code of Virginia. The Attorney General has stated this statute is designed to encourage landowners to open their lands for public recreational use by reducing the standard of care and duties owed to those who engage in such use. It can protect the property owner in two ways.

Section B of the statute states that a landowner shall owe no duty of care to keep land or premises safe for entry or use by others for a multitude of recreational purposes, including hiking and bicycle riding. So, the statute does absolve the property owner of liability for simple negligence liability. It does not, however, absolve the property owner of liability for gross negligence or willful or malicious failure to guard or warn against a dangerous condition, use, structure, or activity.

Section E of the statute provides complete protection for the property owner if it has entered into an agreement or grants an easement to the Commonwealth or any county, city, or town. The section requires the county to hold the property owner harmless from all liability and be responsible for the owner's costs and legal fees if a claim or suit attempting to impose liability is filed.

The Supreme Court of the Commonwealth of Virginia has had an opportunity to interpret §29.1-509 of the Code of Virginia. In City of Virginia Beach v. Flippen, 251 Va. 358, 467 S.E.2d 471 (1996), the Court determined what standard of care would apply to a local government that maintained private property for public recreation. The case dealt with a privately owned beach that was made available for use by the public. A subdivision plat, approved by the City, reserved pedestrian access strips to the beach.

The access strips were never conveyed to the City in fee or by easement. The City did maintain the access strips, though. In order to fight erosion, the property owner sought permission of the City to build bulkheads. In granting permission to construct the bulkheads, the City required the property owner to build stairways over the bulkheads, so that public access to the beach was continued. The City took over maintenance of the stairways. A severe Northeastern storm struck the city and did damage to some of the stairways. The City roped off the stairways that were severely damaged but the plaintiff was injured on a stairway that had not been so blocked. The Court determined that the City was a "person in control of the land or premises involved, and was thus protected by §29.1-509. Because there was no allegation that gross negligence was the proximate cause of plaintiff's injury, the Court found that the City was protected by the statute and that plaintiff was not entitled to the relief he sought.


In an opinion to Delegate Clarence E. (Bud) Phillips, dated March 29, 2005, 2005 Va. AG 107 (05-008), the Attorney General opined that landowners who receive a fee, such as a lease payment, for the use of their property from a political subdivision are covered by the indemnification provisions of §29.1-509 (E). He also concluded that political subdivisions which control private property by lease or contract in order to provide free public recreational use are entitled to the benefit of reduced liability under the provisions of §29.1-509(B) and (C) of the State Code.

Clearly, if the County leased Goose Creek trail to open it for public use, it will, as provided in the statute, indemnify the property owners of any liability caused by use of the trail. However, it appears that the County will lose the defense of sovereign immunity. Even so, the extent of liability assumed by the County is not great, because it will be limited to gross negligence or willful and wanton misconduct.

It is my opinion that the necessary control of the private property need not be evidenced by routine maintenance of the trail. The County's control of the trails could be demonstrated by the installation of signs concerning the use of the trail by the public, or perhaps, the installation of one or more park benches somewhere along the course of the trail.

Subject: Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG) Opportunity 2015

The Fire Prevention and Safety (FP&S) application period began on 4/4/16 and will run through 5/6/16.

The **purpose** of the FP&S Program is to enhance the safety of the public and firefighters with respect to fire and fire-related hazards by assisting fire prevention programs and supporting firefighter health and safety research and development.

The **objective** of the FY 2015 FP&S Program is to award grants directly to eligible applicants in order to carry out fire prevention and education, fire code enforcement, fire and arson investigation, and firefighter safety, health programming, and prevention efforts.

ACFR would like to apply for smoke alarms. We would like to implement a program in the area mobile home parks to include installation and education of smoke alarms in each home. We would have one or two events in each location, where trained personnel would inspect, install, or replace smoke alarms in homes. The application and cost include the following:

- 5000 Smoke Alarms
- Brochures for notification of the events and education on maintaining the smoke alarms

- Miscellaneous materials for installing smoke alarms
- Staff funding for each event

The total of the request would be at or below \$130,000 and the County share would be 5% of the request, approximately \$6750.

I am requesting permission to apply and accept, if awarded, the FP&S grant for the above referenced Smoke Detector Program. Funding for our current smoke alarm program does not allow for this type of education and events in these at risk areas of our County. For most mobile homes, once a fire has started the home is fully engulfed in flames in under 10 minutes, sometimes even before the fire department arrives, so having smoke alarms in these homes is very important to the survival of our residents.

I recommend we move forward with applying for the grant as outlined above in order to meet the grant deadline. I appreciate your consideration in granting this request.

The Bonds will be sold to the Virginia Public School Authority to finance a portion of the costs of capital projects for school purposes.

VIRGINIA PUBLIC SCHOOL AUTHORITY (VPSA) FINANCING (cont'd)

primarily the design, construction and equipping of a new Riverheads Elementary School, a new Hugh K. Cassell Elementary School and an expansion of Wilson Middle School, as well as the demolition of the existing Hugh K. Cassell Elementary School and Riverheads Elementary School buildings. The Bonds may be issued in more than one series and from time to time in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$47,000,000. A portion of the proceeds of the Bonds will be used for the payment of issuance costs.

Jennifer Whetzel, Deputy County Administrator, advised that before the Board is the consideration of issuance of Bonds by Augusta County. They are general obligation Bonds and require pledging a full faith in credit that the County will be able to repay these bonds based on our revenues. The bonds will be sold to the Virginia Public School Authority to finance a portion of cost of capital projects for school purposes. The Bonds may be issued in more than one series. There are plans to issue \$30 million in the spring and \$15.5 million in the fall. Those designations are in accordance with the construction schedule for the three projects. This public hearing is actually for an amount not to exceed \$47 million. The reason for the difference between \$47 million and \$45.5 million is in case the market changes and we can sell the Bonds at a discount. We want to guarantee the \$45.5 million. Advertising the \$47 million allows us to have only one public hearing if the bonds are sold at a discount. A second public hearing is not necessary. A portion of the proceeds of the Bonds will be used for payment of issuance cost. In the packet given was a Resolution, which authorized the issuance of the Bonds for the project. It authorizes the pledge faith full in credit and it will also authorize County representatives including School Superintendent, Chairman of the Board, County Administrator and the Clerk of the Court to sign off on the documents and get them Also included was Bond Sale Agreement and Continuing Disclosure Agreement. The timeline going forward; votes will be given to Counsel. Counsel will prepare the documents and send them back for signatures in early April. The Bonds will be sold around April 26, 2016. Closing and receipt of the funds by County around May 17, 2016. The Board previously approved a resolution for these projects in February 2016.

Dr. Bond, Superintendent of Augusta County Schools, showed a brief PowerPoint presentation which included pictures of the progress on the three projects taking place at Riverhead Elementary School, Hugh K. Cassell Elementary School and Wilson Middle School.
