Emergency Operations Plan

Augusta County and the Cities of Staunton and Waynesboro have recently completed an update of their Emergency Operations Plan (EOP). Central Shenandoah Planning District Staff (CSPDC) assisted in updating the HMERP. The Code of Virginia, §44-146.19, requires each local jurisdiction and inter-jurisdictional agencies to prepare and keep current a local emergency operations plan. Every four years, each local agency will conduct a comprehensive review and revision of its emergency operations plan to ensure that the plan remains current, and the revised plan shall be formally adopted by the locality's governing body.

The Emergency Operations Plan includes:

- The Basic Plan which uses an all-hazards approach to describe the concepts, responsibility and structures of mitigation, preparedness, response, and recovery operations.
- The Emergency Support Functions which describe the structure for emergency operations and how they will be organized and implemented.
- The Support Annexes and Hazard Specific Annexes that provide information for hazard situations requiring specialized response and recovery procedures.

As the draft update of the Emergency Operations Plan has been completed, it needs to be adopted by the three local jurisdictions through a resolution. Attached, you will find a sample resolution for adoption of the Plan. Health Insurance Rates for 2017

In preparing budget figures for FY 16-17, our health insurance consultant recommended a 17.1% increase to the health insurance premium. As a Consortium, we agreed that we as a group needed to go out for bid and look at plan changes and offering a high deductible plan with a HSA (health savings account) along with a traditional health care plan so employees could have a choice in health plan offerings.

We had Aetna and Anthem bid on the Consortium as a bundled and unbundled plan and Express Scripts bid on a standalone pharmacy benefit. Aetna was awarded the health insurance contract and Express Scripts was awarded the pharmacy contract. Carving out pharmacy benefits to Express Scripts provided an overall estimated savings of \$426,941 for the Consortium.

The new contract will be offering a hybrid of benefits as those offered in the 2016 High and Low POS plans and a high deductible plan with a HSA. With these plans, the County saw an increase in premium of 3.9%. Per Jennifer Whetzel, Deputy County Administrator, we have \$280,875 in savings based on what we budgeted per employee and need \$281,152 in dependent subsidy with the 3.9% increase. Our recommendation is to offer the new plans to the employees, pass the 3.9% increase onto the employee funding and fund the Health Savings account \$500 annually.

The County is moving towards new plan structures to ensure that costs stay within the approved budget. The new plans will allow employees to have insurance plans that are comparable to the current plans and will also open up opportunity for employees to invest in Health Savings Accounts.

Attached please find the resolution authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds through the Virginia Public School Authority (VPSA). The issuance is not to exceed an aggregate principal amount of \$16,500,000. The bonds will be used to continue funding capital projects for school purposes, primarily the design, construction and equipping of a new Riverheads Elementary School, a new Hugh K. Cassell Elementary School, and an expansion of Wilson Middle School buildings.

The Board has already approved a reimbursement resolution in the amount of \$45,000,000 on February 10, 2016 for these projects. A public hearing was held on March 23, 2016 for an amount not to exceed \$47,830,000. The difference between the \$45 million and the \$47 million is to ensure enough funds for the project in case the market would change and the bonds would sell at a discount. This guaranteed that the County could receive the \$45 million to cover the entire project.

The first bond issuance (VPSA Series 2016A) was sold on May 17, 2016 at a premium for a principal amount of \$27,825,000. Total funds received were \$30,004,445.89.

The bond sale resolution authorizes the pledge of full faith and credit of the County and authorizes County representatives including School Superintendent, Chairman of the Board, County Administrator, and the Clerk of the Court to sign off on the documents and have them executed.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF NOT TO EXCEED \$16,500,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION SCHOOL BOND OF THE COUNTY OF AUGUSTA, VIRGINIA, TO BE SOLD TO THE VIRGINIA PUBLIC SCHOOL AUTHORITY AND PROVIDING FOR THE FORM AND DETAILS THEREOF.

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors (the "Board") of the County of Augusta, Virginia (the "County"), has determined that it is necessary and expedient to borrow an amount not to exceed \$16,500,000 and to issue its general obligation school bond (as more specifically defined below, the "Local School Bond") for the purpose of financing a portion of the costs of capital projects for school purposes, primarily the design, construction and equipping of a new Riverheads Elementary School, a new Hugh K. Cassell Elementary School and an expansion of Wilson Middle School, as well as the demolition of the existing Hugh K. Cassell Elementary School and Riverheads Elementary School buildings (collectively, the "Project");

WHEREAS, the County held a public hearing, duly noticed, on March 23, 2016, on the issuance of the Local School Bond in accordance with the requirements of Section 15.2-2606, Code of Virginia 1950, as amended (the "Virginia Code");

WHEREAS, the School Board of the County has, by resolution, requested the Board to authorize the issuance of the Local School Bond and consented to the issuance of the Local School Bond;

WHEREAS, the Virginia Public School Authority ("VPSA") has offered to purchase the Local School Bond along with the local school bonds of certain other localities with a portion of the proceeds of certain bonds to be issued by VPSA in the fall of 2016 (the "VPSA Bonds");

WHEREAS, the Bond Sale Agreement (as defined below) shall indicate that \$15,500,000 is the amount of proceeds requested (the "Proceeds Requested") from VPSA in connection with the sale of the Local School Bond;

WHEREAS, VPSA's objective is to pay the County a purchase price for the Local School Bond which, in VPSA's judgment, reflects the Local School Bond's market value (the "VPSA Purchase Price Objective"), taking into consideration such factors as the amortization schedule the County has requested for the Local School Bond relative to the amortization schedules requested by other localities, the purchase price to be received by VPSA from the sale of the VPSA Bonds and other market conditions relating to the sale of the VPSA Bonds; and

WHEREAS, such factors may result in the Local School Bond having a purchase price other than par and consequently (i) the County may have to issue the Local School Bond in a principal amount that is greater than or less than the Proceeds Requested in order to receive an amount of proceeds that is substantially equal to the Proceeds Requested, or (ii) if the maximum authorized principal amount of the Local School Bond set forth in section 1 below does not exceed the Proceeds Requested by at least the amount of any discount, the purchase price to be paid to the

County, given the VPSA Purchase Price Objective and market conditions, will be less than the Proceeds Requested.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF AUGUSTA, VIRGINIA:

- 1. <u>Authorization of Local School Bond and Use of Proceeds</u>. The Board hereby determines that it is advisable to contract a debt and issue and sell its general obligation school bond in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$16,500,000 (the "Local School Bond") for the purpose of financing the Project. The Board hereby authorizes the issuance and sale of the Local School Bond in the form and upon the terms established pursuant to this Resolution.
- 2. Sale of the Local School Bond. The sale of the Local School Bond, within the parameters set forth in paragraph 4 of this Resolution, to VPSA is authorized. Given the VPSA Purchase Price Objective and market conditions, the County acknowledges that the limitation on the maximum principal amount of the Local School Bond set forth in paragraph 1 of this Resolution restricts VPSA's ability to generate the Proceeds Requested, however, the Local School Bond may be sold for a purchase price not lower than 100% of the Proceeds Requested. The Chairman of the Board, the Vice Chairman of the Board, the County Administrator, the Deputy County Administrator and the Finance Director, any of whom may act (each a "Delegate"), and such other officer or officers of the County as a Delegate may designate are each hereby authorized and directed to enter into an agreement with VPSA providing for the sale of the Local School Bond to VPSA (the "Bond Sale Agreement"). The Bond Sale Agreement shall be in substantially the form submitted to the Board at this meeting, which form is hereby approved, with such completions, insertions, omissions and changes not inconsistent with this Resolution as may be approved by the Delegate executing the Bond Sale Agreement.
- 3. <u>Details of the Local School Bond</u>. The Local School Bond shall be dated 16 days prior to the date of its issuance and delivery or such other date designated by VPSA; shall be designated "General Obligation School Bond, Series 2016B"; shall bear interest from its dated date payable semi-annually on each January 15 and July 15 beginning July 15, 2017 (each an "Interest Payment Date"), at the rates established in accordance with paragraph 4 of this Resolution; and shall mature on July 15 in the years (each a "Principal Payment Date") and in the amounts acceptable to a Delegate (the "Principal Installments"), subject to the provisions of paragraph 4 of this Resolution.
- 4. <u>Interest Rates and Principal Installments</u>. Each Delegate is hereby authorized and directed to accept the interest rates on the Local School Bond established by VPSA, provided that each interest rate shall be five one-hundredths of one percent (0.05%) over the interest rate to be paid by VPSA for the corresponding principal payment date of the VPSA Bonds, a portion of the proceeds of which will be used to purchase the Local School Bond, and provided further that the true interest cost of the Local School Bond does not exceed five and fifty one-hundredths percent (5.50%) per annum. The Interest Payment Dates and the Principal Installments are subject to change at the request of VPSA. Each Delegate is hereby authorized and directed to accept changes in the Interest Payment Dates and the Principal Installments at the request of VPSA based on the final term to maturity of the VPSA Bonds, requirements imposed on VPSA by the nationally-recognized rating agencies and the final principal amount of the Local School Bond; provided, however, that the principal amount of the Local School Bond shall not exceed the amount

authorized by this Resolution and the final maturity of the Local School Bond shall not exceed twenty-one (21) years from the date of the issuance and delivery of the Local School Bond. The execution and delivery of the Local School Bond as described in paragraph 8 hereof shall conclusively evidence the approval and acceptance of all of the details of the Local School Bond by the Delegate as authorized by this Resolution.

- 5. <u>Form of the Local School Bond</u>. The Local School Bond shall be initially in the form of a single, temporary typewritten bond substantially in the form attached hereto as Exhibit A.
- 6. Payment; Paying Agent and Bond Registrar. The following provisions shall apply to the Local School Bond:
- (a) For as long as VPSA is the registered owner of the Local School Bond, all payments of principal, premium, if any, and interest on the Local School Bond shall be made in immediately available funds to VPSA at, or before 11:00 a.m. on the applicable Interest Payment Date, Principal Payment Date or date fixed for prepayment or redemption, or if such date is not a business day for Virginia banks or for the Commonwealth of Virginia, then at or before 11:00 a.m. on the business day next succeeding such Interest Payment Date, Principal Payment Date or date fixed for prepayment or redemption.
- (b) All overdue payments of principal and, to the extent permitted by law, interest shall bear interest at the applicable interest rate or rates on the Local School Bond.
- (c) U.S. Bank National Association, Richmond, Virginia, is designated as Bond Registrar and Paying Agent for the Local School Bond. The County may, in its sole discretion, replace at any time the Bond Registrar with another qualified bank or trust company as successor Bond Registrar and Paying Agent for the Local School Bond. The County shall give prompt notice to VPSA of the appointment of any successor Bond Registrar and Paying Agent.
- 7. Prepayment or Redemption. The Principal Installments of the Local School Bond held by VPSA coming due on or before July 15, 2026, and the definitive bond for which the Local School Bond held by VPSA may be exchanged that mature on or before July 15, 2026, are not subject to prepayment or redemption prior to their stated maturities. The Principal Installments of the Local School Bond held by VPSA coming due on or after July 15, 2027, and the definitive bond(s) for which the Local School Bond held by VPSA may be exchanged that mature on or after July 15, 2027, are subject to prepayment or redemption at the option of the County prior to their stated maturities in whole or in part, on any date on or after July 15, 2026, upon payment of the prepayment or redemption prices (expressed as percentages of Principal Installments to be prepaid or the principal amount of the Local School Bond to be redeemed) set forth below plus accrued interest to the date set for prepayment or redemption:

<u>Dates</u>	Prices
July 15, 2026 through July 14, 2027 July 15, 2027 through July 14, 2028	101%
July 15, 2028 and thereafter	100

<u>Provided, however,</u> that the Principal Installments of the Local School Bond shall not be subject to prepayment or redemption prior to their stated maturities as described above without first obtaining the written consent of VPSA or other registered owner of the Local School Bond. Notice of any such prepayment or redemption shall be given by the Bond Registrar to VPSA or other registered owner by registered mail not more than ninety (90) and not less than sixty (60) days before the date fixed for prepayment or redemption.

If VPSA refunds the VPSA Bonds in the future and such refunding causes the Local School Bond to be deemed refunded, the prepayment or redemption of the Local School Bond will be subject to VPSA approval and subject to similar prepayment or redemption provisions as set forth above that correspond to the call period of the VPSA bonds issued in part to refund the Local School Bond.

- 8. <u>Execution of the Local School Bond</u>. The Chairman or Vice Chairman and the Clerk or any Deputy Clerk of the Board are each authorized and directed to execute and deliver the Local School Bond and to affix the seal of the County thereto.
- 9. Pledge of Full Faith and Credit. For the prompt payment of the principal of, premium, if any, and the interest on the Local School Bond as the same shall become due, the full faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged, and in each year while any portion of the Local School Bond shall be outstanding there shall be levied and collected in accordance with law an annual ad valorem tax upon all taxable property in the County subject to local taxation sufficient in amount to provide for the payment of the principal of and premium, if any, and the interest on the Local School Bond as such principal, premium, if any, and interest shall become due, which tax shall be without limitation as to rate or amount and in addition to all other taxes authorized to be levied in the County to the extent other funds of the County are not lawfully available and appropriated for such purpose.
- such other officer or officers of the County or the School Board as a Delegate may designate are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver on behalf of the County a Use of Proceeds Certificate and Tax Compliance Agreement (the "Tax Compliance Agreement") setting forth the expected use and investment of the proceeds of the Local School Bond and containing such covenants as may be necessary in order to show compliance with the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"), and applicable regulations relating to the exclusion from gross income of interest on the VPSA Bonds. The Board covenants on behalf of the County that (i) the proceeds from the issuance and sale of the Local School Bond will be invested and expended as set forth in such Tax Compliance Agreement and that the County shall comply with the other covenants and representations contained therein and (ii) the County shall comply with the provisions of the Code so that interest on the VPSA Bonds will remain excludable from gross income for federal income tax purposes.
- 11. <u>State Non-Arbitrage Program; Proceeds Agreement</u>. The Board hereby determines that it is in the best interests of the County to authorize and direct each Delegate and the County Treasurer to participate in the State Non-Arbitrage Program in connection with the Local School Bond. Each Delegate, the County Treasurer and such officer or officers of the County as a Delegate or the County Treasurer may designate are each hereby authorized and directed to execute

and deliver a Proceeds Agreement with respect to the deposit and investment of proceeds of the Local School Bond by and among the County, the other participants in the sale of the VPSA Bonds, VPSA, the investment manager and the depository.

- 12. Continuing Disclosure Agreement. Each Delegate and such other officer or officers of the County as a Delegate may designate are each hereby authorized and directed to execute a Continuing Disclosure Agreement, as set forth in Appendix D to the Bond Sale Agreement, setting forth the reports and notices to be filed by the County and containing such covenants as may be necessary in order to show compliance with the provisions of the Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12, under the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, as amended, and directed to make all filings required by Section 3 of the Bond Sale Agreement should the County be determined by VPSA to be a MOP (as defined in the Bond Sale Agreement).
- 13. Refunding. The Board hereby acknowledges that VPSA may issue refunding bonds to refund any bonds previously issued by VPSA, including the VPSA Bonds issued to purchase the Local School Bond, and that the purpose of such refunding bonds would be to enable VPSA to pass on annual debt service savings to the local issuers, including the County. Each Delegate is authorized to execute and deliver to VPSA such allonge to the Local School Bond, revised debt service schedule, IRS Form 8038-G or such other documents reasonably deemed necessary by VPSA and VPSA's bond counsel to be necessary to reflect and facilitate the refunding of the Local School Bond and the allocation of the annual debt service savings to the County by VPSA. The Clerk to the Board of Supervisors is authorized to affix the County's seal on any such documents and attest or countersign the same.
- 14. <u>Filing of Resolution</u>. The appropriate officers or agents of the County are hereby authorized and directed to cause a certified copy of this Resolution to be filed with the Circuit Court of the County.
- 15. <u>Election to Proceed under Public Finance Act</u>. In accordance with Section 15.2-2601 of the Virginia Code, the Board elects to issue the Local School Bond pursuant to the provisions of the Public Finance Act of 1991, Chapter 26 of Title 15.2 of the Virginia Code.
- 16. <u>Further Actions</u>. The members of the Board and all officers, employees and agents of the County are hereby authorized to take such action as they or any one of them may consider necessary or desirable in connection with the issuance and sale of the Local School Bond and otherwise in furtherance of this Resolution and any such action previously taken is hereby ratified and confirmed.
 - 17. Effective Date. This Resolution shall take effect immediately.



2017 LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES

Mr. Fitzgerald presented the first draft of the legislative priorities. He has been working with Jane Woods to put key points together. He wanted the Board to have the draft before the VACO meeting next week. As it gets closer to the General Assembly session there will likely be several changes. The first draft includes items such as, public education and increasing their funding, the school composite index question about utilizing land use values. The transportation section changed somewhat. What used to be called HB2 Projects are now called Smart Scale Projects. Language adjustments were made in regards to sustaining more dedicated sources of revenue for transportation. Machinery and tools tax and Children Services Act were also included. Stormwater regulations

2017 LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES (CONT'D)

still remain a priority. Nutrient credits are included because our waste water treatment plants have built in excess credits for future growth and we want to keep those. We also kept in large utility projects which is pipeline oversight. This was added last year, but is still important to ensure adequate resources for DEQ. Standard items include annexation, overtime rates, and the legislative nominating process for primary and special elections. The voting equipment is still being pushed for and we would like to see the State help with funding to help with this project. The public notice requirements are still an issue. We are required to advertise public hearings in the newspaper and it is costly. It's important to note that the Chairman and Mr. Fitzgerald met with a local editor and he admitted that people are getting their information from sources other than the newspaper. If there are other legislative priorities that the Board would like to be considered it can certainly be added or deleted.

Mr. Pyles stated that the Constitutional Officers came during budget time wanting more money. He feels there needs to be something done about the funding that is allotted from the State for Constitutional Offices. The County is not responsible for funding these positions.

Mr. Coleman stated that the Board changed the process in terms of meeting with the delegation, the County Administrator, and Board leadership actually meet with the legislators as opposed to the entire Board. The Chamber of Commerce has held the legislators accountable through scorecards. We keep telling our Delegates and they claim to be taking it back to Richmond and very little changes. We need to find a way to hold these legislators accountable for their efforts. Something has to change because what we are doing isn't working. Mr. Coleman has talked with some delegates individually, but we are small compared to some areas.

Mr. Pyles stated that VACO did scorecards for a while, but it didn't go over well. We've gotten little things that have helped here and there, but nothing big. We have very powerful law makers representing Augusta County right now. They could get things done if they wanted to. We need to come up with one thing to get done and focus on that one thing.

Mr. Shull stated that the Composite Index is a big thing we need help on.

Mr. Pyles feels that Composite Index is the one that offers the most success. A lot of Counties support it. Nothing will offer up more.

Mr. Coleman feels it's a good idea to point out the Composite Index and say this is our number one priority.

Mr. Pattie suggested Phase 3 funding for internet access. Allocating more money into that would help us indirectly.

Chairman Bragg indicated that she had received a phone call from Jeff Wiseman of York County. He is calling different localities and trying to gain support for the Meals Tax and the ability for the Counties to do something with that tax should they have the need. Cities and Towns can go up to 8%, however Augusta County cannot. There are 4 or 5 in the State of Virginia that have the ability to go up to 4% without going to referendum. Chairman Bragg wants to get the Boards thoughts and feelings on this matter.

Mr. Pyles stated that it continues to be a position to have equal taxation for Counties verses the Cities. He would like to see the Board really work for equal taxation.

2017 LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES (CONT'D)

Mr. Fitzgerald feets that most of the issues can be kept in the package, but focus on equal taxation and the Composite Index. The Legislative package will be brought to the Board several more times before it is finalized.

WAIVERS

Mr. Wilkinson stated a request for a waiver from connection to public sewer has been requested by Erin McAllister. It's a proposed subdivision of property on Kiddsville Road. The property will connect to public water. Mr. Wilkinson showed pictures of the property, Section 24-1 of Augusta County Code requires structures in the urban service area to connect to water and sewer, however in Section 8, there is an option for a waiver from the Board of Supervisors if they deem it to be not practically available. Factors listed in the waiver include economic infeasibility, geographic features, topographic features and available capacity from the service authority to serve a home or structure. The Board adopted a policy for granting waivers to water and sewer on December 19, 2013. The waiver policy states the criteria for minor subdivisions. One criteria is if an easement is required to connect a house or building to the line and such easement has not been created and reasonable efforts have been made to secure the easement have failed. Mr. Wilkinson handed out a written letter Ms. McAllister received from a neighbor where the line would have to cross through his yard. He has denied permission for her to come across his property. She also went to a contractor to check on cost to construct the line and it exceeds the threshold set by the Board.

Mr. Fitzgerald pointed out that this is the first waiver the Board has had to do. The policy states that if it's an existing lot the Director of Community Development can review the policy and make the decision to approve the waiver or not. The lots surrounding this lot have previously been granted waivers from the Director of Community Development, but this is a newly created lot so therefore it requires the Board's approval.

MATTERS TO BE PRESENTED BY THE BOARD

Mr. Pyles stated that he would be attending the VACO meeting on the 19th, and would not be present at the next Board of Supervisors meeting.

Mr. Shull stated that the first day of school went well. The County fair was a success last week and he heard several comments concerning the courthouse. Mr. Shull feels there needs to be town hall meetings set up at the 5 high schools in Augusta County. Mr. Fitzgerald is working on dates with the schools. He would like to see all Board of Supervisors members present. The public needs to be informed and he feels there is a lot of misconceptions with the courthouse and they need to be cleared up. People question why the price tag is on the referendum and we need to explain to the people about the cost. 10 million is not going to be enough for downtown. There is no guarantee that Staunton will stand true to the 12.5 million and he feels that if the referendum is turned down Staunton will not give any money.

Mr. Coleman had the opportunity to make a formal presentation to two groups concerning the courthouse. People need to understand where the figures come from as far as the cost is concerned. It's not an option to renovate the old buildings.

Mr. Pyles had the County Attorney send him the Code of Virginia on the referendum and what information had to be on it. He doesn't feel it will cost \$45 million to build the new courthouse. He attended the fair last week and because of the misinformation people are getting, some of the citizens do not feel Verona is good enough to be the County Seat. This is a working community. We are building for what's going to be here, not what is here. We are leaving Staunton because they are in the past and we are in the future.

Mr. Garber brought up a lighter side. He attended a Planning District meeting and afterwards he commented to Staunton City Manager that when he looks out of his office window, he admires his new road across Route 250 and the landscape is so much better now that an old building is gone.

Chairman Bragg thanked everyone for working the fair. One of the comments she heard many times was about taxes being raised. However, if we do the \$59 million, we haven't planned for that much and it could easily raise the taxes. She reminded everyone that August 27 is the first Courthouse Open House.

NATIONAL SUICIDE PREVENTION WEEK-PROCLAMATION

Crystal Graham thanked the Board on behalf of the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention for considering this proclamation. She is a survivor of a suicide loss. Her identical twin died by suicide when she was 15 years old and a student at Fort Defiance High School. Ms. Graham is joined by Donna Bailey and Virginia Graham who are also survivors of suicide loss. Twenty-four years later, Ms. Graham has joined the efforts to fight suicide and be the voice in the community and State wide for reducing the stigma surrounding mental illness and suicide. She serves on the State Chapter Board for the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention, has advocated on behalf of suicide prevention and mental illness in Washington D.C. and has taken and brought suicide intervention training to the region. Ms. Graham also leads a Suicide Prevention Round Table aimed at bringing professionals to the table for collaboration purposes. She invited everyone to join them for the Greater Augusta Out of the Darkness walk on October 8. 2016 at Gypsy Hill Park in Staunton. With six weeks to go, there have been 200 people register to walk and have raised nearly \$10,000 of the \$50,000 goal. Last year was the first walk with over 800 people attending and raised approximately \$40,000. Suicide prevention starts with everyday heroes. By issuing this proclamation, we bring an issue that is not talked about often out of the darkness.

This Proclamation recognizes suicide as a national and statewide public health problem and suicide prevention as a national and statewide responsibility, and designates September 5ththrough 11has "National Sucide Prevention Week" in Augusta County, Virginia This week overlaps World Sucide Prevention Day, September 10¹n, recognized internationally and supported by the World Health Organization

WHEREAS, suicide is the 10th leading cause of death in the United States and the 2rd leading cause of death among individuals between the ages of 10 to 34.

WHEREAS, in the United States, one person completes suicide every 12.3 minutes, resulting in nearly 43 000 suicides each year (Centers for Disease Control).

WHEREAS, suicide is the only leading cause of death in the United States that has increased every year for the past decade.

WHEREAS, it is estimated that there are over 1.1 million suicide attempts each year

WHEREAS, in 2014. Virginia experienced 1,122 deaths by suicide

WHEREAS, in Virginia, suicide is the 11th leading cause of death overall

WHEREAS, over 90% of the people who die by suicide have a diagnosable and treatable mental health condition, although often that condition is not recognized or treated

WHEREAS, suicide results in an estimated \$44.6 billion in combined medical and work loss costs nationally (Centers for Disease Control).

WHEREAS, suicide results in an estimated \$1.12 billion in combined tifetime medical and work loss costs in Virginia (Centers for Disease Control).

WHEREAS, the stigma associated with mental health conditions and suicidality works against suicide prevention by discouraging persons at risk for suicide from seeking life-saving help and further traumatizers survivors of suicide toss and people with lived experience of suicide.

WHEREAS, organizations such as The American Foundation for Suicide Prevention envision a world without suicide, and are dedicated to saving lives and bringing hope to those affected by suicide through research, education advocacy and resources for those who have lost or struggle, and urge that we

- Recognize suicide as a preventable national and state public health problem and declare suicide prevention to be a priority
- Acknowledge that no single suicide prevention program or effort will be appropriate for all
 populations or communities
- Encourage initiatives based on the goals contained in the National Strategy for Suicide Provention.
- Promote awareness that there is no single cause for suicide, and that suicide most often occurs
 when stressors exceed current coping abilities of someone suffering from a mental health condition

MARY BALDWIN COLLEGE 175TH ANNIVERSARY PRESENTATION

Mr. Fitzgerald introduced Crista Cabe and David Mowen from Mary Baldwin College.

Crista Cabe, Senior Vice President for University Relations, along with David Mowen, Executive Vice President for Finance and Administration, thanked the Board of Supervisors for their support over the years. She commended the Staff for their support as well. August 31, 2016 is the day when they formally become Mary Baldwin University. There will be a formal procession and Chairman Bragg will be a part of that. A proclamation presented by the Governor stating it will be Mary Baldwin University Day across the Commonwealth on the 31st and also various other resolutions. They will also kick off their Quartoseptcentennial which is their 175th anniversary year. Ms. Cabe met with the Richmond Times Dispatch Editorial Board and the Editorial page Editor stated that it was impressive, even for Virginia, where there is a number of distinguished institutions. Mary Baldwin is the University in Augusta County and Staunton. Because part of their DNA from the beginning has been service to community and integration to community, they have committed themselves to performing 175 service projects. Ms. Cabe foresees that being surpassed and they have gotten started with a trip to Haiti with Physical Therapy and Occupational Therapy students who just recently returned. In April there will be an all Alumni Homecoming and will conclude the Quarterseptcentennial year with the 175th Commencement and will be awarding their very first Doctorate Degrees in the fields of Physical and Occupational Therapy. The question often asked is how they made the decision to switch from a College to a University and what is the difference between the two? Ms. Cabe researched for 15-18 months and she looked at what people really think the difference is. People associate College with small institutions that have a unified undergraduate liberal arts program, a bachelor's degree, but not graduate degrees. Small and personal with a faculty focused on students rather than research. Undergraduate students get a chance to do research and there is a lot of welcoming spirit for students. Universities are thought of as large and impersonal with 20,000 to 30,000 students and being forward looking and progressive. Mary Baldwin College does not fall in any one of those categories. They are small and personal, we have a liberal arts core, but lots of career oriented programs. They are in a category of a small university that not many people think about. Mary Baldwin is a small university with big rewards. The name had to be looked at. Some suggested the College be called The Baldwin University or University of Augusta County, but they found in research that not only does the Baldwin matter, but the Mary matters as well. Mary Julia Baldwin was in the very first class of the Augusta Female Seminary when it started in 1842. She took over the Seminary in 1863 in the height of the Civil War and kept in growing. Afterwards, she made it into one of the most progressive and popular schools of its type in the south. They need to continue to pay tribute to her legacy by retaining her full name. A University signifies there is multiple colleges and schools. It also signifies a high level of gender neutrality. They are a coeducational university with more students in our coeducational programs than in our College for Women, but because they have such a long history as a college for women that is what people think of when they think of Mary Baldwin College. They found the switch to University helps people understand the entirety of what is offered. They have looked for opportunities, we see possibility and we try to figure out what students need and where the jobs will be for our graduates and what society needs from us. Baldwin has followed a path through diversification since 1977. They started the first adult degree program in the State of Virginia. Since then they have continued to add multiple programs for diverse student populations such as the

MARY BALDWIN COLLEGE 175TH ANNIVERSARY PRESENTATION (CONT'D)

Virginia Women's Institute for Leadership, and the program for exceptionally gifted for very talented young women. Their historic core is Mary Baldwin College for Women, they have Baldwin Online and Adult Programs offering fully online degrees as well as hybrid classes through 14 different regional centers throughout Virginia. Their College of Education was started several years ago and the Graduate Education Program was started in 1992. Graduate Shakespeare and Performance Program in partnership with the American Shakespeare Center was founded in 2001 and since then has acquired international acclaim. The most familiar is the Murphy Deming College of Health Sciences and the Graduate and Undergraduate programs there. Ms. Cabe showed the percentage of student credit hours from 1984 to 2015. The numbers haven't changed much. Overall it's a steady market for Mary Baldwin. In order to remain economically vibrant they have had to ad programs. The first added was the Baldwin Online and Adult, The Graduate Teacher Education, The Shakespeare and Performance and the Murphy Deming College of Health Sciences which in a short time the numbers started increasing. Those are programs with a strong demand nationally and locally. They are very proud of the Murphy Deming School in the Fishersville area. It is serving as an anchor to attract other development and a strong sense of location in the center part of Augusta County. The Mary Baldwin University brand has been rolled out. For years the colors have been yellow and white. Sometime in the 80's they started using green as a part of their colors and it became their official school color. They wanted to reclaim the yellow because of what it People associate the bright color with optimism, creativity acquired knowledge, inquisitiveness and possibility for the future. The seat has been updated as well. Ms. Cabe showed a picture of the updated seal. Next week, they will be announcing an MBA that will be available this fall for students. Also a new online Graduate Health Sciences degree at the Masters level. Ms. Cabe thanked everyone for allowing her to speak and offered to answer any questions.

Dr. Pattie asked how many students Mary Baldwin had.

Ms. Cabe stated that last year the final total was 1,666 and this year they are expecting over 1700.

Dr. Pattie asked if the MBA Program would be full time or part time.

Ms. Cabe stated that it will be full time and fully online for anyone that wants to do it part time.

Ms. Bragg stated that on behalf of the Board of Supervisors, they are very excited for them and congratulated them.

Mr. Fitzgerald briefed the Board earlier in the month that this would be coming up. We have applied for this type of grant in the past. This is a 50/50 grant through the state. They do offer an 80/20, but traditionally it has been difficult departments such as ours to get the 80/20. Our 50% match would come from our Capital Account. The grant is based on demonstrated need. Mr. Holloway stated that the request is being made so the EMS Supervisor vehicle can be replaced. The current vehicle is a 2005 Explorer. We are looking to upgrade to a larger vehicle such as an Expedition. Needed equipment is being added regularly and space is becoming very limited. The EMS Supervisor position was started two years ago. Over 500 calls has been answered this year by the EMS Supervisor. The grant request is \$50,000.

Mr. Garber asked if the vehicle being purchased had the biggest engine that is offered.

Mr. Holloway didn't have the answer, but will check into it.

Mr. Kelley moved, seconded by Mr. Shull, that the Board approve submitting the application for the Rescue Squad Assistance Grant.

GOOSE CREEK WATERSHED

Mr. Fitzgerald stated that the letter of support was given to each Board member. On Monday the Board heard all of the good things that are happening in the Goose Creek Watershed. Crescent Development was present and talked about some of the future plans they had in cleaning up the waterway. This project provides Augusta County with some great benefit in regards to MS4. It's a good partnership. The grant does not require anything from the County. It's a letter of support to acquire Chesapeake Bay funds in order to start the process.

Mr. Coleman asked that Bobby Whitescarver get a chance to speak on behalf on the Goose Creek Watershed project.

Mr. Whitescarver clarified that they started with Goose Creek, a subwater shed of Christians Creek, and DEQ made them write the grant for Goose Creek, Christians Creek, and South River Watershed. The Chesapeake Bay Foundation is preparing the grant. The support of the Board of Supervisors is appreciated.

SOURCEWATER PROTECTION: BERRY FARM/MIDDLEBROOK

Becky Earhart, Senior Planner, stated that the Service Authority has completed the ground water study at the Berry Farm. She showed a map of the existing sources of water and the two new sources. The study identifies the 2 new water sources on the Berry Farm. The study that was done also established the recharge area. Consistent with the County Policy, as we get the studies from Service Authority, we do the rezoning necessary to place the source water protection overlay on them. The request would be to add area 1 to the two new well sites and the area 2 to those parcels in the county that are in the recharge area. The line is roughly Route 262. There are parcels in the City of Staunton and Community Development would send out a letter to the residents in the City to indicate that they are located in the Recharge Area. The Middlebrook well Recharge Area was also shown. Also on the agenda was the well sites themselves. Ms. Earhart showed a map of the parcels the Service Authority would like to acquire. There is a 7 acre site and a 5.7 acre site for the two future wells. Mr. Fanfoni with the Service Authority is available for questions the Board may have regarding the wells.

Mr. Fanfoni stated that the Service Authority has been drilling wells north of Staunton between Verona and Weyers Cave for the past 15 years. Keep in mind that Berry Farm is Verona's only water supply. Water from Berry Farm can go all the way to Weyers Cave. It's a critical area for them. They tested both wells and they both tested at 500 gallons per minute which is good. There is another well on the site, but the problem is when it is pumped it pulls the water down from the spring so they are both pulling from the same place. It's not a supplement, it steals water from the spring. The key thing they are looking for is that each one pumped at 500 gallons per minute and it did not interfere with the spring or each other. So they basically have 3 independent water sources which is important. Everything has been tested and they received all water quality data. It passed for drinking water supply wells. There is an existing softener at the Berry Farm treatment building and these wells will probably run these into the softener as well. There is approximately \$2 million budgeted for developing the wells and expanding the water treatment plant. It's in the five year plan for the Service Authority. Wells are critical for future growth.

Mr. Shull moved, seconded by Dr. Pattie, that the Board approve proceeding with advertisement for the Sourcewater Protection Overlay zoning for Berry Farm and Middlebrook.

Dr. Pattie asked if the transfer of property was something that had to be decided on right away. This does have value. We have formed a good relationship with the Service Authority. We have talked about trying to protect the area further, such as putting in a better parking lot on the Project Grows area to ensure the wells are protected. Project Grows has talked about putting in a barn to store equipment. A trade was brought up that would have the Service Authority take the lead in constructing the parking area and the barn and we would donate the land to them in exchange. So it would be free land but you would get the additional protection for the wells. The sole purpose of Berry Farm is to protect it and keep it isolated.

Mr. Garber asked if this decision needed to be made tonight.

Mr. Fitzgerald did not think so.

Mr. Garber would like to see it put on hold and allow the Service Authority look at options.

Mr. Shull stated that there has been conversation about the future growth of the area and installing the waterline for the Verona area in trade for this land, we wouldn't charge anything right now, but it would be deducted from the cost of the waterline installation. He also asked if there would be a need to upgrade the lines with additional water going through them to service Verona.

Mr. Fanfoni stated that it is a future possibility.

Chairman Bragg suggested bringing this agenda item back next month to allow for everyone to discuss the options.

Staff discussed the following issues:

- Mr. Fitzgerald shared that about 8 months ago his mother was unable to breathe
 and had fluid on her lungs. The rescue squad was called and they knew it was
 more critical than they could handle. The rescue squad called the EMS Supervisor
 and he essentially saved his mother's life on the way to Augusta Health, It's nice to
 know there is a Paramedic standing by and ready to help when needed.
- 2) VPAS-Valley Program for Aging Services/Federal & State funding reduced in Augusta County 20% due to population shift. There have been a few changes in Augusta County. Staunton and Waynesboro Senior Center days have been reduced from five to four days a week. The Meals on Wheels clients will be provided four hot meals and one frozen meal. The funding that the County provides will be used for Meal on Wheels and the Senior Centers.
- 3) Animal Shelter Report handed out to the Board. Year-to-date the shelter has taken in 1602 animals, 804 dogs, 790 cats and 8 others. Others being anything from parakeets, pigeons and rabbits. The Director works very hard with a lot of outside groups, such as adoptions agency and businesses for grants. The shelter is at a 97% save rate on dogs, 96% on cats and 100% on others. Augusta County alone has taken 1116 animals to the shelter, which makes up about 70% of the shelters population. The renovations are in their final stages. When completed, we will schedule a Board visit.
- 4) Courthouse frequently asked questions were handed out to the Board. These will be handed out at the Courthouse tours and will be put on the web page.
